INTRODUCTION

The activities of the Association Institutions and in particular those of the Association Council and Committee during the period covered by this report were greatly influenced by the fact that the Yaoundé Convention is due to expire on 31 January 1975. Most of the work, both in the Community and in the Associated African States, Madagascar and Mauritius, centred on the drafting of the provisions which will replace this Convention and was carried out on a broader basis and according to various procedures, with, on the one hand, the Community with its Council and Commission and the representatives of the nine Member States and, on the other hand, the forty-four African, Indian Ocean, Caribbean and Pacific States.

This report to the Parliamentary Conference of the Association on the activities of the Association Council, the tenth since institutionalized relations between the Council and the Conference began under the first Yaoundé Convention which entered into force on 1 June 1964, gives only a brief outline of the negotiations, which took place outside the Institutions of the Association. Morcevir, it would be pointless to seek to impress upon the members of the Conference how important these negotiations are for the future of the Association since they have already received ample information from other sources.

The Parliamentary Conference will find in this report exhaustive information on the proceedings of the Association Committee (the Association Council did not meet during the period under review) and particularly on the consultations between the Community and the AASM on various matters of mutual interest, e.g. generalized preferences, relations between the Community and other developing countries and multilateral trade negotiations in CAST, taking into account the enlargement of the Community and its effect on relations with third countries.

These consultations served to emphasize the importance which the Community and the Member States attach to the implementation of existing procedures in the field of trade which are an essential feature of the institutional machinery both for the Community and for all the Associated States. These procedures enabled each Party, before taking its final decisions, to discover the exact points on which its action might be detrimental to the interests of the other Party and, where necessary, to amend its decisions as far as possible.

The Community's international obligations, reiterated in the declaration of the Conference of Heads of State and of Government of October 1972 and in the ministerial declaration adopted by the Contracting Parties to the GATT in Tokyo in September 1973, spurred it on to improve the generalized preferences scheme and to encourage increasing expansion and liberalization of world trade. But, at the same time, it endeavoured not to erode the advantages enjoyed by the Associated States which had already endorsed this course of action in UNCTAD.

Similarly, the extension of the generalized preference scheme to the three new Member States, with the necessary adjustments, was a logical consequence of the enlargement of the Community.

While taking into account the special trade relations between a large number of developing countries and one of those States, whose economy needed large quantities of products originating in those countries, the Community did not wish to make more adjustments than were necessary to maintain existing trade patterns.

In all these cases, the information and consultation procedure provided for in the Yaoundé Convention allowed joint examination of the effect of the improvement of the Community preferential arrangements for all developing countries on exports from Associated States to the Community and

made it possible to seek means of overcoming the difficulties which came to light. There is undoubtedly room for improvement in the procedures themselves. Nevertheless, in spite of the difficulties encountered in exporting some products from the TASM to the Community, AASM exports on the whole increased considerably both in volume and in value during the period under consideration, thus fulfilling one of the prime objectives of the Convention, an increase in trade between the Contracting Parties (1).

A. The Institutions of the Association

1. The Association Council and Committee

During the period under review and since the 14th meeting of the Association Council held in Mauritius on 15 June 1973, the Association Committee has held two meetings, one on 23 November 1973 (40th meeting) and one on 8 July 1974 (41st meeting).

The 40th meeting of the Association Committee, which was chaired by Mr Seydina Oumar SY, Ambassador of Senegal, was devoted mainly to consultations, under the information and consultation procedure set up by the Yaoundé Convention; on the various measures which the Community intended to apply in respect of third countries, in almost all cases from 1 January 1974.

The implementation by the Community of the generalized preferences scheme for 1974, the negotiations for the conclusion of a trade agreement between the Community and Brazil, the negotiations with certain Mediterranean countries, the multilateral negotiations within the GATT and the negotiations under Article XXIV/6 of GATT were the main topics discussed during the consultation.

Ambascador BUKIN DES ROZIERS, Permanent Representative of France to the European Communities, also provided an opportunity for information and consultation on the relations between the Community and Mediterranean countries, the Community generalized tariff preferences, including the Commission proposals for 1975, and the renegotiations under article XXIV (6) of GATT. The AASM also asked questions about the Community import arrangements for coffee and sugar and the difficulties being encountered with regard to bananas, the protection of the designation of natural vanilla and Community requirements on the aflatoxin level in groundnut-oil cake.

A number of measures recently adopted by the Community or by a Member State which could affect AASM exports (restrictions on the import of beef and veal, export levies on cereals, import deposits) were also discussed.

The Association Committee also touched on the possible transitional measures with effect from 31 January 1975, the date of expiry of the Yaoundé Convention, which might be necessary until the new Convention now being negotiated enters into force.

Finally, at institutional level, the Committee devoted its attention to relations with the Parliamentary Conference of the Association. Moreover, following reciprocal consultation pursuant to Article 17 of the rules of procedure of the Association Council, the Community appointed Mr Gonzague LESORT as European Joint Secretary of the Association Council and Committee to replace Mr Robert SCHEIBER who was taking up other duties. At the meeting on 8 July 1974 the AASM informed the Community of the departure of the African Joint Secretary of the Association Council and Committee, Tr P.H. NTAKABURIMVANO, who was taking up other duties, and their intention to appoint Mr MADUDU FUMA (Zaire) to this post after reciprocal consultations.

