QUESTIONS TO THE COUNCIL

1. Question by Ioannis Theonas (H-0573/94)

Subject: Deterioration in relations between Iraq and Kuwait

Public opinion is particularly anxious about the latest developments in the border region between Iraq and Kuwait and the mobilization of mainly US and UK troops following the threatening deployment of troops by Iraq and the statements by Mr Clinton. The risk of rekindling the war in the region and the constant presence of US-led international troops in more and more regions throughout the world threaten to totally undermine current international principles of respect for the independence and sovereignty of states and the principle of non-intervention in the internal affairs of third countries.

Does the Council consider that these principles enshrined in the UN Charter continue to apply and should be strengthened 50 years after its foundation and that the UN should not be used to further the self-interests of its member states or to reduce people to a state of destitution, as in the case of the Iraqi people who have suffered more than one million deaths, 30% of whom were children, even though the embargo has proved to be ineffective as a means of exerting pressure on the Iraqi authorities?

Does the Council of Foreign Ministers not agree that, in view of the close interdependence of the Balkan countries and the dangers of war spreading throughout the Balkans, initiatives of this kind should form part of a wider perspective for safeguarding peace and security in the region, based on the principle of the inviolability of borders, full guarantees for the rights of minorities and the development of economic and technical cooperation among the Balkan states on the basis of equality and mutual benefit? Does it intend to review its detrimental policy towards this region and support the proposals for the convening of a conference of the countries and warring parties in the Balkans?
