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
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- 1/81 Report from the Commission of the European Communities to the Council pursuant to the mandate of 30 May 1980

The Bulletin of the European Communities, in its present form, was designed by Mr Jacques Boullier. Over the last 13 years Mr Boullier and his team have produced 144 consecutive monthly issues.

On 1 July 1981 Mr Boullier left the Commission after many years' devotion to the cause of keeping the public abreast of Community affairs.

1. Luxembourg European Council

1.1.1. The European Council met in Luxembourg on 29 and 30 June with Mr Andries van Agt, Prime Minister of The Netherlands and President of the European Council and of political cooperation, in the chair. The Commission was represented by Mr Gaston Thorn and Mr François-Xavier Ortoli. This was the first European Council to be attended by Mr François Mitterrand, President of the French Republic, and by Mr Giovanni Spadolini and Mr Mark Eyskens, the Italian and Belgian Prime Ministers.

Discussions were dominated by the economic and social situation, but the European Council also made preparations for the Western Summit in Ottawa and considered relations with the United States and Japan. At France's request, the Commission's report on the mandate of 30 May 1980 was not considered in detail, but a procedure was agreed and the report will be discussed at the meeting to be held at the end of November. Lastly, the European Council discussed the international political situation, with special reference to the Middle East, Lebanon, Cambodia and Namibia. It made an official declaration on Afghanistan.

1.1.2. As usual, the Commission contributed to the preparations by providing a series of papers. These dealt with the North-South Dialogue, the economic and social situation in the Community, trade relations with the United States and Japan, and its report on the mandate of 30 May 1980, which was sent direct to the Heads of State or Government.

1.1.3. The outcome of discussions on 'Community' subjects dealt with in Luxembourg was summarized by the Presidency. The summary was accompanied by a declaration and documents concerned with European political cooperation.

'Community' problems: the Presidency's summary

1.1.4. The following is the full text of the summary issued by the Presidency to the national delegations and made public after the

meeting. It covers the economic and social situation and prospects, the internal market, relations with the United States and Japan in the context of the forthcoming Western Summit in Ottawa, steel prices, the North-South Dialogue and the mandate of 30 May 1980.

Economic and social situation

1.1.5. 'The European Council discussed in depth the present social and economic situation in which the European Community and the Member States find themselves at the time when the first cautious signs of limited improvement in the business cycle are becoming visible, but when the ravages of inflation and unemployment have by no means been brought under control. In the same context the European Council reviewed the Communities' position with regard to the Western Economic Summit in Ottawa and dealt with the need to preserve and strengthen the Communities' internal market. The European Council discussed these interlocking problems on the basis of a paper presented by the European Commission on the economic and social situation in the Community, the general orientation of which received unanimous approval.'

The European Council expressed its firm conviction that by the pursuit of coordinated flexible policies, maintained over a sufficient length of time, the Community will be able to overcome the present social and economic difficulties and return to a situation of economic growth, stability and satisfactory levels of employment. In particular, the problem of mass unemployment, which is a major preoccupation for all the members of the European Council, should not be approached in any spirit of fatalism.

In this light the European Council reviewed the work done by the Joint Council (Economic Affairs, Finance and Social Affairs) and agreed that a sound foundation had been laid for subsequent action. In particular, there was agreement that the highest priority should be accorded to coordinated action against unemployment and inflation, including efforts aimed at structural adjustment.

The major responsibility for these actions lies with national governments and will need to take account of the different economic situations in each Member State and of their particular possibilities and the constraints with which they are faced. But the effectiveness of such action will be increased by coordination within a Community framework. A major effort should be made both at the national and the Community level, to increase investments aimed at higher growth and

employment. Investment should be directed in particular to industries with a high innovative potential and which will secure for the Community in the coming decades the place in the industrial world to which it is entitled. The European Council was convinced that investment in energy conservation and production is of vital importance. Care should be taken not to waste precious funds on economic activities that are bound to decline in importance. In the same connection it was underlined that considerable growth potential is to be found in the sector of small and medium-sized enterprises.

The European Council took note of the fact that in some Member States the reduction in working time is seen as a significant element in the battle against unemployment. It was agreed that further study to evaluate the effects of such measures would be made at the Community level. In this connection, the competitive position of European industries *vis-à-vis* other industrialized countries deserves close attention.

It was stressed that optimal use should be made of the Community's financial instruments and of the facilities of the European Investment Bank to promote the flow of productive investment. Efforts should also be undertaken to secure a larger economic benefit from the research activities that are under way in the Community and the Member States.

The European Council reaffirmed its commitment to a meaningful social policy by the European Community. It approved the conclusions reached by the Joint Council with regard to the labour market and the problems of unemployment. It took note with interest of suggestions made for the promotion of harmonized working conditions and workers' rights. In this context the term *espace social* was used. It expressed its conviction that the pursuit of balanced and purposeful social and economic policies requires close consultation with the social partners.'

Internal market

1.1.6. The European Council echoed the alarm sounded by the Commission on the state of the internal market, which is increasingly threatened by intentional and unintentional barriers to trade and by the pervasive use of subsidies to ailing industries. The European Council agreed that a concerted effort must be made to strengthen and develop the free internal market for goods and services which lies at the very basis of the European Community and which is the platform from which it conducts its common commercial policy.'

Monetary relations with the United States

1.1.7. 'With regard to the forthcoming meeting of the Western Economic Summit the European

Council stressed the need for a united approach to the problems presented by the level and volatility of interest and exchange rates, as these pose a serious threat to Europe's incipient economic recovery. These issues should be pursued in depth in discussions with the other major monetary powers. Important monetary policy objectives are shared with the USA, but the USA should be urged to take due account of the significant international consequences of its domestic policies. The Community itself should do its part to relieve the strain on monetary policy.'

Trade relations with Japan

1.1.8. 'The European Council also reviewed the Community's relations with Japan, and it was agreed that in Ottawa strong emphasis should be paid to a broad span of questions relating to the smooth functioning of the open and multilateral world trading system, including excessive concentration of exports in sensitive sectors. The European Council stressed the need for effective openness of domestic markets, in particular the Japanese market. These issues should be kept under regular review and in doing so the Community should make the fullest possible use of its bargaining power as an entity.'

Steel prices

1.1.9. 'The European Council discussed the serious situation which faces the European steel industry. While welcoming the outcome of the recent Steel Council, the European Council agreed on the urgent need to see steel prices in the European market raised to a more remunerative level and urged the Commission supported by all the Member States to do all in its power to see to it that the steel industry respects the necessary discipline.'

North-South Dialogue

1.1.10. 'The European Council approved the report on North-South policy drawn up by the Council (General Affairs) and recommended its approach for subsequent action. It is of the opinion that cooperation with developing countries and the intensification of international economic relations serve the interests of all concerned and that they are necessary not only in order to strengthen the economies of the developing countries but also to promote the recovery of the world economy. It considers it intolerable that widespread poverty and hunger persist in various parts of the developing world.'

The European Council was of the opinion that the preparations for the new round of global negotiations should be completed as soon as poss-

ible. It emphasized the crucial importance of a positive impetus to be given to this effect by the summit conferences in Ottawa and Cancun.'

Implementation of the 30 May 1980 mandate

1.1.11. 'The European Council had a discussion of the procedure for dealing with the Commission's paper. They confirmed that the implementation of the 30 May 1980 mandate would be a major topic for the meeting in London on 26 and 27 November where appropriate conclusions are to be reached. The European Council asked the General Affairs Council to make thorough and timely preparations for their meeting in November.'

The Council will be assisted by a Group consisting of one representative of each Member Government who shall be at least of Ambassadorial rank. The Commission was invited to continue its contribution and to make appropriate formal proposals in good time.'

European political cooperation

1.1.12. The European Council discussed the overall political situation and paid attention in particular to Afghanistan, the Middle East, Lebanon, Cambodia and Namibia. On Afghanistan they issued a separate formal declaration.

Declaration on Afghanistan

1.1.13. 'The European Council notes with deep concern that the situation in Afghanistan remains an important cause of international tension, that Soviet troops remain in Afghanistan and that the sufferings of the Afghan people continue to increase.'

The European Council recalls its earlier statements, notably those issued at Venice on 13 June 1980 and Maastricht on 24 March 1981, which stressed the urgent need to bring about a solution which would enable Afghanistan to return to its traditional independent and non-aligned status free from external interference and with the Afghan people having the full capacity to exercise their right to self-determination. In keeping with the Resolutions voted by the United Nations, the Islamic Conference and the New Delhi Conference of the Non-Aligned Movement, the European Council has made it clear on several occasions that it will support any initiative which could lead to the desired result.

The European Council considers that the time has come for a fresh attempt to open the way to

a political solution to the problem of Afghanistan. They therefore propose that an international conference should be convened as soon as possible, for example in October or November 1981, and that the Conference should consist of two stages, each stage being an integral part of the conference.

The purpose of Stage One would be to work out international arrangements designed to bring about the cessation of external intervention and the establishment of safeguards to prevent such intervention in the future and thus to create conditions in which Afghanistan's independence and non-alignment can be assured.

The European Council proposes that in due course the Permanent Members of the United Nations Security Council, Pakistan, Iran and India and the Secretary-General of the United Nations and the Secretary-General of the Islamic Conference, or their representatives, be invited to participate in Stage One of the Conference.

The purpose of Stage Two would be to reach agreement on the implementation of the international arrangements worked out in Stage One and on all other matters designed to assure Afghanistan's future as an independent and non-aligned State.

Stage Two would be attended by the participants in Stage One together with representatives of the Afghan people.

The Member States of the European Community will be ready at a later stage to make further proposals on the detailed arrangements for the proposed conference.

The European Council firmly believes that the situation in Afghanistan continues to demand the attention of the international community. It is convinced that this proposal offers a constructive way forward and therefore calls on the international community to support it fully with the aim of reducing international tension and ending human suffering in Afghanistan.'

Other matters

Middle East

1.1.14. 'The European Council noted the report of the Presidency as well as Mr van der Klaauw's oral comments on his contacts with the parties concerned with the Middle East conflict.'

It concluded that the efforts undertaken by the Ten to promote the conclusion of a peaceful settlement should be continued energetically and without respite, taking account of the results of the missions decided upon in Venice.

Accordingly, the European Council decided on the basis of the results of the mission just com-

pleted by the President-in-Office, to instruct Ministers to elaborate further the practical possibilities available to Europe to make an effective contribution towards a comprehensive peace settlement in the Middle East, through internal reflection, appropriate contacts being maintained with all parties concerned, including the United States.

As regards the attack by the Israeli air force on the Iraqi nuclear plant on 7 June 1981 the European Council can only endorse the Resolution adopted unanimously by the UN Security Council.'

Lebanon

1.1.15. Recalling its earlier statements concerning Lebanon, the European Council noted with interest the results of the work of the Arab Quadripartite Committee. The Council earnestly hoped that positive results would be obtained at the Committee's next meeting in Beit-ed-Dine, so as to achieve a genuine national reconciliation, which can give Lebanon internal security and foster its stability in peace with its neighbours.'

Cambodia

1.1.16. 'The European Council recalls the position it has adopted in favour of an independent and neutral Cambodia with a genuinely representative government, free from any foreign military presence and maintaining friendly relations with all the countries of the region.

Convinced that a genuine solution to the problem of Cambodia will be possible only on the basis of the United Nations General Assembly Resolution 35/6, the Ten declare their readiness to contribute to the success of the International Conference on Cambodia called by the UN Secretary-General.

The European Council noted the future Presidency's intention to be represented there by its Foreign Minister.'

Namibia

1.1.17. 'The European Council discussed the question of Namibia. It reaffirmed its resolve to do what lies in its power to promote an early peaceful settlement through negotiations on the basis of Resolution 435 of the UN Security Council. In this context, it continues to encourage the efforts of the group of five Western powers.'

Statements and comments

1.1.18. The European Council closed with the usual press conference given by the Presi-

dent of the Council and the President of the Commission. Other heads of government made separate statements.

Mr Andries van Agt, Prime Minister of The Netherlands and President of the European Council, emphasized the unusual nature of this meeting, which should have been devoted to restructuring the Community budget but which had spent more time discussing the economic and social situation in preparation for the Ottawa Summit. He considered it vital to encourage investment, particularly in innovative industries and energy projects.

He also stated that from now on there would be no obstacle to the President of the European Council's giving Parliament an account of the proceedings. This development, for which Parliament had been pressing,¹ was due largely to the efforts of Mr Thorn.