2. The Parliamentary Conference of the Association

At its meeting in Rome (28 January - 1st February 1974) the Parliamentary Conference of the Association examined, among other things, the 9th Arnual Report on the activities of the Association Council and adopted a Resolution on the present problems and future of the Association. The Association Committee examined this Resolution with interest and took note of it at its meeting on 8 July 1974.

These two general themes were also taken up by Mr Mohammed WARSAMA ALI, President of the Association Council and Somali State Secretary for External Trade, in his address to the Parliamentary Conference, while Mr SCHKEL, then German Minister for Foreign Affairs, speaking as President of the Council of the European Communities, focussed attention on the Community's activities in respect of developing countries and especially on the opening of negotiations between the EEC and the African, Caribbean and Pacific countries.

The President in office of the Association Council also took part in the proceedings of the Joint Committee at its meetings in Lomé (26 to 31 October 1973 - Mr BABACAR BA, Minister for Finance and Economic Affairs of Senegal) and Dinard (27 and 30 May 1974 - Mr WISCHNEWSKI, State Secretary at the Foreign Affairs Ministry of the Federal Republic of Germany and also President of the Council of the European Communities). The Council of the European Communities was represented at the meeting in Lomé by its President in office, Mr J. CHRISTENSEN, Danish State Secretary for External Economic Relations.

At a time when negotiations were in progress between the Community and the African, Caribbean and Pacific States, the long-established relations between the Association Council and the Parliamentary Conference of the Association took on a new significance. They enabled the Members of Parliament to be better informed about the arguments put forward by the Governments and the Community during the negotiations and, conversely, made the latter more directly aware of the wishes and preoccupations of the Representatives of the people of some twenty-eight States, joined for the occasion by those of several potential associated States. The Association Council is convinced that this close co-operation with the Parliamentary Conference of the Association, with the assistance of the Association Committee, will continue in the coming months and will be reflected in appropriate institutional provisions in the Convention which is being negotiated.

B. The negotiations between the Community and the African, Caribbean and Pacific States

Although these negotiations are outside the scope of the present Association Council, it would be difficult not to advert to them in this report. The first paragraph of Article 62 of the Yaoundé Convention states that "eighteen months before the expiry of this Convention, the Contracting Parties shall examine any provisions which might be made for a further period", and this is precisely the purpose of the current negotiations.

The members of the Association Council, both on the Community side and on the AASM side, have devoted considerable energy to the preparation and conduct of these negotiations. The Parliamentary Conference and the Joint Commission have adopted a stand on several important aspects of the negotiations in their Resolutions and declarations.

At its meeting in Rome the Parliamentary Conference of the Association was given detailed information on the opening stage of the negotations, be anning with the Ministerial Conferences on 25 and 26 July 1973 and 16 and 17 October 1973. It is unnecessary to summarize once again the first stages of the negotiations between the Commission of the European Communities in consultation with the Representatives of the Member States and the Ministers and Ambassadors of the African, Caribbean and Pacific States.

Since then the Plenary Committee of Ambassadors and Plenipotentiaries which met in Brussels on several occasions

dealt with a number of questions concerning mainly trade and financial and technical co-operation on the basis of negotiating positions which evolved gradually on both sides and have come considerably closer together.

The EEC-ACP ministerial Conference, held in Kingston on 25 and 26 July at the invitation of the Jamaican Government, provided an opportunity to take stock of the negotiations and give them a new impetus and especially to decide on the common line which the negotiations should adopt on the main problems under discussion. It was also the occasion for an expression of the common will to lay the foundations of a new world economic order by attempting to define the principles of a new type of relationship between industrialized and developing countries, based on international social justice.

A common approach (see Annexes I end II) was reached on matters which will probably be the main subjects of the future agreement, viz. trade, stabilization of export earnings, industrial co-operation and financial and technical co-operation. It was agreed that the question of the Institutions embodying the new Agreement

would be examined at the end of the negotiations (1).

These new principles having been adopted, more intensive negotiations have been resumed between the Plenipotentiaries so that they can be concluded, as scheduled, by the end of November 1974.

⁽¹⁾ At the Opening Conference on 25 and 26 July 1973 the Community stated that, because of its contractual nature, the Association should comprise joint Institutions. It proposed Institutions similar to those of the Yaoundé Convention, including the Parliamentary Conference, but made it clear that the composition, powers and functioning of these Institutions would be determined in the light of experience, taking account also of the views which might be expressed by the partners of the Community at the negotiations, with a view to adapting them to the needs of administering an enlarged and renewed association.

C. Trade

- 1. Generalized preferences in favour of developing countries
 - (a) Consultation on the generalized preferences for 1974 and the general problem of consultation procedures

The Community consulted the AASM at the 40th meeting of the Association Committee (23 November 1973) on the implementation of the generalized preferences scheme for 1974. The proposed scheme contained considerable improvements over last year for the developing countries, given the application of the scheme by the new Member States and the negotiations under Article XXIV/6 of GATT consequent on enlargement of the Community.

The AASM reiterated their apprehension concerning the development of Community policy towards the developing countries which was inevitably leading to some erosion of the advantages enjoyed by the AASM. Moreover, they considered that consultation would take place at a time when the Community had already adopted its guidelines.