Mr Gaston Thorn, President of the Commission, also noted that the European Council had met at a moment which was critical both because of the changes of leadership in some countries and because the Community was suffering from very low production coupled with very high unemployment. He also referred to the 30 May 1980 mandate, the Ottawa Summit and the North-South Dialogue. On the May mandate, he noted that all the Member States had found the Commission's document useful and had decided to remit it to an *ad hoc* body which would dedicate itself almost exclusively to considering the report. He underlined the gravity of the economic and social situation and the need for a Community reaction: all were aiming at the same goal, but it might be reached by different paths. As the Ottawa Summit, the Community would have to ask the United States to consider the devastating consequences of its financial policies on other countries, though without setting its hopes too high. It also needed a common position on the North-South Dialogue, which he described as one of the key issues of our day.

Mr François Mitterrand, the French President, said: '... Europe is more necessary than

ever. It must widen its horizons. It is an ambitious construction which is in tune with the needs of our time. France has a role to play there, and it will play it. It is possible to respect European solidarity and assert one's own role at the same time. That is what I have tried to do these two days... Europe needs a fresh initiative.' After stating his commitment to Europe, Mr Mitterrand went on to say that he had paid particular attention to economic policy and therefore to social policy and that in approaching European affairs as a whole he wished more account to be taken of the *espace social européen*. Turning to the Middle East, he drew a distinction between the basic problem itself and the problem of how to solve it. France had always favoured proposing 'comparable prospects' in an attempt to solve the former, and he confirmed his previous public statements on the way to go about solving it. Although he did not reject

overall solutions, he favoured step-by-step negotiations and agreements of the Camp David type.

Mrs Margaret Thatcher, the British Prime Minister, also dealt with these matters, in particular the Middle East, on which she felt there should be closer consultation with the United States, and the economic situation. All the Member States had to fight inflation and unemployment, and each had to use the most appropriate weapons for its own situation. She confirmed that Lord Carrington would meet Mr Gromyko in Moscow the following week to discuss Afghanistan.

Mr Helmut Schmidt, the German Chancellor, emphasized that it would not be acceptable for the Federal Republic of Germany to become the only net contributor to the Community budget while other, equally prosperous, countries got back more than they paid in.

2. Mandate of 30 May 1980: Commission report

1.2.1. On 30 May 1980 the Council settled the problem of the 'unacceptable situation' created by the United Kingdom's contribution to the Community budget for 1980 and 1981.¹ It undertook to solve the problem for 1982 onwards by means of structural changes and gave the Commission a mandate to submit proposals to this end before 30 June 1981:

'For 1982, the Community is pledged to resolve the problem by means of structural changes (Commission mandate, to be fulfilled by the end of June 1981: the examination will concern the development of Community policies, without calling into question the common financial responsibility for these policies, which are financed from the Community's own resources, or the basic principles of the common agricultural policy. Taking account of the situations and interests of all Member States, this examination will aim to prevent the recurrence of unacceptable situations for any of them). If this is not achieved, the Commission will make proposals along the lines of the

1980 to 1981 solution and the Council will act accordingly.'

1.2.2. The Commission lost no time in starting work on the mandate: by December 1980 it had produced its 'Reflections on the common agricultural policy',² the basis of the final report. From January of this year the new Commission stepped up the pace and spent many meetings examining all the Community policies one by one. The text of the report was finalized at a special meeting at Knokke-le-Zoute on 19 and 20 June and adopted on 24 June. It was immediately transmitted to the Heads of State or Government of the Member States, together with a personal letter from Mr Thorn, who embarked at once on a tour of the Community capitals.

The Commission's report

A broad approach

1.2.3. The Commission considers that the budgetary aspect does not give the full picture. The budget is neither a reflection nor a measure of Community activity. For this reason it has placed the solution to the problem referred to it in its true perspective, which is the strengthening and development of Community solidarity. The Commission is convinced of two things: first, that its size and capacity to persuade make the Community strong, and second, that the time is ripe for proposals and action. It is not pleading for a strengthening of the Community as an end in itself. It sees it rather as the only course open to Member States on the domestic, Community and international fronts.

The Commission is aware that the present crisis will not yield to half-measures or short-term remedies. This is why its report to the Council is comprehensive and why the various sections—on the future of the institutions, changes to existing policies and guidelines for new ones—are equally important.

Because its suggestions will take time to produce results, the Commission proposes a transitional solution to prevent a recurrence of unacceptable situations within the Community.

The original political alliance and a comprehensive strategy for the future

1.2.4. In the introductory section, the Commission sets out the reasons compelling the Community to use its strength to loosen the external constraints that bind it. Two principles govern its future — solidarity and consistency. The Commission goes on to stress the importance of the institutions' working towards fulfilment of the political alliance entered into by each Member State when it signed the Treaties.

The Commission's report recognizes the importance of two pillars of the European venture—the single internal market and the

common agricultural policy—but in the face of the present problems considers that progress must be made in new areas to make up for lost time.

1.2.5. The Commission believes that a comprehensive Community strategy would open up new prospects for stable, long-term growth and fuller employment. This strategy would be built around the following framework:

(i) Consolidation of the zone of monetary stability which the Community is taking pains to construct, notably by making rapid progress towards a fully institutionalized European Monetary System.

(ii) Development of a modern and dynamic European industry based on full exploitation of the economies of scale and the security provided by a genuine internal market, and on industrial strategies substituting Community cooperation for fragmented and isolated national policies.

(iii) Production of energy, particularly new forms of energy, which with the industries involved in developing them offer an unparalleled opportunity for growth and employment, and a means of reducing the cost of imports. The Commission intends to propose that precise targets be set to achieve energy savings, to diversify production and to provide the necessary infrastructure. To finance these measures, better coordination of national financial resources and more money from the Community are a must.

(iv) An original and probably unique Community contribution to the development of new industries and technologies and an active competition policy to serve as a source of coordination and economic convergence.

1.2.6. Finally, the Commission considers that there will be no expansion of Community activities as long as the Community budget remains artificially hamstrung by the current limit on resources.

'Putting its budgetary house in order'

1.2.7. The Commission believes that Europe cannot make a new start until it puts its house in order—in other words, until it solves its budgetary problems.

Agriculture structures

1.2.8. The Commission reviews the main areas of Community activity—the common agricultural policy, regional policy, social policy, borrowing and lending—and comes up with precise guidelines which would allow rapid Community action in these areas.

1.2.9. For agriculture the Commission advocates action based essentially on the following principles:

(i) A price policy based on a narrowing of the gap between Community prices and prices applied by its main competitors and a hierarchy of prices designed to improve the balance of production. A corollary to this would be an active export policy designed to stabilize world prices at a more satisfactory level. This would involve the signing of long-term export contracts, which would, in turn, encourage the emergence of a strong, well-organized agri-food industry.

(ii) The fixing of a production target for each product which would reflect the degree of self-sufficiency of the volume of exports desired. Arrangements to contain output would vary from product to product. The possibilities include a system resembling that now in operation for sugar, payment of a reduced intervention price above a certain threshold (for cereals for instance), and extension of the co-responsibility principle (for milk products for instance).

(iii) The introduction of income subsidies in certain circumstances for small producers. The problems facing the Mediterranean area, precisely because of the dominance of agriculture in its economy, come in for special attention. Market and structural policies can help, but they cannot deal single-handed with a set of problems which reflect a specific economic context. This is why the Commission is planning to propose medium-term Community programmes combining measures to tackle incomes, markets, production and structures. These would be devised in close collaboration with the Member States concerned to allow incorporation of national and regional objectives. These programmes, which would harness the Community's agricultural and financial instruments to one and the same task, could

be submitted to the Council and Parliament before the end of 1982.

The Commission believes that if these reforms to the common agricultural policy are carried through the growth rate of agricultural spending would fall below the growth rate of resources available to the Community.

1.2.10. On the regional and social fronts, the Community needs to spend more to better effect. The Commission proposes that Regional Fund assistance be concentrated on the most deprived areas, via integrated programmes, but not to the detriment of regions with declining industries. National measures taken to correct the regional disparities which persist in even prosperous Member States must accord with Community terms of reference.

In the social field, the Commission proposes to give priority to Community measures which top up national measures and thus ensure that the Social Fund is focused on areas where Community assistance will be more valuable and more effective than a combination of national measures or the duplication of national and Community measures. This instrument must also allow for the existing and foreseeable economic and social situation in the Community and be used in conjunction with other Community instruments particularly as regards structural policy. The Social Fund's resources must also be concentrated more specifically on job creation and vocational training, via comprehensive programmes, rather than individual projects.

1.2.11. The Commission is also proposing guidelines for improving the operation of the Community's borrowing and lending instruments.

Medium-term solution to the problem of the United Kingdom's contribution to the Community budget: a special financial mechanism

1.2.12. But the Commission feels that the package of agricultural and structural measures which it is proposing, albeit a step in the right direction, will take some time to bear fruit. This is why it is also proposing a

medium-term solution to ensure that the problem of fair returns for Member States does not deadlock the normal decision-making procedure.

After careful analysis, the Commission has decided not to propose a general financial mechanism. Instead it advocates a remedy to the problem caused by the pattern of production and consumption in the United Kingdom, which means that it benefits less than its partners from the common agricultural policy.

The Commission is proposing a special financial mechanism based on a demonstration of solidarity towards the United Kingdom by Member States more fortunate in this respect. Compensation for the United Kingdom would be assessed by comparing its share of the Community's gross national product with the proportion it obtains of EAGGF Guarantee Section expenditure. As this compensation would be provided by the Community itself, it should be financed from the budget on the basis of the own resources system.

However, should this be rendered impracticable either by a delay in taking the decisions needed to create new own resources (exceeding the 1% limit on VAT) or by the current trend in budget expenditure, the Commission would envisage that consideration be given to a subsidiary measure by which the Member States which benefit more from the CAP than their British partner would demonstrate their solidarity. In practice, the compensation could be financed by Member States other than the United Kingdom via abatements on their receipts from the Community, based on the payments they receive under the EAGGF Guarantee Section. In establishing the abatement percentages, account should be taken of the proposals put forward by the Commission in this report, to the effect that Community policies must put emphasis on solidarity between the more prosperous Member States and the less prosperous (particularly Ireland, Greece and Italy).

The funds made available would be used to finance projects in the United Kingdom

which are in line with Community policies and designed to increase economic convergence.

Statement by the President of the Commission

1.2.13. Immediately after the report had been sent to the ten governments on 24 June, Mr Thorn gave a press conference at which he explained the main proposals in the report and the Commission's general approach.

1.2.14. Discussing the approach the Commission had taken, the President said:¹

'We decided to take the broad view, conscious that we were on the threshold of a second-generation Europe, called on to resolve a budgetary problem which, however real it is, must be seen against a backdrop that overshadows the whole debate, compelling us to give thought to the future of the Community. We felt that we had to draw attention to the rebirth of economic nationalism. ... We felt that we had to act to combat a bookkeeper's approach which was deforming the Community. ... We feel that we have to respond to the hopes of the new generation. ...'

1.2.15. On the common agricultural policy:

'We felt that the principles which we had been asked to respect were eminently worthy of such respect but that even so the CAP needed to be reviewed in the light of experience. ... We must have a prices policy based on a narrowing of the gap between Community prices and those charged in our major competitor countries. ... We mean to support a more active export policy. ... We mean to set production targets which take account of the market situation for each product. ... A key element is the modulation of guarantees. ... We feel that if the Member States follow us down this road, agricultural expenditure will grow less rapidly than own resources.'

1.2.16. On the structural funds:

'As regards the Regional Fund, we consider that the resources available to it are inadequate to combat the growing imbalances. ... At present the Regional Fund is too heavily concentrated on national objectives and does not take sufficient account of the Community dimension. ...'

We must scotch the idea that the Social Fund has a licence to print money. ... Not content with

proposing an increase in the resources available, we are determined to improve its operation, ... promote integrated programmes ... and switch the emphasis to job creation, rather than training and little else.'

1.2.17. On monetary matters:

'We feel that we must press ahead on the monetary front, using the EMS. ... We want stricter coordination, a larger role for the EMS, and the ECU as the hub of the system.'

1.2.18. Mr Thorn also announced formal proposals on the customs union, on energy saving and on industrial policy.

Finally, turning to institutional matters, the President declared:

'We intend to present proposals relating to the institutional balance and the functioning of the Community. ... We have undertaken to do this by 1 October. ...'

3. Joint Council meeting on economic and social affairs

1.3.1. A joint meeting of the Ministers of Economic Affairs, Finance and Social Affairs took place in Luxembourg on 11 June with Mr van der Stee, Minister of Finance of The Netherlands, in the chair.

Convened with some difficulty—mainly of a practical nature—in response to instructions from the European Council,¹ the meeting was given thorough preparation by the relevant Community bodies. The Commission played an active part in the preparatory phase through its communications and its contacts with the two sides of industry. The wide-ranging discussions at the joint Council meeting were described as fruitful by both the Presidency and Mr Richard, who noted the common concern of the Member States faced with mounting unemployment and the need to work out a consistent policy to combat both inflation and unemployment.

Commenting on the Commission paper approved the day before the meeting, which served as a basis for the Council's deliberations, Mr Ortoli emphasized the link between economic and social policies, which, he said, should be designed to improve the employment situation. At the same time, Mr Ortoli pointed out that it was the Community's business to coordinate national policies, finance—by means of the New Community Instrument for borrowing and lending²—in-

vestment projects related to energy and high technology and strengthen the internal market.

Mr Richard underlined the dramatic increase in unemployment (from 6 million in 1978 to nearly 9 million this year, rising to a possible 12 million in 1985) and pointed to industries where priority should be given to anti-inflation policies to promote economic recovery.

Conclusions of the President

1.3.2. At the close of the meeting Mr van der Stee drew the conclusions reproduced below, picking out a number of specific areas calling for action at Community level.

1.3.3. '1. In accordance with the instructions given by the European Council at its meeting in Maastricht, on 23 and 24 March 1981, the Council met in Luxembourg on 11 June 1981 attended by the Ministers of Economic Affairs, Finance and Social Affairs.

2. The representatives of the European employers' and workers' organizations were consulted during preparations for this meeting.

3. The Council unanimously expressed its concern over the rise in unemployment in the Community. The Council reached broad agreement on the analysis of the social and economic situation,

the major problems, and the possibility of achieving some improvement by means of a joint approach. There were no magic formulas to solve these problems, but the Council underlined the importance of action at Community level to complement measures taken by Member States on a continuing and long-term basis.

4. (a) The Council also agreed that the highest priority should be given to a consistent policy aimed at combating inflation and unemployment; it stressed the interaction between these two phenomena. The principal elements in the fight against unemployment were outlined by the Heads of State or Government at their meeting in Luxembourg as follows:

- (i) reduction of inflation rates;
- (ii) improvement in the competitiveness of firms;
- (iii) increasing investment to produce higher growth and job creation.

In this connection, particular stress was placed on the role which the Community, using the various Community instruments, might play in reducing structural unemployment, strengthening infrastructures and improving the economic and social situation of the least-developed regions.

(b) The Council recognized that, while Member States had many problems in common which should be tackled on a common basis, they were hampered in their endeavours to achieve lasting growth by constraints deriving from a variety of financial and economic imbalances—which affected the policies the Member States had to pursue. The Member States should therefore harmonize their policies as far as possible to help restore economic growth and create jobs.

(c) The Council welcomed the fact that the first signs of economic recovery were now apparent. However, this trend was still subject to considerable uncertainty, deriving in particular from interest rates which were high and subject to major fluctuations. A clearly defined and coordinated Community policy in this field implied that the Member States should create the prerequisites for a more desirable trend in interest rates.

(d) The Council was aware of the fact that the economic situation in the Community had international implications. On the one hand, this meant that there had to be intensive consultation with other industrial countries and efforts had to be continued to safeguard world trade against protectionist measures. On the other hand, no less attention should be paid to the position of the developing countries, which had suffered considerably from the present economic recession, and efforts to help these countries should not be relaxed. The continued development of these countries would contribute to any revival of the economy in the industrialized countries.

5. (a) The Council considered it necessary to encourage—through increased productivity—those investments aimed at strengthening structures, investments which create jobs and are economically defensible.

The Council was of the opinion that more should be done to achieve a shift in public spending towards investment and that a closer examination of this question was needed.

(b) The Council took the view that any strengthening of structures would depend to a considerable degree on innovation in products, production processes and services. It recommended in this connection that the right conditions should be created for increasing production capacity and developing activities with future potential. This would involve the gradual elimination of subsidies for activities which were no longer viable, on the understanding that the social consequences should be taken into account.

(c) The Council took the view that in encouraging investments so as to strengthen structures, particular attention should be paid not only to large-scale projects but also to the introduction of new products and the development of new technologies by small and medium-sized undertakings and the services sector.

(d) The Council also thought that in strengthening economic structures energy policy had an important role to play; in this context it recalled earlier communications by the Commission on this topic.

Both energy saving and the use of energy sources other than oil were of vital importance for employment and the balance of payments.

6. The Council noted that current economic difficulties were caused in particular by the inability of economies to adjust to economic changes. The Council therefore thought that a vigorous effort must be made to remedy this lack of flexibility, which stood in the way of adequate economic adjustment.

The Council thought that efforts should be made to deal with the various factors producing this lack of flexibility, in particular those affecting employment. Steps should accordingly be taken to increase mobility in the labour market and to improve vocational training. A study should also be undertaken on the inflexible way in which wages and incomes are distributed in the light of the negative effects which this could have on employment.

The Council noted that certain Member States regard action concerning working hours (part-time work, early retirement, the reduction of working hours, flexible retirement arrangements, etc.) as an important element in the fight against unem-

ployment. Experience gained from these initiatives could be of value to the Community, and possibly find expression in future policies.

The Council thought that there should be further study, taking particular account of the cost factor, with a view to maintaining the competitiveness of the Community *vis-à-vis* other industrialized countries.

7. The Council stressed the importance of social solidarity in our communal life. Nevertheless, in seeking to achieve such solidarity, realistic account should be taken of the slowdown in the growth of available resources.

8. The Council expressed deep concern about the continuing growth in unemployment affecting young people, women and other workers, which it regarded as a serious social problem. In this respect, greater attention should be paid to a better adaptation of education and vocational training to the requirements of the labour market, and in particular those resulting from the introduction of advanced technologies. The Council thought it of great importance that young people should be able during their training to gain experience in working life.

9. The Council considered the role which the Community might play, particularly in the following areas:

(a) improving procedures for coordinating Member States' economic policies, and in particular measures to combat inflation;

(b) extension of the New Community Instrument, which will be discussed by the Council meeting on economic and financial affairs on 15 June;

(c) revision of the European Social Fund, on which the Commission will shortly be submitting proposals; here the Council thought that greater priority should be given to measures on behalf of young people;

(d) an increase in the capital of the European Investment Bank, on which the Governors of the Bank are expected to take a decision on 15 June;

(e) a better coordination, and a more effective operation, of structural funds in general.

10. (a) The Council invited the Commission, in the light of these conclusions, to make appropriate proposals.

(b) There should be effective consultations with the two sides of industry in their respective fields.

(c) The Council, appropriately constituted, would consider the Commission's proposals.

If necessary, the Council would hold discussions at further joint meetings of the Ministers of Economic Affairs, Finance and Social Affairs.¹

4. Steel: agreement in the Council

1.4.1. Although agreement was reached at the Council meeting on 4 June to extend by one year the application of Article 58 of the ECSC Treaty to Category I steel products (coils), differences nevertheless emerged over the other crisis measures. At a subsequent meeting on 24 June the Council approved¹ a package of measures regarding the immediate and long-term future of the Community's steel industry.

These measures are threefold in scope:

(i) joint measures (price increases and controls, production and delivery quotas, etc.) to reinvigorate the market;

(ii) a new code of aids based on a strict timetable culminating in the elimination of official aid;

(iii) social measures relating to early retirement and short-time working.

The Council agreement marks a new stage in the crisis plan, set in motion in 1977, which has successively seen the fixing of 'forward programmes', subsequently accompanied by 'guidance prices' and 'minimum prices', followed in October 1980 by the introduction

of 'production quotas' under the state of 'manifest crisis' referred to in Article 58.¹

This new stage consists, by and large, in a new code of aids superseding the rules in force since 1 February 1980. This is intended to establish a precise link between aids and restructuring (the aids to be accompanied by the stabilization or reduction of production capacity), at the same time providing for the gradual reduction and eventual elimination of these aids.

The latest Council agreement is a broad agreement which, apart from the question of aids, covers market organization (statutory control of certain types of production, supervision extended to stockholders) and the 'social aspects'. The Council authorized a Community contribution to the allocations paid by the Member States under the restructuring programmes in respect of early retirement and short-time working. The Council agreed to make available under the ECSC budget an initial instalment of 50 million ECU to be financed from direct contributions by the Member States. The Commission, in a communication transmitted on 22 June restating the substance of its earlier papers, had calculated the financial requirements as 112 million ECU for 1981 and 100 million ECU for 1982-84; the Commission would make proposals for financing the balance.

In addition, as regards market organization, the Council has now agreed to extend the application of the quota system to concrete reinforcing bars and merchant bars. At the time of the meeting, the assent of the Council in respect of these products had not yet been requested by the Commission.²

To sum up, the Council agreement is a political agreement in that the Council, by expressing an opinion on the three aspects of the crisis measures, has demonstrated the solidarity of the Member States and their convergence of views in analysing the difficulties of the steel industry.

1.4.2. Once agreement had been reached, the Commission was able to act rapidly: on 24 June it adopted the Decision establishing a monitoring system and a new system of

production quotas in respect of certain goods,³ and on 3 July it extended this to include concrete reinforcing bars and merchant bars and issued a number of implementing measures.⁴

Points covered by the agreement

1.4.3. The main points of the statement issued at the end of the Council meeting are as follows:

Aids to the steel industry

'The Council reached agreement on the draft Commission Decision establishing common rules for aids to the steel industry, a new code on aids which covers both general and specific aids. It will apply until 31 December 1985.'

The new code determines the conditions which must be respected by public aids in order to be considered Community aids and therefore compatible with the orderly functioning of the common market. These aids may be put into effect only in accordance with the procedures established by the code.

The general conditions with which the aids must comply stipulate that:

- (i) the beneficiary undertaking or group of undertakings must be engaged in the implementation of a systematic and specific restructuring programme covering the various aspects of restructuring (modernization, reduction in capacity and, where necessary, financial restructuring), which is such as to restore its competitiveness and make it financially viable without aid in normal market conditions;
- (ii) the said restructuring programme must result in an overall reduction in the production capacity of the beneficiary undertaking or group of undertakings and must not increase capacity for the various categories of products for which there is not a growth market;
- (iii) the amount and intensity of the aids granted to steel undertakings must be progressively reduced;
- (iv) the aids in question must not result in competition being distorted and must not affect trading conditions to an extent contrary to the common interest.

The Decision also determines the specific conditions of compatibility for the various types of

aids, i.e. investment aids, aids for closures, aids to continued operation, emergency aids and aids for research and development. It lays down a timetable for the gradual cessation of all these types of aid, the main features of which are as follows:

- (i) all the aids which a Member State intends to grant must be notified to the Commission no later than 30 September 1982, save where exceptions are made. The State concerned may put its proposed measures into effect only with the approval of and subject to any conditions laid down by the Commission;
- (ii) the aids must be authorized by the Commission not later than 1 July 1983 and must not lead to aid payments after 31 December 1985, other than by way of interest rebates or of payments to honour the guarantees on loans disbursed prior to that date;
- (iii) investment aids will follow the abovementioned general timetable;
- (iv) aids for closures will in principle follow the general timetable, but should it not be possible to foresee such aids in programmes notified before 31 December 1982, they may exceptionally be notified to the Commission after this date and be granted after 1 July 1983;
- (v) aids to continued operation: their duration must be limited to a maximum of two years and they must not lead to payment after 31 December 1984; however, in exceptional and duly substantiated cases, this duration may be more than two years, without exceeding 31 December 1984;
- (vi) emergency aids to cope with acute social problems in the form of rescue measures for a maximum duration of six months; no emergency aids may be authorized after 31 December 1981;
- (vii) aids for research and development follow the general timetable.

The Decision also stipulates the conditions under which it may be amended subsequently, particularly in the light of any changes in the other Community policies concerning the iron and steel sector.

Furthermore, Article 12 of the code provides for the possibility of amending the deadlines in the aforementioned timetable. It stipulates that if, in the light of market trends and the price level for iron and steel products, the Commission considers that it is necessary to amend the prescribed deadlines, the Commission will request the unanimous assent of the Council.