The Community reacted against the implication that consultation was more apparent than real. It stressed that in the past it had always heeded the AASM in its consultations with them and furthermore intended to do so in the future. It confirmed that the comments made by the AASM would be submitted to the Council of the Communities, which would discuss them in the following few days. The importance of frequent contact with the Commission, notwithstanding any improvements which it might be advisable to make to the consultation procedure, was reiterated.

As regards the generalized tariff preferences in particular, the Associated States were surprised at the extent to which the system had been improved. They wondered whether this improvement resulted solely from the application of the system by the new Member States, and whether the Community really needed to undertake such a large-scale operation, whereas other industrialized countries had not changed their offer and some had not even implemented their own generalized system of preferences.

They said they could not accept the Community proposals for plywood, blockboard, laminboard and battenboard nor for tinned pineapple. They requested that the cut-off price for ply nod, blockboard, laminated board and battenboard be retained at its previous level (a maximum of 20% of the ceiling for each recipient developing country) and that the Community quota and the United Kingdom quota be reduced by 50% of the proposed amount (30 million UA). The Representative of Gabon said that his Government could not allow the generalized preference scheme which it had endorsed to jeopardize its own development programme.

As regards tinned pineapple, the AASM could not agree to the inclusion of this product in the list of Community offers and therefore opposed the proposed 50% tariff reduction. The AASM and the Ambassador of the Ivory Coast, in particular, wondered whether it was politically judicious to include this product in the generalized preferences, even though it formed part of the Community offer within the framework of the negotiations then in progress under Article XXIV (6) of GATT.

Questions were also asked in connection with bovine cattle leather and goat and kid slin leather.

Sometime after this very detailed discussion of the problem of substance and the consultation procedure, the Community informed the AASM that the whole matter had been examined by the Council of the Communities at its meeting on 3 December 1973 and that the Council had decided to amend the Commission propoposals:

- for goat and kid skin leather (reduction of the cut-off to 30%);
- for plywood, blockboard, laminboard and battenboard (BTN heading 44.15) (reduction of the Community quota from 30 million UA to 23 million UA, restriction of the special United Kingdom zero-duty quota to 22 million UA, safeguard provision for exports from Gabon);
- for timed pineapple by opening a tariff quota of 20,000 metric tons at a duty rate of 12% for timed pineapple pieces only, within the framework of the generalized preference scheme, without prejudice to the negotiations under Article XXIV/6 of GATT.

Furthermore, in confirmation of its initial attitude in the Association Committee on possible improvements to the consultation procedure, the Community said that it had asked the Commission to take another look at this procedure and offer practical suggestions. The Community has since resumed its investigation of this matter in the context of the EEC-ACP negotiations.

(b) Amendment proposed by the Commission to the 1974 generalized preferences scheme

At the meeting of the Association Committee on . 8 July 1974, the AASM recalled that the Community had already made improvements to the 1974 scheme in respect of processed agricultural products, improvements which had involved both increasing the margin of the agreed preferences and extending the list of products covered. The Commission proposal to the Council of 24 April 1974 aimed at further extending the list of products falling within Chapters 1 to 24 of the CCT and while this constant trend towards the extension of the scheme represented a legitimate awareness on the part of the Community of its world responsibilities, it nevertheless continually penalized the AASM without there being any compensation for the gradual erosion of their initial advantages. Efficient measures to promote trade in the products most affected could be introduced.

Recalling that the Commonity had made a formal undertaking to find ways of ensuring more efficient consultation, the AASM insisted that they be consulted in time on the aforementioned Regulation which would be implemented for the first time during that year.

The Community took note of this statement and of the request by the AASM for consultation, but it was pointed out that the Community's internal work on this proposal was not yet sufficiently advanced $\binom{1}{2}$.

(c) Commission proposals for 1975.

The Commission representative briefed the Committee on the Commission's proposals for 1975 and said that there had already been contacts with the Associated States whilst the proposals were being drawn up. The proposals were metivated by the Community's contractual responsibility and by its responsibility towards developing countries - a policy which the AASM had supported in international bodies.

The Commission representative vent on to outline
the improvements proposed by the Commission and pointed out
that most of the new products included in the scheme were
not exported by the AASM and in the case of others which
were of great importance to them (pepper, certain vegetable oils,
etc.), provision had been made for safeguards. Furthermore
there would be no tariff reduction for these products
within the generalized preferences scheme so long as the
Agreements resulting from the negotiations with the ACP
States had not come into force.

⁽¹⁾ The Community did not continue its work on this proposal, the main features of which re-appear in the Commission proposals for 1975.

The Ivory Coast representative agreed that the generalized preferences scheme involved a continuing process but stressed that the developing countries did not form a homogeneous whole. Thus whilst it was right that the Community should fulfil its international commitments, including those towards the developing countries, it was not fair that the Associated States should bear the cost. The erosion of preferences must be compensated in some way, for example through trade promotion. The Commission should quickly examine more dynamic measures, especially in the field of trade promotion, in order to attenuate the difficulties which were likely to arise during the period before the future Convention entered into force.

The Commission representative said that the Community had paid particular attention to the promotion of its partners' products on the Community market in the context of the Yaoundé Convention and this was even more the case in the current negotiations with the ACP States. It involved efforts both at production level and at marketing level. He confirmed that these efforts would be continued by the Community without awaiting the entry into force of the new Convention.

2. Progress report on negotiations under GATT

(a) Multilateral trade negotiations

In July 1973 the Community informed the Association Council of the concept adopted for the multilateral trade negotiations under GATT. It also forwarded to the AASM the statement it had made at the GATT Ministerial Conference held in Tokyo from 12 to 14 September 1973.