If the Council has not acted unanimously within a period of two months from the Commission's

request, the assent is given by a qualified majority as provided for in the fourth paragraph of Article 28 of the Treaty for the purposes of applying Articles 78, 78b and 78d.

Finally, a derogation is provided for, under the same procedure as for the amendment of the deadlines, for special cases of non-specific aids in order to prevent undesirable consequences arising after 1 July 1983 from the application of the code.'

Social aspects

'The Council agreed that the Community could contribute, under Article 56(2)(b) of the ECSC Treaty, to the allowances paid by Member States under their steel industry restructuring programme in respect of early retirement (put into effect before the end of 1984) and short-time working (for the period until 30 June 1982).

In order to meet the financing needs which were estimated by the Commission at 112 million EUA in 1981 and 100 million EUA for 1982-84, the Council agreed to make available to the ECSC budget a sum of 50 million EUA to be financed by direct contributions from the Member States in accordance with an *ad hoc* scale already used for a similar measure during 1980. The Ministers also undertook to examine the Commission's additional requests in due course and in accordance with the appropriate arrangements.'

Pricing policy and quantitative restrictions

'In this area the Council, in addition to its assent to the extension for one year of the application of Article 58 to the products in Category I (hot-rolled coils and hot-rolled strip) and to the voluntary agreement for Categories II (reversing-mill plate and wide flats) and III (heavy structural sections), agreed to extend application of the compulsory quantitative restrictions under Article 58 for one year for reinforcing rods and merchant bars also (Categories V and VI).

On the other hand, as regards wire rods (Category IV), the Commission stated that a voluntary agreement between most producers had been arrived at on a trial basis and would apply for the third quarter of 1981. The Council noted that the Commission reserved the possibility of invoking Article 58, if need be, for this category also if the application of the voluntary agreement for these products did not fulfil expectations.

Finally, the Council agreed to a draft Commission Decision extending the measures for monitoring pricing rules to cover distributive undertakings.'

5. Assistance to refugees and displaced persons

1.5.1. The urgency and scale of the world's refugee problem, highlighted by the International Conference on Assistance for Refugees in Africa, which took place in Geneva on 9 and 10 April of this year,¹ prompted the Commission to transmit a communication to the Council examining the various aspects of this issue pending the presentation of detailed proposals.

At the Geneva Conference the representative of the Commission gave an account of its views and outlined the measures being taken at Community level. In the communication, sent to Parliament and the Council on 18 June—the text of which is reproduced (virtually in full) below—the Commission expands on these views and puts forward suggestions and guidelines designed to stimulate debate, following which it will present its formal proposals.

A major problem

1.5.2. 'The problem of refugees and displaced persons is an old one, but in recent years—mainly as a result of political events in South-East Asia, Afghanistan and the Horn of Africa—it has reached unparalleled proportions. At the start of the last decade, the number of refugees and displaced persons amounted, worldwide, to hundreds of thousands; now, in 1981, they are numbered in millions. The recent Geneva Conference (ICARA) drew attention to the presence of 5 million such people in Africa alone, and there are reported to be as many again in other parts of the world.'

The huge increase in numbers that has occurred in the last two or three years is reflected in the volume of assistance provided by donors. The Community, for example, gave USD 40 million worth of aid to refugees and displaced persons in 1975; four years later this figure had risen to USD 140 million, and at the Geneva Conference the Community and its Member States announced contributions totalling some USD 170 million for 1981 for Africa only.

The problem has not only grown in size, its real character has also changed in the past few years. Until quite recently, when voluntary repatriation was not possible, it was generally felt that installation in industrialized countries was the answer. For the majority of today's refugees, whether Kampuchean, Afghan or African, it is realized

that this solution is not feasible; their rural background and lack of formal education and technical skills do not make them fit for such a radical change of environment. They can only either return to their country of origin—whenever voluntary repatriation is feasible—or settle in neighbouring host countries (most of which are economically fragile), or remain permanently in camps—this last possibility being unacceptable from a humanitarian point of view and, moreover, politically dangerous.

The size and nature of the refugee problem therefore mean, not only that massive foreign aid is and will be needed each time a new flow of displaced persons occurs, but also that a large share of assistance should be devoted to long-term solutions, i.e. helping economically weak host countries to settle their refugee and displaced populations elsewhere than in camps (as is being done on a limited scale in the Sudan), or helping countries of origin to settle their returnees (as in Zimbabwe).

A complex issue

1.5.3. Over the past year or so, the growth of the refugee phenomenon has prompted closer analysis of it. At the political level, there have been several calls for preventive action: in May 1980 the European Council made "a vigorous appeal to the governments responsible for it to remove the causes of this widespread human tragedy"; later the same year, in the UN General Assembly, the Federal Republic of Germany called for closer political cooperation to eliminate the problem at its roots; and more recently, in Geneva, delegations from Africa, donor countries and from the Commission echoed that same sentiment.

At the administrative level, there is a growing realization that refugee situations pass—or should pass—through different stages requiring different forms of assistance. In the Commission's analysis—shared by other delegations at the Geneva Conference—three phases are recognizable:

a first, *emergency* phase immediately after an influx of refugees, when basic supplies (drugs, food, shelter, clothing, etc.) are needed at once;

a second, *subsistence* phase pending a durable solution, when a certain degree of education, training and local food production are needed as well as shelter, medical supplies and domestic utensils;

and a third, *settlement* phase when assistance for the development of both physical and social infrastructure in the host country (or country of origin, in the case of voluntary repatriation) is required, of benefit to the local as well as to the refugee population.

Institutionally and financially, the first two phases pose fewer problems than the third. The UNHCR has clear responsibility for emergency and subsistence assistance to refugees, and other agencies (WFP, Unicef, ICRC and a number of NGOs) have demonstrated their ability to implement emergency and subsistence aid programmes, while all major donors (including the Community) can cover in cash or kind the needs of refugees and displaced persons at these two stages.

For the third phase, however—settlement through “integration” upon return or in the host country—there is no one implementing agency with clear responsibility, nor any special financial support from donors. The first point was widely recognized at the Geneva Conference, where many delegations stressed the need for clarification of the role of the different humanitarian and development agencies at the settlement stage. The Conference indicated that this question would be discussed in detail within the United Nations family over the coming months, and concluded that the UNHCR and other UN and voluntary agencies should liaise closely with each other, and coordinate their policies and programmes, so that “medium and long-term assistance to refugees was not conceived on an *ad hoc* basis, nor assumed separately from ongoing development programmes”.

A response to the problem

1.5.4. Many African delegations to the Conference emphasized the very great importance they attach, in view of their own inadequate resources, to foreign assistance for refugee integration. This is an area where the Community as such is not equipped.

In food aid and emergency aid (Article 137 of Lomé II, Article 950 of the budget), the Com-

munity has the means to offer large-scale assistance to refugees and displaced persons during the emergency and subsistence phases. It can only help in a very modest way during the third phase, chiefly by cofinancing settlement projects implemented by non-governmental organizations (Article 945 of the budget).

The Geneva Conference made it clear that several African countries now sheltering refugee populations have the political will to absorb these refugees and have already made considerable sacrifices to help them. Their own development programmes have been slowed down as a result. It would be dangerous to expect them to make further sacrifices by diverting part of development aid destined for their own needy populations to refugee settlement projects. The risk involved would be that more and more developing countries would deny access to their territories for new refugees, and possibly try to expel those who had already arrived; pressures by nationals whose lives and future were directly affected by such a policy would gain strength and this could lead—as already noted in some areas—to politically and socially unacceptable conditions and tensions which could soon get out of control.

As far as the Community is concerned, it needs to be stressed that the resources of the European Development Fund and of the budget line for non-associated developing countries are intended for the development of the host countries themselves and their own populations, and should not be used as a means of financing durable solutions for refugees.

The Commission therefore considers that, in the absence of any current suitable form of Community financing, the choice is clear: either Member States agree to create a new Community aid specifically for this purpose, or they agree to provide new funds themselves for this third phase of the refugee problem, the task of the Community being limited to coordinating, in line with the Geneva Conference conclusions, such bilateral policies on refugee integration. The Commission feels the latter course would be preferable, provided the central responsibility for coordination at Community level was clearly defined.’

Operation of the EMS

Italian measures

2.1.1. On 27 May the Commission was informed of the decision which the Italian authorities has adopted that same day requiring a non-interest-bearing deposit, frozen for 90 days, to be lodged in respect of all foreign currency purchases during the next four months (payments relating to wheat and oil imports and a number of other transactions are exempt).

The Monetary Committee examined the measures at its meeting on 10 June. The Chairman presented the result of its deliberations to the Council on 15 June. At that meeting, the Council took note of the information and explanations given to it and of the procedure which the Commission intends to follow.

2.1.2. On 1 July the Commission transmitted to the Italian authorities a recommendation advocating certain economic policy measures.¹ In particular, the Commission recommends that the Italian Government:

'Urgently takes the necessary measures in order that public finances cease to constitute a permanent threat of disturbance for the short-term administration of the economy. To this end, it recommends:

- (i) that every effort be made to keep net domestic borrowing by the public sector in 1981 within the limit set (LIT 37 500 000 million),
- (ii) that by way of a first step towards the desirable establishment of the unity of the public sector treasury, the provisions which limit the ability of local and regional authorities to hold liquid assets in the banking system be applied strictly,
- (iii) that the practice of the Bank of Italy of buying at the time of issue treasury bonds and certificates not taken up by the banks or by the public be ended. This implies, firstly, that the level of interest rates applicable will henceforth be determined by the market, and secondly, that the treasury should endeavour to avoid too great an

instability in these rates, regularizing as far as possible its calls on the market and consequently the development of its deficit through the year.

Further to these urgent measures, the Commission recommends that the necessary provisions be adopted as quickly as possible to bring about a lasting improvement in public finance. In this context, attention should be focused on those required to guarantee full compliance with constitutional provisions prohibiting approval of new uncovered expenditure, a possible extension of the ability of local authorities to raise taxes, a reduction of the upward pressure on certain charges brought about through automatic mechanisms, an improvement of administration and knowledge of budgetary flows, and the establishment of a single treasury service for the public sector.

The Commission recommends furthermore that the Government of the Italian Republic pay particular attention to the risk that inflationary impulses resulting from the public sector deficit may set in motion a new intensification of the price and cost spiral through the mechanism of variable pay scales and the renewal of a number of important collective agreements. The Commission notes that the present framing of credit policy is in principle relatively strict.

But it considers it a matter of some urgency that the efforts undertaken by the Government of the Italian Republic, in accord with the social partners, to define and implement a policy of voluntary reduction in the rate of increase in nominal incomes reach a satisfactory outcome. The Commission considers that such a policy is essential in order to ensure the competitiveness of the economy and in consequence the stability of the exchange rate and the disappearance of the underlying propensity of exchange markets to anticipate its depreciation...²

Finally, the Commission states that it will:

'Follow closely the development of the economic situation in Italy and carefully monitor the application of the measures taken on 27 May 1981. It considers in any event that 1 October, the date on which these holding measures are to terminate, constitutes a maximum time limit and that efforts should be made to shorten this period. It reserves the right to intervene at any time, in accordance with the provisions of the Treaty, in order that any modification which may be judged necessary may be made with regard to the scope and duration of the measures.'²

Economic situation

2.1.3. The economic situation was discussed on a number of occasions in June, within both Community and international bodies. At its meeting on 29 and 30 June the European Council carried out a detailed examination of the situation in the Community. The summary issued by the Presidency is published elsewhere in this issue.¹

2.1.4. In its communication to the European Council the Commission noted some signs of improvement in the economic situation in Europe and found that pressures on the world oil market were easing; interest-rate and exchange-rate trends on both sides of the Atlantic nevertheless gave cause for concern, and progress made in Europe in terms of the basic features of economic policy and the results achieved was unsatisfactory.

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2.1.5. During its June part-session, Parliament adopted a resolution on the restructuring of economic and monetary policies and another on measures to be taken at Community level in respect of the present economic and monetary situation and the repercussions of the dollar exchange-rate on the European economy.²

Monetary Committee

2.1.6. The Monetary Committee held its 271st meeting in Brussels on 10 June with Sir Kenneth Couzens, Vice-Chairman, in the chair. It looked into the protective measures adopted by the Italian authorities and also considered the problem of indexation and the financial aspects of North-South relations.

2.1.7. The Working Party on the Harmonization of Monetary Policy Instruments met in Basle on 1 and 2 June with Mr Kjaer in the chair; it continued its examination of the technical problems arising from the coexistence of monetary and exchange-rate objectives within the EMS, given the requirement that the EMS should achieve convergence in conditions of stability.

2.1.8. The Working Party on Capital Markets met in Brussels on 18 and 19 June with Mr Gryson in the chair; it reviewed international bond market trends and capital markets in the member countries.

Economic Policy Committee

2.1.9. The Economic Policy Committee met twice in June—on 25 June, in its reduced 'short-term' composition, to examine recent economic trends, the latest economic forecasts and various policy mix options; and on 30 June, in its reduced 'budgets' composition, to make preparations for the Council's second quarterly examination of the economic situation in the Community.

2.1.10. The Working Party on Public Finance held a further meeting on 29 June in preparation for the establishment of the 1982 budget guidelines.

Internal market and industrial affairs

State of the internal market

2.1.11. As a result of the economic crisis, progress towards establishing the internal market has been held up and the Member States are exhibiting increasingly pronounced tendencies to resort to protectionist measures. This is the point made in the Commission communication on the state of the internal market transmitted to the Council on 22 June. In view of the situation, the Commission requests the European Council to make a firm statement condemning national protectionism and calls on the Council to act swiftly in introducing the following measures:

(i) confirmation of the gentlemen's agreement on environmental protection³ and swift

adoption of the proposal for a Decision to improve the 1969 standstill and information procedure¹ in the field of technical standards and regulations, transmitted to the Council on 25 August 1980;²

(ii) simplification of frontier formalities, particularly with regard to goods which are subject only to VAT, and customs documents;

(iii) improvement of the legal environment of companies: one of the priority tasks here is the adoption of the proposal on the consolidated annual accounts of groups, transmitted to the Council on 4 May 1976;³

(iv) need to reinforce commercial policy: 22 proposals for Directives are currently blocked in the Council because of the absence of a common position on the treatment of products originating in non-member countries;

(v) improvement of decision-making procedures in the Commission: Article 155 of the Treaty permits a simplified legislation process through the management and regulatory committees; this procedure has already been used frequently in the customs sector and in the course of adapting existing Directives to technical progress; the Commission has proposed that it also be extended to construction materials and measuring instruments,⁴ and the Council has been urged to speed up its work in this area.

Removal of technical barriers to trade

Industrial products

2.1.12. On 11 June the Commission proposed that the Council adapt to technical progress and to the other more recent Directives (Directive on dangerous substances of 18 September 1979⁵ and Directive on solvents of 22 July 1980⁶) its Directive of 7 November 1977 on the classification, packaging and labelling of paints, varnishes, printing inks, adhesives and similar products.⁷

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2.1.13. On 19 June Parliament approved⁸ a proposal for a Directive on wheeled ag-

ricultural or forestry tractors⁹ and a proposal for a Directive on methods of testing the biodegradability of anionic surfactants.¹⁰

Pharmaceuticals

2.1.14. On 24 June the Council formally adopted¹¹ the Directive amending its Directive of 12 December 1977 on the colouring matters which may be added to medicinal products,¹² which the Commission had transmitted to it on 28 September 1979.¹³

Free movement of persons and freedom to provide services

Mutual recognition of diplomas—Access to occupations

Dental practitioners

2.1.15. The Advisory Committee on the Training of Dental Practitioners, set up by the Council Decision of 25 July 1978,¹⁴ held its inaugural meeting in Brussels on 10 and 11 June. The Committee elected its chairman and two deputy chairmen and adopted its rules of procedure. It also set up a working party to study the training of specialized dental practitioners in the Member States.

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2.1.16. On 19 June Parliament delivered an opinion⁸ endorsing the proposal for a Di-

rective aimed at filling a gap in respect of established rights in the Directives relating to freedom of movement for doctors, nurses responsible for general care, dentists and veterinarians. This proposal had been transmitted by the Commission to the Council on 11 February.¹

Special rights of citizens and passport union

2.1.17. At the Council meeting held on 22 and 23 June the Representatives of the Governments of the Member States adopted a resolution providing for the introduction of a uniform passport in the several Member States.² Member States are to alter the appearance of their respective national passports by 31 December 1984 so that all of them will have in common a uniform format, their colour (lilac), and particulars on the cover in the following order: 'European Community', name of issuing State, symbol of issuing State. As regards the languages used page 1 is to bear the words 'European Community', 'issuing State' and 'passport' in all the Community languages. Particulars of the passport-holder, on the other hand, are to be shown in the official language(s) of the issuing State and in French and English in all cases.

Industry

Steel

2.1.18. At the Council meetings on steel held on 4 and 24 June a broad measure of agreement emerged with regard to price restraint within the Community, quantitative restrictions and the aids code. Significant progress was also made on the social aspects.³

2.1.19. The Commission swiftly introduced the necessary crisis measures: on 24 June it adopted a Decision establishing a monitoring system and a new system of production quotas for certain products,⁴ and on 3 July it enacted implementing measures.⁵

Production quotas

2.1.20. Fifteen actions were brought by various companies between 1 January and

30 June to rescind the production quotas authorized under the Commission Decision of 31 October 1980.⁶

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2.1.21. On 26 June the ECSC Consultative Committee gave its views on the proposed quantitative arrangements for the steel market (coils, concrete reinforcing bars and merchant bars) and on the new code of aids for the industry;⁷ effect can now be given to both these measures. The Committee also approved the draft Commission Decision laying down common rules on aids to the steel industry.

Automobiles

2.1.22. The European automobile industry must maintain its place in the front rank and keep its competitive edge by adjusting its industrial and commercial base, rationalizing its production apparatus, further developing its technological knowhow and improving its sales networks. These are the points made by the Commission in its assessment of the European automobile industry⁸ transmitted to the Council on 16 June. To achieve its objectives, the Commission envisages measures which will need to be developed along four lines:

- (i) strengthening the internal market, notably by continued harmonization in the fields of taxation and energy;
- (ii) encouraging structural development by the introduction of a system of retrospective monitoring of national aids and by efforts to improve productivity;
- (iii) making it easier to change jobs;

(iv) developing the dialogue with the Community's trading partners by a consistent commercial policy involving the rationalization and stabilization of commercial structures.

Industrial innovation and the information market

Exploitation of research results

2.1.23. From 10 to 12 June nearly 200 participants attended a meeting arranged by the Commission in Luxembourg to examine possible responses to a problem which must be solved if the Community's capacity for economic innovation is to be improved, namely the transfer and utilization of research results.

The discussions revealed that the steps which had already been taken to solve this problem in most of the Member States generally only concerned exploitation of the results of research financed at *national* level on behalf of *national* firms. The prospects offered by the application of such efforts at Community level were frequently ignored. It was recommended that the Commission should introduce measures to improve intra-Community exchange of research results by various means, particularly through specialized seminars.

Customs union

Common Customs Tariff

Nomenclature

2.1.24. The Commission adopted two Regulations to ensure uniform application of the Common Customs Tariff nomenclature. One of these amends the Regulation of 31 December 1979¹ in respect of the conditions governing the entry under CCT subheading 24.01 A of certain types of tobacco.² The other concerns the classification of forestry tractors (Timberjack) in subheading 87.01 B.³

Economic tariff matters

Tariff suspensions

2.1.25. On 11 June the Council adopted a Regulation temporarily suspending the autonomous CCT duties on a number of agricultural products.⁴

Tariff quotas

2.1.26. In June the Council adopted a number of Regulations opening, allocating and providing for the administration of Community tariff quotas for the following agricultural products:

fresh table grapes from Cyprus (1981);⁵ certain eels falling within CCT subheading ex 03.01 A II (1981/82);⁶ rum, arrack and tafia originating in the ACP States or the overseas countries and territories (1981/82);⁶ certain mountain animals falling within CCT subheading ex 01.02 A II b) (1981/82);⁷ certain wines from Morocco having a registered designation of origin (1981/82).⁶

2.1.27. The Council also adopted a number of Regulations concerning ferro-chromium⁸ and poly (*p*-phenyleneterephthalamide) yarns intended for use in the manufacture of tyres, falling within CCT subheading ex 51.01 (second half of 1981).⁷

Customs valuation

2.1.28. In compliance with its brief from the Council in connection with the basic Regulation of 28 May 1980 on the customs valuation of goods,⁹ the Commission

adopted a Regulation on 12 June establishing a system of simplified procedures for the determination of the customs value of certain imported perishable goods ranging over a total of 41 headings of fresh fruit and vegetables usually sold on consignment.¹ The unit values per 100 kg net, which are valid for two weeks, are to be established from now on by the Commission for the whole of the customs territory of the Community. They are calculated on the basis of the average unit prices recorded by the Member States in the various centres where these products are marketed in the Community. The entry into force of this new system meant that the national and Community fixed-rate average values, which had been extended until then, had to be repealed. The system is not compulsory.

2.1.29. On the same day the Commission adopted a Regulation¹ on customs valuation supplementing two points in the implementing provisions provided for by the Regulation of 11 June 1980.² The purpose of the first change is to specify the rules to be followed when some of the imported goods have been damaged or lost before entry into free circulation. The second settles the case of goods which are the subject of successive sales or which are put into circulation before valuation. In order to make the question quite clear, it was also necessary to point out that the buyer need satisfy no condition other than that of being a party to the contract of sale.

Origin of goods

2.1.30. On 11 June the Council adopted a Regulation³ amending the Regulation of 31 March 1978 on proof of origin for certain textile products falling within Chapter 51 or Chapters 53 to 62 of the CCT which are imported into the Community, and on the conditions for the acceptance of such proof.⁴ This Regulation reinforces the Community's means of fighting against fraud related to the origin of textile products by setting up an appropriate procedure for exchanges of information between Member States and between them and the Commission.

Competition

Restrictive practices, mergers and dominant positions: specific cases

Permissible forms of cooperation

2.1.31. On 18 June, acting under Article 66 of the ECSC Treaty, the Commission authorized the two Saarland steelmaking companies Dillinger Hüttenwerke and Stahlwerke Röchling-Burbach to set up jointly Roheisengesellschaft Saar mbH (Rogesa), with the object of producing pig iron and supplying it to the parent companies' steel furnaces.⁵ The Rogesa project is an important part of the restructuring plans for the steel industry in the Saarland. Its purpose is to concentrate all pig-iron production in the Saarland on one site (at Dillingen) in three modern blast furnaces, providing for an overall reduction in ironmaking capacity and at the same time for a considerable improvement in efficiency. The project is designed to help the Saarland steel industry to compete effectively against steelworks more favourably located on coastal sites, on larger waterways or nearer to principal markets.

After examining the project, the Commission concluded that it satisfies the tests for authorization laid down in Article 66. Dillingen and Röchling-Burbach are, however, financially linked with the large Sacilor and Arbed steelmaking groups. In order to ensure that the Dillingen/Sacilor and Röchling-Burbach/Arbed groups remain independent of each other on the steel market, i.e. beyond the ironmaking stage, the Commission imposed an obligation on the groups which prohibits personal interlocks between them (interlocking directorates, managerial links, etc.), except in the case of duly authorized joint ventures.

The Commission's decision is fully in line with its general policy in relation to restructuring in the steel industry, namely to en-

courage rationalization and cooperation which ensures better utilization of industrial complementarities (e.g. joint use of plant to avoid duplication), within the limits and the degree of flexibility allowed by Articles 65 and 66.

State aids

General aids

Federal Republic of Germany

2.1.32. On 10 June the Commission decided not to raise any objection to the introduction of a scheme of assistance, communicated by the Federal Republic under Article 93(3) of the EEC Treaty, for an investment programme relating to various sectors of the economy and focusing in particular on energy-saving. To help finance the programme, which is to be implemented by the Kreditanstalt für Wiederaufbau, the Federal Government proposes to issue an international loan together with the French Government, in which the Federal Republic's share would be DM 6 300 million. The proposed scheme is designed to promote investment by small and medium-sized firms in the saving of energy and raw materials, oil substitution and the development of new technology and products. The maximum amount of low-interest loans is DM 8 million per project, with the eligible proportion of investment limited to two thirds in the case of firms with an annual turnover of less than DM 50 million and to half in the case of those with an annual turnover of over DM 50 million. The loans will be for a maximum of 10 years, including a two-year grace period. The rate of interest for the portion of the investment financed by these funds will be 9.5%, thanks to an interest subsidy of about 2.5%. After scrutinizing the scheme the Commission concluded that:

- (i) the assistance in question is consistent with the Community's views on energy saving and substitution, the promotion of small business and research and development, and
- (ii) the intensity of the aid is not such as might distort competition.