Referring to this information at the meeting of the Association Committee on 23 November 1973, the Community recalled its overall approach to these trade negotiations, taking special account of the interests of the associated countries: one chapter of the guidelines adopted by the Council of the European Communities at its meeting on 25 and 26 June 1974 quoted the Declaration made by the Heads of State and of Government in October 1972 to the effect that the Community "attaches essential importance to the policy of association as confirmed in the Treaty of Accession". It was agreed in another chapter that "additional action should also be taken on products which are of particular interest to the developing countries. This action could take the form of measures on a case by case basis, enabling these countries to improve their export revenue". This policy, therefore clearly reflects the Community's wish constantly to bear in mind its obligations and commitments to Associated countries during the GATT negotiations.

The Community also referred at that meeting of the Association Committee to several points made in the declaration adopted by the Ministers of several countries, including a number of Associated States, at the end of the Tokyo Conference: thus, in order to assist developing countries, provision was made for recourse to several means such as "the preparation of measures designed to attain stable, equitable and remunerative prices for primary products". It was also stated that "the particular situation and problems of the least developed among the developing countries should be given special attention" and should "receive special treatment in the context of any general or specific measures taken in favour of the developing countries during the negotiations".

It was also recognized that tropical products should be treated as a "special priority sector". In this connection, the Community spokesmen in the Association Committee stated that the Community was conscious of the possible need to preserve the interests of its associates in the negotiations on tariff measures applicable to tropical products but would be in a better position to do so if it received effective support from the associated countries in defining appropriate measures to cover the question as a whole, and more particularly measures concerning price policy and stabilization of markets.

The AASM took note of these statements and said they would be glad to be kept regularly informed of any proposals on this issue in view of the importance they attached to these GATT multilateral negotiations. They were willing to remain in close contact with the Community Representative during the multilateral negotiations. They also noted that the Community intended giving negotiating directives to the Commission and they would be glad to be told about them in due course. At all events they hoped that the Community would bear the Associated States' interest in mind when submitting directives to the Commission on this issue.

It will be remembered that the CATT Trade
Negotiations Committee made preparations during the last
few months to tackle the substance of the negotiations
in an effective manner, with due allowance for some
continuing uncertainty regarding the attitude of the
United States.

(b) Renegotiation under Article XXIV/6 of GATT

Besides enlarging the Association considerably, the Accession Treaty made it necessary for the enlarged Community to respect obligations connected with the effects of enlargement contracted under GATT with certain third countries, whether industrialized or developing.

Recalling this situation at the meeting of the Association Committee on 23 November 1973, the Community spokesman stressed that the Community could not refuse to enter into negotiations with contracting parties to GATT which considered that the application of the common customs tariff of the enlarged Community might be detrimental to their vested rights.

It became apparant during the renegotiations that while the extension of the common customs tariff to all nine Member States resulted in a reduction in some duties previously applied in the new Member States, it also brought about a deterioriation in the situation of some contracting parties to GATT which were therefore entitled to compensation. With the intention of maintaining its freedom of action and of avoiding a product by product compensation, the Community prepared an overall tariff offer to enable it to arrive at an overall settlement for this negotiation.

Speaking of products of particular interest to the AASM, the Community spokesman informed them that the offer, which was not yet definitively adopted, would go no further than simple consolidation of the duties already applied to raw coffee, crude palm oil for human consumption and quality tobacco. For preserved pineapples attempts were being made to find a solution involving a limited reduction in the customs duty applied to all or some of the customs headings in question, within the framework of the generalized preferences scheme, thus excluding several of the more competitive among the major producers.

The Community spokesman stressed that the measures eventually adopted would take account, as far as possible, of the interests of the AASH, bearing in mind the need to apply the rules of the GATT which were binding in all its members.

The AASM would like to have more details of the Community offers and repeated that they would not understand the Community's attitude if at the GATT negotiations under 'Article XXIV paragraph 6 it either disregarded or neglected the legitimate interests of the Associated States.

At the meeting of the Association Committee on 8 July 1974 the Community spokesman drew attention to the legal necessity for these re-negotiations as a result of the enlargement of the Community, and said that a list of additional concessions had proved necessary for the conclusion of the negotiations: such a list had been drawn up by the Community and transmitted to the GATT. The list, which had been conveyed to the AASM, contained few products of particular interest to the Associated States. In the case of the rare exceptions, a somewhat complex formula had been adopted so that the interests of the Associated States were as little affected as possible. The Associated States took note of this statement and repeated their desire to be kept informed of further developments (1).

⁽¹⁾ The negotiations in GATT have since been concluded on that besis.

Legotiations between the Community and certain Mediterranean countries

Following the detailed information given to the Associated States at the meeting of the Association Council on 15 June 1973 (see 9th annual report to the Farliamentary Conference on the activities of the Association Council) the Community informed the Association Committee at its meeting on 23 November 1973 of the opening of negotiations with Algeria, Morocco, Tunisia, Spain and Israel. It pointed out that it had not yet had an opportunity to examine the results of this first phase of the negotiations (July - October 1973) but that the Community authorities would carry out this examination shortly in order to establish a Community position which would enable the negotiations to be continued.

It also said that as regards Malta, a brief to negotiate was being prepared in the context of the overall approach for the Community's Mediterranean policy.