The Commission nevertheless requested the Federal Government to communicate, for examination, the detailed administrative provisions for the implementation of the proposed scheme of assistance and a half-yearly report on the investment projects financed by the loans, featuring a breakdown by industry, region, size of firm and type of investment.

2.1.33. On 25 June the Commission also approved a scheme of assistance notified by the Federal Government to promote research and development projects by small and medium-sized firms in Bavaria. The projects are aimed at developing new products or manufacturing processes which are of clear technological and financial interest and which could not be implemented without subsidies because of the risks involved. The assistance would be in the form of grants of up to 40% of the project cost, or low-interest loans for up to 50% of the cost, non-repayable if the project is unsuccessful. The maximum amount of assistance is DM 200 000 for each project. The total cost of these measures is put at DM 3 million a year.

The Commission considered that this scheme merits the favourable treatment which it generally gives to research and development aids¹ and therefore qualifies for exemption under Article 92(3)(c) of the EEC Treaty.

Regional aids

France

2.1.34. On 12 June the Commission approved the request for a derogation from the principles of coordination of regional aid systems² submitted by the French Government in respect of special rural aid, one of its regional development aid instruments, pursuant to point 7 of the principles. Special rural aid is an employment premium designed to promote small businesses which create permanent jobs in certain rural areas of France where the demographic situation is particularly difficult.

When the Commission decided on the overall French regional development aid system in 1976,¹ it concluded that the special rural aid scheme was consistent with Article 92(3)(c) of the EEC Treaty, particularly because of its structural purpose, but reserved its position on the intensity of the aid, which could not at the time be measured in terms of net grant equivalent. The abovementioned principles of coordination now make such an assessment possible, and it was found that special rural aid to a firm could under no circumstances result in the job-based Community ceilings expressed in ECU being exceeded and that the supplementary investment-based ceilings could be exceeded only in the case of relatively small investments. It was also established from the reports on the implementation of special rural aid submitted by the French Government that the aid budget and the assisted programmes were very modest in scale. The Commission was accordingly able to withdraw its initial reservation and grant the derogation requested.

Ireland

2.1.35. On 24 June the Commission decided not to raise any objection to the Irish Government's plan to reduce from 45% to 10% the rate of tax on the profits of certain service-sector companies located at Shannon Airport. In its decision, the Commission took into account the importance of the Shannon jobs for the Mid-West region, the region's social and economic problems and the fact that the Irish Government had undertaken to comply with the Community aid ceilings and to apply the proposed measure only to initial investments.

Moreover, in accordance with the principles of coordination of regional aid systems,² tax aid granted in the category of regions which includes Ireland is subject to a specified ceiling applicable to any investment of over 3 million ECU. The ceiling was originally fixed with manufacturing industry in mind. The Commission therefore felt that, for the purposes of the services sector, it would be more appropriate to express it in terms of the number of jobs created rather than investment cost. It was accordingly decided to fix a ceiling of 50 new jobs for each project.

Industry aids

Community rules for aids to the steel industry

2.1.36. On 3 July the Council gave its assent³ to the Commission's draft Decision establishing Community rules for aids to the steel industry transmitted by the Commission on 26 May.⁴

Shipbuilding

2.1.37. On 3 June the Commission decided not to object to the extension of aid to shipbuilding in France. Under this scheme of assistance, production aid of up to 23% of the contract price of vessels built in large shipyards and 13% of the contract price of vessels built in small shipyards will be granted during 1981-82. These ceilings take into account the possible application of the price guarantee mechanism.

The Commission noted that the granting of the aid will be linked to the objective of restructuring the French shipbuilding industry, which will, in the long term at least, make the industry competitive and able to operate without aid.

The progressive reduction of the maximum rate of aid, which is now 23% of the contract price compared with 25% under the previous scheme, and the retention of a link with the restructuring of the industry constitute the essential criteria laid down in Article 6 of the Council's Fifth Directive of 28 April 1981.⁵

Aids to small business

Italy

2.1.38. On 19 June the Commission decided not to raise any objection to the enact-

ment of a bill in the Emilia-Romagna region notified by the Italian Government under Article 93(3) of the EEC Treaty, providing for aid to guarantee funds to facilitate the access of small and medium-sized firms to bank loans.

The regional authorities propose to provide financial assistance totalling LIT 1 500 million (1.3 million ECU), in three portions of LIT 500 million each for the years 1981, 1982 and 1983, to the small business guarantee funds. These funds, which are called 'Confidi' (Consorzi Fidi), have been set up by small and medium-sized firms grouped together in consortia or cooperatives; they intervene on behalf of member firms which are unable to repay a bank loan.

The Commission felt that this Italian measure will have the effect of facilitating access to loans for small businesses. As in the case of a similar Dutch aid scheme,¹ the Commission decided that the scheme qualified for exemption under Article 92(3)(c) of the Treaty.

United Kingdom

2.1.39. On 24 June the Commission decided to raise no objection to the implementation of a United Kingdom aid scheme, notified under Article 93(3) of the EEC Treaty, to promote the conversion of industrial boilers from fuel oil to coal, on the basis of Section 8 of the Industry Act 1972. The proposed programme is designed to help cut the energy costs of the firms concerned and at the same time reduce their dependence on oil. It is also designed to help maintain existing levels of output and employment in the coal industry. The aid is in the form of a grant of up to 25% of the net cost of a project, which must be at least UKL 25 000, with a ceiling of UKL 5 million for each project. Both agricultural and industrial firms are eligible for assistance. The total cost of the programme is estimated at UKL 50 million. Applications for assistance must be submitted before 31 March 1983.

The Commission had in the past given sympathetic consideration to aids for energy-saving under schemes introduced by The

Netherlands,² the Federal Republic of Germany,³ Denmark⁴ and the United Kingdom.⁵ It therefore felt that this project qualified for exemption under Article 92(3)(b) of the Treaty.

State monopolies of a commercial character

2.1.40. On 19 June Parliament adopted a resolution⁶ concerning the incompatibility of the French artificial insemination monopoly with the Treaty of Rome.

Financial institutions and taxation

Taxation

Indirect taxes

Turnover taxes

2.1.41. On 24 June, in the light of the opinions delivered by Parliament⁷ and by the Economic and Social Committee,⁸ the Commission amended its proposal for a Directive on exemption from VAT on the final importation of certain goods.⁹ The amendments amplify certain provisions in the original proposal, including those concerning exemption for goods imported for the benefit of disaster victims, samples, imports of small value, and severely damaged vehicles.

Excise duties

2.1.42. On 24 June the Council adopted,¹⁰ after obtaining Parliament's opinion,⁶ the

proposal for a further extension of the second stage in the harmonization of the structure of excise duties on cigarettes.¹

2.1.43. As Parliament had voted against the proposal for the transition to a third stage,² the Commission agreed to study the matter before Parliament delivered its opinion.³

Employment, education and social policy

Employment

2.1.44. Unemployment, directly or indirectly, was in the forefront of Community concern in June: the Council met twice to discuss the problem—the Ministers of Employment and Social Affairs alone on 10 June, and together with the Ministers of Finance and Economic Affairs the next day.⁴

2.1.45. The European Council, which met on 29 and 30 June, also devoted a good deal of its time to examining economic and social policies—as can be seen from the President's conclusions.⁵

2.1.46. On the more specific problems of employment in the steel industry, the Council agreed at its meeting on steel on 24 June that the Community could contribute to the allowances paid by Member States under their steel industry restructuring programme in respect of early retirement and short-time working.⁶

Labour market policy

2.1.47. A joint meeting of the Director-General for Employment and the Directors of Employment Services, held on 30 June, mainly covered questions relating to temporary work, forward employment management and cooperation between employment services.

Freedom of movement for workers

2.1.48. At a meeting on 30 June the Technical Committee on Freedom of Movement for Workers held a preliminary discussion

on the guidelines for the establishment of Community provisions in the field of temporary work and fixed-term contracts.

Readaptation aid for workers in the ECSC industries

2.1.49. In June, acting under Article 56(2)(b) of the ECSC Treaty, the Commission decided to contribute the equivalent of 9 883 250 ECU towards readaptation aid for 4 240 workers affected by steel industry closures and cutbacks in Belgium and the United Kingdom.

Education and vocational training

2.1.50. The Council and the Ministers of Education met in Luxembourg on 22 June with Mr Pais, Dutch Minister of Education and Science, in the chair. This was the sixth such meeting.⁷ The main effect of the meeting was to resume work in areas where there are no problems of jurisdiction and to determine the action to be taken at Community level.

The meeting was preceded by a preparatory meeting of the Education Committee, held on 16 June.

At the close of the Council meeting, the President drew the following main conclusions:

Summary of points made by the President at the meeting of the Council and the Minister of Education meeting within the Council, in the light of which the Commission is requested to put forward its ideas on future activity in this field

'The Council and the Ministers of Education meeting within the Council concentrated on the main challenges facing the education and training systems in the Community—that is to say, how

these systems should respond to employment problems in the 1980s at a time of rapid economic, social and technological change, and to the fall in the number of pupils and students following the almost universal drop in the birth rate since the early 1960s in a period of diminishing financial resources.

Education and training in relation to the employment situation in the European Community

The Council and the Ministers of Education expressed satisfaction at the conclusions of the joint Council meeting of Ministers of Economic Affairs, Finance and Social Affairs on 11 June 1981. They stressed the contribution education and training systems could make to strategies designed to promote growth and economic and social development while alleviating the serious social tension caused by unemployment. They stressed the urgent need to eliminate the inbuilt rigidities of education systems and search for an integrated approach to education, training and employment policies through closer cooperation not only with those responsible for employment, but also with parents, the two sides of industry and local employment offices...

The Council and the Ministers of Education expressed serious concern regarding the continued rise in unemployment among young people. Once again they stressed their undertaking to give all young people an opportunity to become familiar with the working world during their education and basic training. Special attention should be given to measures on behalf of girls, women and migrant workers' children.

4. While appreciating that a broad education and basic training is a fundamental individual right, they also agreed that the utmost priority should be given to increasing opportunities for continuing education and training. The expansion of training leave and the possibility of alternating education with on-the-job experience would make a vital contribution to ensuring equal access to the opportunities offered by society and to increasing the flexibility and mobility of the labour market. ...

The Council and the Ministers of Education decided to devote increased attention to a comparison of their policies and invited the Commission, in close cooperation with the Education Committee, to work out a suitable procedure for comparing experience and making recommendations in the following year on the following matters:

(i) methods to facilitate intensified cooperation and coordination between authorities responsible for education and other authorities with a view to promoting consistent policies in education, social affairs and economic affairs in the short and long term;

(ii) ways of increasing education and training opportunities for adults by exploiting the potential provided by the new information technologies and by extending access to (paid) training leave or other methods whereby adults could acquire a new skill.

They expressed satisfaction at the progress achieved in the Community pilot project programme aimed at ensuring the transition of young people from school to working life, and they requested the Commission, in liaison with the Education Committee, to submit recommendations at the end of 1981 on ways of deriving the greatest practical advantage from this programme in all the Member States. ...

In view of the need to develop collective ministerial responsibility for the abovementioned policy matters, the Council and the Ministers of Education emphasized their interest in the possibility of taking concerted action at Community level with Ministers of Employment and Social Affairs.'

Impact of demographic changes on education systems in the European Community

2.1.51. '1. The Ministers of Education meeting within the Council took note of the fact that in all the Member States except two, the drop in the birth rate would lead to a considerable decline in the number of pupils and students over the next five years.

2. They emphasized that it was their firm resolve to prevent any resultant decline in educational standards and as far as possible to seize the opportunity to improve them. They appreciated that the ways in which the Member States would take advantage of the situation would vary since the decline in pupil numbers was far from uniform either in extent or in timing.

3. They focused their attention in particular on the following points:

(i) changes in school population, in particular changes in composition (e.g. relative rise in the number of immigrant children);

(ii) implications for the teaching profession as regards initial and continuing training (bearing in mind the need for more extensive knowledge of the working world) and as regards status and working conditions in view of changes in the age structure;

(iii) the implications of rationalization measures on the size of institutions, renewal of school equipment, the teacher/pupil ratio, particularly in less-populated areas;

(iv) the varied financial impact of the successive stages of the population decline, depending on the level and type of education.

4. They instructed the Education Committee to determine procedures for making a further investigation of these points, with particular emphasis on the Eurydice network.

5. They believed it would be useful to organize symposia in the Member States to promote the exchange of views and experience on these topics by all those concerned.'