The AASM pointed out that they obviously had an interest in these negotiations, particularly in view of the fact that some of the Mediterranean countries were African. They therefore stressed that they set great store on being kept fully informed of all aspects (commercial, economic, social etc.) of the negotiation with these countries and especially with the African countries of the Mediterranean basin.

At the request of the AASM the Community gave further information on the progress of the negotiations at the meeting of the Association Committee on 8 July 1974. It said that at its meeting on 25 June 1974, the Council of the European Communities had been able to draw up the broad outlines of the supplementary negotiating directives but that these had still to be finalized (1). It then recapitulated the essential features of the proposed Agreements.

The AASM insisted that the Associated States be consulted on the Agreements to be concluded so that due account of their comments could be taken should their interests be threatened.

⁽¹⁾ The Council of the Communities made a decision on the substance at the meeting on 23 July 1974 and formally approved the supplementary negotiating directives for Spain, Israel, Algeria, Morocco, Tunisia and Malta under the overall approach to the countries of the Mediterranean basin at its meeting on 17 September 1974.

4. Negotiations between the Community and Brazil

At the meeting of the Association Council held on 15 June 1973, the Commission representative, on behalf of the Community, reviewed the principal problems raised by the negotiations between the Community and Brazil for the purpose of concluding a trade agreement (see 9th report of the Association Council to the Parliamentary Conference). He noted that the two vital products for Brazil were cocca butter and soluble coffee and that Brazil had stated how concerned it was to retain access to the Community market, and particularly that of the United Kingdom. As regards these products, he said that the Commission would be asking the Council for specific directives of which the AASM would then be informed in detail, in order that account might be taken of their comments in due time.

At the meeting of the Association Committee on 23 November 1973, the Community consulted the AASM on the draft supplementary directives submitted by the Commission relating, in particular, to cocoa butter and soluble coffe-

During these consultations, the Community pointed out that the negotiations initiated with Brazil on soluble coffee and cocoa butter were a consequence of the enlargement of the Community, for the bulk of Brazilian exports of these products to the EEC traditionally went to the United Kingdom. The application of the common customs tark

to products involved in these trading patterns would entail an increase in import charges, since the CCT duties on these products were higher than those of the United Kingdom customs tariff and, in view of the international commitments of the Community, this situation required that it offer appropriate compensation.

The Community also stressed that, on this point, the draft supplementary directives fell considerably short of the Brazilian requests, in that:

- the rate to be offered had to include protection both of the raw material and of the added value and the offer could be 7% + 2% = 9% for soluble coffee and 4% + 4% = 3% for cocoa butter. Consequently, while the cut in duty would be 50% for soluble coffee, a product which particularly interested the United Kingdom (80% of its consumption of coffee being in soluble form), the cut would be only one third for cocoa butter, thus taking special account of the interests of the AASM;
- tariff concessions would be limited to quantities imported under Community tariff quotas. When fixing the overall volume of these quotas the Community would take due account of the interests of the AASM. Furthermore, as regards the allocation of these quotas between the Member States, the share of Member States other than the United Kingdom would of necessity be small, in keeping with their past imports of these two products from non-associated developing countries, such as Brazil;

- furthermore, Brazil would have to give assurances that it would avoid any disturbances of the trade patterns. The Commercial co-operation to be established by the agreement with Brazil and the supervision to be exercised by the Joint Commission of Brazilian export price policy should suffice to prevent any such disruption of the market;
- finally, if this were not the case, a safeguard clause supplementing the machinery would be applied without delay.

After having recalled their general comments on the procedure for and scope of the consultations, the AASM reminded the Community that they were not in a position to compete effectively with Brazil's exports of soluble coffee and cocoa butter. Consequently, a reduction of the processing protection to 2% for soluble coffee and to 4% for cocoa butter could not be accepted by the Associated States, because such reductions would inhibit industrial development in the countries producing these two products and would be likely to cause economic and social difficulties. The same view was also held by the other African States which were negotiating an agreement with the Community.

In accordance with the undertakings given under the consultation procedure, the Council of the Communities, at its meeting on 3 December 1973, conducted a careful examination of the AASM's comments. While abiding by its intention of partially and unilaterally suspending duties at 9% for soluble coffee and at 8% for cocoa butter, within the limits of a Community tariff quota, it agreed,

in the interests of AASM producers, on certain internal provisions. It was decided that, as regards the amount of the quota and the manner in which it was to be allocated to the various Member States, account should be taken of the real requirements of each country in order to avoid any disruption of the market. The Commission would apply the rules customary in this connection for determining the amount of the Community tariff quota.

At the meeting of the Association Committee on 8 July 1974, the Community said that the outcome of the negotiations in no way departed from the supplementary directives on which the AASM had been consulted. Annex II of the agreement concluded with Brazil - which entered into force on 1 August 1974 - mentioned the unilateral arrangements the Community applied to the two abovementioned products: a tariff concession and quantitative limitation of the scope of the Convention, within the Community generalized preferences scheme. The amount of the tariff quota was 21,600 metric tons for cocoa butter and 18,750 metric tons for soluble coffee. It would be allocated amongst the Member States on the lines indicated above.

Furthermore the Agreement comprised a safeguard clause, containing an explicit mention of the Associated countries, whereby the CCT duties could be restored either partially or completely.

5. Problems relating to imports of certain AASM products

(a) Tariff arrangements applicable to coffee exported to the Community

At the meeting of the Association Committee on 8 July 1974, the AASH noted that the Community had suspended the 9.6% duty on raw coffee at the level of 7% on the basis of the existence and operation of the International Coffee Agreement. Since all the economic clauses of this Agreement had been suspended since 1 January 1973, they wondered what the Community intended to do in this connection.

The Community pointed out that one of the reasons for the suspension of the International Coffee Agreement had been the significant increase in coffee prices on the world market, which was of considerable benefit to the Associated States, particularly since their coffee entered the Community duty-free. Furthermore, negotiations were under way to conclude a new international agreement and the Community was maintaining regular contact with the AASM in this connection. As regards the CCT duty on raw coffee, the Community stated that, in the context of the conclusion of the negotiations under Article XXIV/6 of GATT, the suspension of the customs duty at the level of 7% would be bound as from 1 January 1975.

(b) Arrangements applied by the Community to AASM sugar

At the meeting of the Association Committee on 8 July 1974, the AASM pointed out that the measures which the Community had envisaged in response to their requests (i.e. reduction of the levy by 1 UA per 100 kg. for a quota of 9,000 metric tons from 1 January 1974 to 31 January 1975, not applicable to Mauritius) were, in their view, inadequate - they wanted a quota of 50,000 metric tons exempt from the levy - and that it had been agreed at the meeting of the Association Council on 15 June 1973 that the question should be left open.

The Community pointed out that the sugar market had evolved considerably and that import levies had not been imposed for several months. It noted the AASH request that this point remain on the agenda and said that the sugar question was one of a series of problems which would have to be discussed shortly in a wider context.

(c) Difficulties regarding banana exports to the Community

The AASM recalled that, particularly in the case of Somalithe closing of the Suez Canal, followed by the recent Italian import measures had had a disastrous effect on exports of

bananas which had represented 47% of Somalia's total export earnings in 1972. They asked that special measures be taken by the Community to remedy these difficulties and to guarantee the export of bananas from Somalia to their traditional markets.

The Commission representative said that the Commission had been studying with the Somali authorities possible ways of remedying this situation.

Thus:

- since the Somali Government had asked the Commission for exceptional aid on the basis of Article 20 or 21 of the Yaoundé Convention, the Commission was willing to examine with the Somali authorities the possibility of invoking Article 21 with a view to immediate specific aid for Somalia;
- following a request from Somalia, the Commission had made a study of the difficulties of marketing bananas from Somalia in Italy; the conclusions of this study had been sent to the Somali Government;
- bananas were included among the products for which the Commission had proposed machinery for stabilizing export earnings under the future Convention.

The AASM took note of this statement.

(d) Protection of the designation "natural vanilla"

After reiterating that the problem of the designation "natural vanilla" had occupied the Association for several years the AASH requested that they be informed of what progress had been made towards a solution.

The Commission representative said that the Commission proposal on the harmonization of Nember States' rules on ice cream was still being examined by the Council of the European Communities. He recalled nevertheless the efforts made by the Commission for several years to promote the sale of natural vanilla and drew attention to the adoption of a Council Directive on cocoa and chocolate products which laid down that the term "vanilla" could only be employed where the natural flavouring substance had been used.

The Community spokesman said that the Community would continue its discussions in full awareness of the importance that the AASM attached to this problem.

(e) Aflatoxin level in groundnut-oil cake

At the meeting of the Association Committee on 8 July 1974, the AASH referred to the Council Directive of 17 December 1973 concerning animal feeding-stuffs which contained strict rules on the maximum aflatoxin level. They asked how the Community intended to deal with the difficulties which these rules had created for the Associated States and pointed out that it had undertaken to do so both at the meeting of the Association Committee of 2 February 1973 and at talks between the Commission and a delegation from the African Groundrut Council.

The Chairman, on behalf of the Community, drew attention to the complex nature of the problem which involved both public health and economic and technical considerations. The Commission representative said that the

Community had made considerable efforts, in particular through contacts with the producers or bodies directly concerned. However, it was unreasonable to expect the Community to relax its standards - which were already more tolerant than had been planned initially - since public health and consumer protection were at stake. A solution would have to be found which would evoid or at any rate reduce the presence of aflatoxin in the products in question. The Community thought a solution to the problem was more likely to be found through financial and-technical co-operation.

(f) International meetings on tropical products

In accordance with Protocol No 5 annexed to the Yaoundé Convention, EEC-AASI consultations had enabled exchanges of views to be held on problems of common interest during:

- intergovernmental talks pursuant to UNCTAD Resolution 83 (III)
- the renegotiation of the International Coffee Agreement
- the Working Party on tropical products in the context of the GATT multilateral negotiations. (see § 2 above).

6. Safeguard measures adopted by the Community or one of its Hember States

(a) Italian import deposit measures

At the meeting of the Association Committee on 8 July, the AASM emphasized the repercussions which the measures imposing payment of a deposit on imports into Italy could not fail to have on exports from the Associated States to Italy, particularly exports of bananas.

The Commission representative said that Italy had been forced by its growing balance of payments deficit to take the measures which were causing concern to the Associated States and that the provisions adopted were part of a series of measures as provided for under Article 109 of the Treaty of Rome and were in line with a Commission recommendation to the Council based on Article 108 of that Treaty. He also supplied details regarding the nature of the machinery which had been set up and which was also applicable vis-b-vis the other Hamber States (1).