Mutual recognition of diplomas and certificates and periods of study

2.1.52. 'The Council and the Ministers of Education continued their close examination of the problems associated with the mutual recognition of diplomas and certificates and periods of study; discussion was based on a report prepared by the Education Committee.

They requested the Committee to continue its work in the light of the day's discussions, and bearing in mind the President's suggestions, and to make another report so that they could discuss the subject again at the next meeting, to be held in the first half of 1982.'

Cooperation on education

2.1.53. The Commission participated in the 12th meeting of the Standing Conference of European Ministers of Education held in Lisbon from 2 to 5 June, where the main topic of discussion was the education of two- to eight-year-olds. The Commission presented reports on the importance of pre-school education for young handicapped children and young migrants. The Standing Conference took note of the progress made in furthering educational cooperation between the various international organizations and the Community.

Eurydice

2.1.54. Another seminar on the education information network (Eurydice) took place in Luxembourg on 11 and 12 June. The seminars are held in each Member State in turn to foster the mutual understanding of education systems in the Community.

Specific action

Education and training of migrants

2.1.55. From 9 to 12 June a seminar on languages and migration was held in Berlin, jointly organized by the Commission and the European Centre for the Development of

Vocational Training. The aim of the seminar was to work out the preliminary details and basic features of a Community strategy on the language training of migrant workers. The proposals made related to the following areas: language training as a means of promoting the integration of migrant workers and adult members of their families into the social, cultural and economic life of the host country, facilitating access to employment and vocational training, and maintaining cultural identity.

Higher education

2.1.56. The Selection Panel for the Joint Study Programme Scheme met on 10 and 11 June. Out of 218 applications, 90 projects were selected for financial support by the Community in the 1981/82 academic year. The grants awarded totalled 240 000 ECU.

Education and training of the handicapped

2.1.57. On 18 and 19 June the Commission, as part of its contribution to the International Year of Disabled People, organized a seminar of representatives of the European Teachers Trade Union Committee on the education of handicapped children. The discussion, which focused especially on the question of integration, will serve as a basis for the Committee's future work.

Social security — Living and working conditions

Social protection and security

Paul Finet Foundation

2.1.58. On 26 June the Executive Committee of the Paul Finet Foundation examined 166 applications and awarded 125 grants totalling approximately BFR 1 320 000.

Migrant workers and their families

2.1.59. On 10 June the Council agreed to a number of amendments to the basic Regulations (Nos 1408/71 and 574/72¹) on the

application of social security schemes to migrant workers proposed by the Commission¹ in the light of past experience and changes in Member States' legislation.

Equal treatment for men and women

2.1.60. On 10 June the Council took note of a Commission report on the implementation of the principle of equal treatment for men and women² and drew the following main conclusions:

'[The Council] recognized the value of such a report, which contained much useful information on the present situation in the Member States as regards implementation of the principle of equal treatment. It considered that application of this principle should be assessed in the context of the Member States' own legal systems and structures.

Recalling Parliament's significant contribution to the consideration of problems affecting women in the European Community, the Council emphasized the considerable efforts made by the Member States to eliminate discrimination between men and women and noted that a satisfactory basis had been laid for future developments.

It further noted that Community action, particularly the Directives adopted by the Council on equal treatment for men and women, had made an effective contribution to the process, which should be continued in order to eliminate such discrimination as still remained and make good any omissions that might become apparent, and expressed the wish that efforts to achieve a more even balance between men and women at different levels of responsibility should be encouraged, particularly in Community bodies.

In conclusion, the Council invited the Member States and the Commission to cooperate actively in bringing about full implementation of the principle of equal treatment in the best possible conditions.'

2.1.61. The Commission participated in the International Labour Conference held in Geneva from 3 to 26 June. The Conference adopted a Convention and a Recommendation on equal opportunities and equal treatment for men and women workers: workers with family responsibilities. After ratification by the ILO Member States the two instruments will go far towards reconciling the demands of family and working life and the distribution of responsibilities between men and women workers.

Health and safety

Public health

2.1.62. An international meeting on health education, organized with the collaboration of the Commission, was held at Bergneustadt, in the Federal Republic of Germany, from 22 to 26 June. It was attended by some 50 participants from the Member States and other countries and provided an opportunity to make a critical analysis of the health education facilities available to the different groups of the population.

2.1.63. The Commission has published the proceedings of the international meeting held in July 1980 on the role of doctors in health education and the results of a study on nutritional education at school in the Community countries.

The topics covered by these two publications come within the framework of the Commission's health education activities:

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2.1.64. On 19 June Parliament approved³ the proposal for a Directive laying down basic standards for the health protection of workers and the general public against the dangers of microwave radiation.⁴

Health and safety (Euratom)

2.1.65. On 4 and 5 June the Commission held a briefing session in Luxembourg on the problems of applying the Euratom basic standards for the protection of the health of workers and the general public against the dangers arising from ionizing radiation, as updated by the Council Directive of 15 July 1980.⁵ As a result of this meeting, attended by more than 70 representatives from the Member States, an analysis was made of the

current status of legislation and organized supervision in the field of radiation protection.

Regional policy

Coordination and programmes

Regional Policy Committee

2.1.66. Meeting on 4 June, the Regional Policy Committee took note of the regional policy changes made by the Federal Republic of Germany (withdrawal of assisted area status from some areas and aid cuts) and by Greece (new demarcation of assisted areas and changes to development incentives).

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2.1.67. On 19 June Parliament adopted a resolution on the Community's regional policy and Northern Ireland.¹

Financial instruments

European Regional Development Fund

ERDF aid: second 1981 allocation

2.1.68. On 10 June the Commission approved the second allocation of grants for

1981 from the ERDF, totalling 201.05 million ECU. The grants will go to 335 projects (Table 1) costing a total of 1 542 170 000 ECU. The recipient Member States are Belgium, Denmark, the Federal Republic of Germany, Greece, Ireland, Italy and the United Kingdom.

Under the Regulation of 18 March 1975 establishing the ERDF,² as amended by the Regulations of 6 February 1979³ and 16 December 1980,⁴ the Fund Committee had endorsed these projects on 25 and 26 May.⁵ The Regional Policy Committee had been consulted beforehand on infrastructure projects costing more than 10 million ECU.

The total of 201.05 million ECU breaks down as follows:

- (a) 168.95 million ECU to help finance 230 infrastructure projects, comprising:
 - (i) 83.26 million ECU to finance 17 projects costing more than 10 million ECU each;
 - (ii) 83.61 million ECU to finance 201 projects costing less than 10 million ECU each;
 - (iii) 2.08 million ECU to finance 12 projects costing less than 10 million ECU each

in regions covered by the Directive on mountain and hill farming and farming in certain less-favoured areas.

The total cost of the infrastructure investment projects receiving assistance from the Fund amounts to 995.09 million ECU.

(b) 32.10 million ECU to help finance 105 projects in industrial (including small business) or service activities, comprising:

- (i) 11.41 million ECU to finance 6 projects costing more than 10 million ECU each;
- (ii) 20.69 million ECU to finance 99 projects costing less than 10 million ECU each.

The total cost of the industrial and services investment projects receiving assistance from the Fund amounts to 547.08 million ECU.

Including this second allocation, the Fund has so far financed 635 investment projects this year, for a total outlay of 555.10 million ECU. This brings the number of projects financed since the Fund was set up to 12 396 and total assistance granted to about 4 130 million ECU.

ERDF aid: non-quota section

2.1.69. The Commission also approved on 10 June the first four special programmes for specific Community regional development measures under the non-quota section of the ERDF. Two programmes are for the improvement of the economic and social situation of the border areas of Ireland and Northern Ireland; one programme is to strengthen the economic structures of southwest France (Aquitaine, Midi-Pyrénées, Languedoc-Roussillon); and the fourth programme is to improve the supply of energy in the mountain areas of the Mezzogiorno by developing hydroelectric power and alternative sources of energy.

The maximum contribution from the ERDF to the four programmes will be 95 million ECU over five years: 55 million ECU for the programme in France, 16 million for the programme in Ireland, 16 million for the one in Italy and 8 million for the one in the United Kingdom. Funds will be committed in annual instalments within the limits of the

budgetary appropriations for the non-quota section of the ERDF.

Conversion loans

2.1.70. In June the Commission paid out conversion loans¹ (Article 56 of the ECSC Treaty) to a total amount of 8.9 million ECU.

Environment and consumers

Environment

Council meeting

2.1.71. The Council met in Luxembourg on 11 June with Mr Ginjaar, Dutch Minister of Health and the Environment, in the chair to discuss environmental matters. The Council approved two measures put forward by the Commission — one to establish an inventory of ways of combating oil pollution of the sea, the other to make a compendium of the properties of oil.² The meeting gave Ministers an opportunity to identify the problems surrounding the two main proposals which were before them (major accident hazards due to certain industrial activities³ and discharges of mercury into the aquatic environment⁴) and also provided a forum for an initial policy debate on general aspects of the proposal concerning the assessment of the environmental effects of certain public and private development projects.⁵ Lastly, there was an exchange of views on the Commission communication on chlorofluorocarbons.⁶ The Council also took note of three statements concerning the reduction of exhaust emissions from motor vehicles, the relationship between environmental protection

and the level of employment, and lead pollution.

2.1.72. The Council formally adopted a Decision on the conclusion of the Geneva Convention on Long-Range Transboundary Air Pollution¹ at its 11 June meeting.

Prevention and reduction of pollution and nuisances

Freshwater and marine pollution

Oil spills at sea

2.1.73. On 11 June the Council approved in principle the Decision establishing a Community information system for preventing and combating pollution of the sea by oil.

This is the first implementing measure put forward by the Commission under the Council Resolution of 26 June 1978 setting up an action programme of the European Communities on the control and reduction of pollution caused by hydrocarbons discharged at sea² (action prompted by the wrecking of the *Amoco Cadiz*) and is a practical expression of the importance of improving the safety of sea transport and of combating marine oil pollution stressed by the European Council on a number of occasions. The programme calls for the setting up of an information system for preventing and combating pollution of this type. The Commission will be responsible for operating the system, which is designed to enable the Member States to improve the coordination and effectiveness of measures to deal with oil spills at sea; it will give Member States access to an inventory of ways of combating marine oil pollution and to a compendium of data on hydrocarbon properties.

Oslo and Paris Conventions

2.1.74. The Commission took part as an observer in the meeting of the Commission of the Oslo Convention for the Prevention of Marine Pollution by Dumping from Ships and Aircraft which was held in Brussels on 10 and 11 June. The meeting discussed measures to restrict the dumping at sea or the incineration of wastes.

2.1.75. The Commission also took part in a meeting of the Commission of the Paris Convention for the Prevention of Marine Pollution from Land-Based Sources which was held in Brussels from 17 to 19 June. Limit values applicable to discharges of mercury from chloralkali electrolysis plants were adopted. The Contracting Parties were also recommended to regulate the treatment of waste oils in accordance with the methods laid down in the Council Directive of 16 June 1975.³

2.1.76. This meeting was preceded on 15 and 16 June by a joint meeting of the Oslo and Paris Commissions in Brussels, at which the Commission was also represented; the meeting approved a report submitted by the Permanent Monitoring Group, and budgetary provisions were adopted.

Discharges of mercury into the aquatic environment

2.1.77. At its 11 June meeting the Council continued its discussion of the proposal for a Directive on the limit values and quality objectives for discharges of mercury by the chloralkali electrolysis industry,⁴ concentrating on the unresolved questions and in particular the measures applying to new establishments. At the close of the discussion the Council instructed the relevant committees to continue work on this topic.

Protection of the Rhine

2.1.78. Under the Convention on the Protection of the Rhine against Chemical Pollution, the Commission attended an informal ministerial meeting of the International Commission for the Protection of the Rhine against Pollution in Luxembourg on 10 June. The Ministers took note of the status of work on chloride in the Rhine. The Inter-

national Commission had been instructed by the ministerial conference held at Wassenaar, in The Netherlands, on 26 January¹ to study proposals concerning the shipping of salt by boat to the North Sea, the injection of salts into underground strata in Alsace and the supply of the soda works in Lorraine. They called on the International Commission to continue investigations into these various options and to find ways of cutting the excessively high costs estimated by the experts for some of them. They expressed their intention of taking a final decision on the matter at the next ministerial conference, to be held in Paris in November.