(b) Hossures concerning imports of beef and veal into the EEC

At the meeting of the Association Committee on 3 July 1974, the ALSH indicated their concern at the restrictions on imports of beef and veal into the ELC and asked what steps the Community planned to take to protect the interests of those Associated States which emported beef and veal.

The Commission representative informed the Committee that the critical state of the Community beef and veal market had forced the Community to adopt a Regulation on 30 April 1974 matching imports of beef and veal and quantities which had to be bought on the internal market. He pointed out however that, as regards the special measures, particularly the import measures, adopted by the Community to stabilize the market, the Commission was at present examining the extent to which it would be possible to find a practical solution to the problem of consignments of frozen beef and veal from the AASM . (Madagascar), for which import licences had not been requested in time and which had not been matched by the purchase of meat held in stock by Community intervention agencies.

7. Supply difficulties of certain Associated States, particularly as regards cereals

At the meeting of the Association Committee on 8 July 1974, the Cameroon Ambassador asked the Community to examine the possibility of abolishing the system of applying levies to exports of cereals to the AASM, without prejudice to the measures to be taken on a world basis for the benefit of developing countries particularly affected by the present market situation.

The Commission representative stated that faced with an exceptional rise in prices of certain products on the world market, the Community had been forced to introduce levies on exports to maintain the supply of its own market on which prices were lower. The Commission had not failed to take the Associated States into consideration and had adopted a series of technical measures intended to ease their situation as much as possible. It felt nevertheless that a long-term solution to the problem should be sought jointly on a world basis.

The AASM took note of this statement (1).

⁽¹⁾ The Associated States raised a similar point in a letter from the Chairman of the AASM Co-ordination Committee dated 30 July 1974.

D. FINANCIAL AND TECHNICAL CO-OPERATION

Under Article 29 of the Yaoundé Convention, the Association Council lays down the general pattern for financial and technical co-operation within the framework of the Association on the basis of an annual report submitted to it by the Commission on the administration of the Community's financial and technical aid.

At its meeting on 23 November 1973, the Committee instructed a joint Working Party to finalize a draft Resolution of the Association Council on the general pattern for financial and technical co-operation, on the basis of the Commission report on this co-operation during 1972.

Since the heavy work load caused by the EEC-ACP negotiations prevented the joint Working Party from assembling before the meeting of the Association Committee on 8 July 1974, the AASM therefore suggested that, at the earliest opportunity the Working Party should exemine the Commission report both for 1972 and for 1973 and should, at the same time, prepare a draft Resolution covering both years.

E. POSSIBLE TRANSITIONAL MEASURES WITH EMPECT FROM 31 JANUARY 1975

At the meeting of the Association Committee on 8 July 1974, the AASM said they were concerned about filling the vacuum which would arise if the future agreement did not enter into force on 1 February 1975 when the Yaoundé Convention expired. They felt that transitional provisions for the benefit of the AASM ought to be taken in good time.

Speaking on behalf of the Community, the Chairman said that it intended to do its utmost to ensure the next Convention was signed as soon as possible. This could reasonably be expected before the end of the year.

Speaking in a personal capacity, he said that transitional measures would anticipate the future and that, if the negotiations were not concluded within the desired period of time, the existing arrangements, which were obviously not the same for all those taking part in the negotiations, should be extended. He also said that the procedures in force when the Yaoundé Convention expired would not necessarily be interrupted on account of the expiry of the Convention.

The Commission representative shared this point of view and said that when the time came, all appropriate means would be used to prevent the functioning of the Association being interrupted.

At the invitation of the Group of ACP States, a Ministerial Conference was held in Kingston on 25 and 26 July 1974 with the participation of the representatives of 44 African, Caribbean and Pacific States and the European Economic Community and its Liember States.

As regards the problems discussed, the conclusions in $\underline{\text{Annex I}}$ were adopted by joint agreement.

The press release issued at the close of the Conference appears in Annex II.

A. TRADE CO-OPERATION

I. Rules of origin

- 1. The Community recognizes that rules of origin can create difficulties for the free access of the products of ACP countries to its market. A solution which would resolve these difficulties will be sought in the framework of the new Convention.
- The principle for determining origin is that of a change in tariff heading.
- 3. The Conference asks the negotiators to examine the exceptions which exist in the present Community system with a view to permit the freest possible access to the Community market for ACP products, in view of the importance of such access for the industrial development of the ACP countries, including processed agricultural products.

This exemination also will deal with the protective element of the exceptions.

4. It is also understood that where the required change in tariff heading does not take place the product concerned must nevertheless be accepted as an originating product if the value added in the exporting country reaches a certain minimum percentage.

It is understood that the appropriate minimal solution may vary to some extent, depending on the industrial sector concerned. It is noted that the ACP countries have proposed that the percentage be 25%.

5. There must be adequate administrative co-operation to enable origin to be verified in order to avoid any abuse of the system.

II. Non-tariff barriers

- 1. The ACP countries reaffirm that non-tariff barriers constitute a hindrance to the access of their products to the Community market.
- 2. The Community acknowledges that the existence of health, plant-health and administrative provisions represents a restriction on free access to its. market. It has drawn the attention of the ACP countries to the fact that these rules, by virtue of their basis, apply erga omnes; and that it would therefore be very difficult to derogate from them.
- 3. However, the Community and the ACP countries agree that within an Acsociation provisions will be made for a consultation procedure in any cases where practical difficulties arise, due either to existing regulations, or to the harmonization of the regulations of the Member States of the Community, in order to attempt to find solutions which will minimize the effect of such provisions on the free access of the products of the ACP countries to the Community market.

III. Arrangements for imports of agricultural and processed products into the Community

While they recognize that the Community offer is an improvement on the existing situation the ACP countries consider that further improvements are necessary in particular:

- in the case of products exported by countries which previously enjoyed special conditions of access to the United Kingdom market, which represent a large part of the exports of the countries in question;
- in the case of products for which there would be real possibilities for export to the Community during the period in which the future Convention will apply;

The Committee has noted this request for improvement and is prepared to examine it with the ACP countries during the negotiations.

B. EXPORT EARNINGS

- The Community and the ACP countries hereby decide, within the framework of the new agreement, to implement a system of guarantees for stabilizing earnings from exports to the Community of products from the ACP countries.
- 2. A list of products to which the provisions envisaged may apply will be drawn up by common agreement in negotiations between the Community and the ACP countries.
- 3. The eligibility criteria for products must not be defined in too restrictive a fashion and must take account of factors such as employment, decreases in export earnings, fluctuations on world markets affecting exports to third countries, the deterioration of the terms of trade between the ACP country concerned and the Community, the level of development of the country concerned, and its particular difficulties resulting from its geographical situation. In this connection special measures will have to be taken in favour of land-locked countries, islands and the least developed countries.
- 4. In the event of there being a decrease in expert earnings for one year, due to fluctuations in prices or quantities, the country concerned will be entitled to ask for a financial transfer.

- 5. The Commission will undertake the examination of this request and apply these measures in the light of criteria to be defined during the negotiations.
- No special conditions will be imposed as regards the use of these funds.
- 7. The Commission will be informed each year of the way in which these funds have been used.
- The Community will take necessary measures to ensure that transfers are effected as quickly as possible.
- 9. The Community and the ACP countries agree to discuss within the framework of the present negotiations, the details and conditions for implementing these provisions, including the existence of a joint procedure for applying the agreed measures.

C. INDUSTRIAL CO-OPERATION

- 1. The ACP countries and the European Economic Community recognize the essential importance which should be placed on industrial co-operation in the future agreement, and agree that a special chapter of the agreement should be devoted to this subject.
- 2. The European Economic Community has taken note of the memorandum on industrial co-operation presented by the ACP countries and confirms its agreement on the general aims of the memorandum.
- 3. The ACP countries and the Community will, on the basis of the memorandum presented by the ACP countries, continue the examination of this subject in Brussels immediately on the resumption of the negotiations.

PRESS RELEASE

At the invitation of the Government of Jamaica, a Ministerial Conference was held in Kingston on 25 and 26 July with the participation of the representatives of 44 African, Caribbean and Pacific States and the European Economic Community.

The aim of this Conference was to take stock of progress made in the negotiations which have been going on for a year between the ACP States and the EEC and to give them a new momentum.

As stated by Mr Michael MANLEY, the Prime Minister of Jamaica, who opened the proceedings, the Conference thus offered an opportunity of opening the way to a new world economic order. It was intended to define the principles of a new model for relations between the industrialized and the developing countries on the basis of international social justice.

In their discussions, Ministers therefore concentrated on the main topics to be dealt with in the negotiations and were able to arrive at joint guidelines. One of the most salient features of this innovatory approach is the agreement by all parties on the setting up of a system for stabilizing earnings from ACP exports of primary products to the Community. This system is designed to alleviate the adverse effects on the economies of the countries concerned of drops in the price or quantity of the main products exported. The practical arrangements for applying this system will now be negotiated between the ACP States and the Community, while the Commission will immediately begin talks with the relevant producer countries on the various products, in particular sugar which, it was acknowledged, has always been a problem of particular importance.

The other original element on which joint guidelines were established relates to <u>industrial co-operation</u> between the ACP States and the Community.

The ACP States and the European Economic Community recognize the fundamental importance which should be placed on industrial co-operation in the future agreement and agree that a special chapter of the agreement should be devoted to this subject.

The European Community has taken note of the memorandum on industrial co-operation presented by the ACP countries and confirms its agreement on the general aims of the memorandum.

As regards trade arrangements, the participants recognized that the keynote should be stability and recognition of the fact that the developing countries are in an unequal position vis-à-vis their partners. The main feature of these arrangements will be free access for the ACP States to the Community markst, no corresponding commitments being required of the ACP States.

However, as a result of important comments made by the ACP countries and examined by the Conference, various factors which may hamper trade in some products will have to be examined again in the negotiations: these are rules of origin, and non-tariff barriers, with particular reference to products covered by the common agricultural policy.

The Conference noted with satisfaction the progress made on <u>financial co-operation</u> during the negotiations in Brussels. An initial discussion was held on the amount of aid to be granted by the Community to the ACP States: this discussion will be continued during the negotiations.

It was agreed that the institutions providing the framework for the co-operation agreement as a whole would be examined at the end of the negotiations.

0

Having agreed on these new principles, the Ministers consider that negotiations should now be resumed at a faster pace at plenipotentiaries' level in order to arrive at a conclusion in good time. This means that the proceedings of the plenipotentiaries must be completed by the end of November at the latest.