2.1.79. The Commission was also represented at the plenary session of the International Commission for the Protection of the Rhine against Pollution, held in Leiden, The Netherlands, on 25 and 26 June. The main decision to emerge from the meeting was to continue studies aimed at bringing about a significant reduction in the estimated cost of the various options for reducing chloride discharges into the Rhine.

Chemicals

Major accident hazards linked with certain industrial activities

2.1.80. On 11 June the Council discussed the difficulties remaining with regard to the proposal for a Directive on the major accident hazards deriving from certain industrial activities, often referred to as the Seveso Directive.²

Returning to the theme of its discussions at the meeting of 12 December 1980,³ the Council stressed the importance it attached to an early decision on this matter. In view of this concern, shared by all the delegations, it instructed the relevant committees to finalize the text—particularly with regard to public awareness and the information and consultation procedure between Member States concerned with transboundary hazards—so that a formal decision may be taken at the earliest opportunity.

Chlorofluorocarbons (CFCs) in the environment

2.1.81. The Council Decision of 26 March 1980 on the use of CFCs in aerosol containers⁴ represented the first stage of Community legislation in this field.

With a view to continuing the work of framing suitable legislation, the Council discussed the problems of CFCs in the environment on 11 June; basis for the discussion was a Commission communication transmitted on 1 June.⁵ At the end of the discussion the Council welcomed the Commission's intention to establish appropriate procedures and machinery for the exchange of scientific, technical, socio-economic and statistical information and to take action to regulate CFC emissions by those sectors of industry manufacturing plastic foams, refrigerants and solvents. The Council called on the Member States to collaborate closely with the Commission in providing it with information so that it may at an early opportunity put forward a proposal for a Decision on the preventive and precautionary measures to be taken by the Member States after 31 December 1981.

Protection and rational use of land, the environment and natural resources

Land

Environmental impact assessment

2.1.82. At its 11 June meeting the Council discussed the general aspects of the proposal for a Directive concerning the assessment of the environmental effects of certain public and private projects.⁶ The debate centred on who should bear the responsibility for carrying out the impact studies and informing the public and who should be responsible for

the transfrontier effects of a project; agreement was reached on the general guidelines for the future work of the Council.

Coastal erosion

2.1.83. On 19 June Parliament adopted a resolution on the problem of coastal erosion in the Community.¹

Agriculture

Council meetings

2.1.84. The Council held two meetings on agriculture—on 15 and 30 June—but failed to make any significant progress on the outstanding issues: sheepmeat (clawback),² cotton and hormones in stock-farming.

However, on 30 June it adopted the new rules for the common organization of the market in sugar and a number of provisions dealing with prices and related measures and the structural policy.

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2.1.85. On 17 June Parliament adopted a resolution on possible improvements to the common agricultural policy.³

Economic aspects of the common agricultural policy

Agrimonetary measures

2.1.86. The Commission has amended the method for calculating monetary compensatory amounts for certain composite food preparations in the pigmeat sector,⁴ thereby bringing it into line with the method used for fixing the refunds.

Situation with regard to holdings; agricultural incomes

2.1.87. On 17 June Parliament endorsed⁵ the proposal for a Regulation⁶ amending the basic Regulation setting up a farm accountancy data network.

Market organizations

Adjustment of basic Regulations

Sugar

2.1.88. On 30 June the Council formally adopted a Regulation reorganizing the markets in the sugar sector.⁶ This establishes common rules for five years beginning on 1 July 1981. The Commission had transmitted its proposal⁷ in September last year.

Prices and specific measures

Pigmeat

2.1.89. The Commission adopted a Regulation on 5 June aimed at encouraging sales of pigmeat products.⁴ The provisions of this Regulation take account of the probable medium-term market trend.

Fruit and vegetables

2.1.90. In June the Commission fixed certain prices for fruit and vegetables for the 1981/82 marketing year—namely the reference prices (and the offer prices applicable as regards Greece) for apples and pears⁸ and the minimum purchase and selling prices⁹ and the reference and offer prices for certain oranges.¹⁰

2.1.91. On 30 June the Council adopted a Regulation relating to imports of mushrooms.¹¹

Since this Regulation is to apply from 1 October only, the Commission decided to maintain for a further period of three months the protective measures applicable.¹²

Milk and milk products

2.1.92. On 24 June the Council laid down the general rules relating to measures designed to maintain the level of use of butter by certain categories of consumer and industry:¹ accordingly, despite the fall in intervention stocks, cheap butter will still be available to certain categories of consumer (mainly non-profit institutions and organizations, manufacturers of biscuits and pastry products, bakeries, etc.).

2.1.93. The Commission has increased the aid granted for skimmed-milk powder for use as feed² and for skimmed-milk powder processed into casein and caseinates.³

Beef and veal

2.1.94. On 12 June the Commission adopted rules² for the application of the system of premiums for maintaining suckler cows which was introduced by the Council in May.⁴

2.1.95. With regard to exports, the Commission has amended the special detailed rules governing the issue of export licences in the beef and veal sector.¹

Sheepmeat

2.1.96. On 30 June the Commission adopted transitional measures in respect of imports, during the period August to October 1981, of sheepmeat and goatmeat products from certain non-member countries; the aim is to allow countries which have not yet entered into negotiations with the Community to export such products on terms similar to those provided for in voluntary restraint agreements.⁵

Sugar

2.1.97. Under the new basic Regulation⁶ the Council laid down general rules concerning the system of minimum stocks in the sugar sector on 30 June.⁷

2.1.98. On the same date the Council fixed a number of prices for the 1981/82 marketing year.⁷

Structures

New measures and amendment of Directives

2.1.99. On 30 June the Council formally adopted⁸ the group of measures concerning structures which it had approved at its end-March meeting on farm prices.⁹

2.1.100. On 11 June the Commission transmitted to the Council a proposal for a Regulation on a special programme concerning drainage operations in the less-favoured areas of the west of Ireland.¹⁰

Agricultural legislation

Competition

2.1.101. Applying Articles 92 to 94 of the EEC Treaty, the Commission decided to make no comment at present on the following aid measures notified by:

Denmark: budgets drawn up for two agricultural funds, one of which is to finance certain measures to improve the quality of potatoes, and the other certain health protection and control measures for the pigmeat sector. The Commission may at a later date review the aid in respect of advertising under Article 93(1);

amendment to an aid measure in respect of certain collective irrigation and drainage projects not covered by the socio-structural Directives;

State guarantee and interest relief (for the first three years only) in respect of loans contracted by horticulturists for investment projects with a low level of energy consumption;

partial State guarantee in respect of certain loans for the installation of a collective system for the direct heating of hothouses with recovery of the heat;

deferred implementation of a variation of the taxes on chicks and eggs for hatching.¹

The Federal Republic of Germany (North Rhine-Westphalia): environmental subsidies, in particular for the creation of natural habitats for animals, such as lakes and ponds and birds' nests. The Commission takes the view that this measure does not constitute aid within the meaning of Article 92;

(Schleswig-Holstein): aid in respect of a campaign against salmonellosis in pigs;

(North Rhine-Westphalia): subsidies for the payment of compensation in respect of cattle affected by leucosis;

these last two measures are part of a nationwide compulsory campaign against livestock epizootics.

Italy (Venetia): subsidies to compensate silk-worm breeders for the damage caused by the exceptionally unfavourable weather conditions in the spring of 1979. The original scheme was altered by the Italian authorities further to a Commission opinion;

(Trento): bill introducing basic measures for farming for 1981-83, some of which are also covered by Community rules (EAGGF, socio-structural Directives and competition). Most of the measures concern the improvement and development of stockfarming, horticulture, fruit and flower production, forestry, irrigation, the major Mediterranean crops, wine-growing and the improved exploitation of hill and mountain areas. However, the Commission took account of additional information and undertakings given by the Italian authorities. The Commission will comment on the operating loans under Article 93(1) at a later stage;

(Campania): bill concerning aid for farms affected by the earthquake in November 1980; this provides for partial compensation to farmers whose crops, herds and holdings in

general suffered severe damage as a result of the earthquake. The Commission regards these measures as compatible with the common market since they are intended to offset damage caused by natural disasters.

The United Kingdom (Northern Ireland): aid to encourage the drinking of milk; the aid is not restricted to milk of a particular origin; aid, for a period of one year, to help horticulturists change over to systems of production which consume less energy. This is being introduced together with structural measures under a general conversion plan.

The Commission has established that the measures are in keeping with its guidelines for the granting of aid.

2.1.102. The Commission also decided to initiate the Article 93(2) procedure in respect of the following measures envisaged by France: special aid to sheepmeat producers, variable and flat-rate premiums for producer groups in respect of the slaughter of sheep and, in the pigmeat sector, the supply of duty-free grain for the manufacture of feed, aid for pig producers and loans to equalization funds.

Such measures are not compatible with the operation of the common market and are contrary to the rules laid down in the common organizations of the markets.

European Agricultural Guidance and Guarantee Fund

Guidance Section

EAGGF aid (first instalment 1981)

2.1.103. Under the Council Regulation of 15 February 1977 on common measures to improve the conditions under which agricultural products are processed and marketed,² the Commission adopted on 30 June a number of decisions on aid from the EAGGF Guidance Section: 239 projects received aid

totalling 84.2 million ECU; 39 of these, located in Mediterranean areas of the Community, received aid of 25.6 million ECU, and six projects located in the west of Ireland received aid of 3.7 million ECU.

In the case of the Mediterranean and west of Ireland projects, aid from the Guidance Section is worth up to 50% of the eligible cost of the investment. The breakdown by Member State is shown in Table 2.

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2.1.104. Under the Council Regulation of 14 February 1979 establishing a common measure for forestry in certain Mediterranean areas of the Community,¹ the Commission adopted on 30 June a number of de-

cisions covering ten special French and Italian projects totalling 43.1 million ECU, as follows:

Reimbursements to Member States

2.1.105. During the first three months of 1981, Belgium, France, Ireland and Luxembourg together received about 9.2 million ECU from the EAGGF Guidance Section for expenditure incurred in 1980 and advances for 1981 in respect of indirect measures concerning in particular drainage operations in the less-favoured areas of the west of Ireland and the Directive on mountain and hill farming and farming in certain less-favoured areas.

2.1.106. The criteria for 1981 for the choice of projects to be financed under the Regulation of 15 February 1977 have been published by the Commission.¹ These criteria are used for choosing, from among the applications for aid submitted to the Commission, the projects to be considered for EAGGF Guidance aid.

2.1.107. On 17 June the Commission adopted rules for the presentation and the content of the applications for EAGGF Guidance aid for special collective projects for the restructuring of vineyards.²

Fisheries

Resources

Internal aspects

2.1.108. Pending agreement on the common fisheries policy as a whole, the Council

has decided to extend until 31 October 1981 its Regulation of 30 September 1980 on technical measures to conserve fish stocks.³

2.1.109. The Commission has put forward an amendment to its proposal on 1981 TACs to take account of more up-to-date scientific data on the level of herring stocks west of Scotland, in the North Sea and in the English Channel.

2.1.110. On 10 June the Commission extended the approval it had already given on 17 February⁴ and 30 April⁵ to measures introduced by the United Kingdom to conserve fishery resources, having found them compatible with the implementation of the common fisheries policy.

These measures are:

- (1) the Sea Fish (Conservation) (Enforcement of Miscellaneous EEC Provisions) Regulations, 1980;
- (2) the Specified Sea Fish (Prohibition of Fishing Methods) Order, 1980;
- (3) the Fishing Nets Order, 1980.

2.1.111. Also on 10 June the Commission approved further extensions of two United Kingdom measures to ban certain sea fishery methods in United Kingdom waters off Northern Ireland.

2.1.112. On 23 June the Commission took note of four measures in The Netherlands to

extend a temporary catch quota arrangement during May and June. The Commission had no objections to raise; however, it did ask the Netherlands Government to give it an estimate as soon as practicable of the overall quantitative effect of these measures throughout 1981 so that it could judge their compatibility with its proposals on 1981 TACs. At the same time, the Commission made its final approval conditional on the proposed catch quotas taking account, for each of the species concerned, of the Netherlands' share of the 1981 TAC to be allotted among the Member States.

External aspects

Bilateral relations

2.1.113. On 1 June the Council adopted a definitive Regulation for 1981 granting access to the fishery zone of the Community to vessels flying the flag of Spain.¹ This Regulation implements the results of consultations held between the two parties pursuant to the Fisheries Agreement between Spain and the Community signed on 15 April 1980.²

2.1.114. Commission staff have conducted exploratory talks with Senegal concerning the provisional prolongation of the protocol to the Fisheries Agreement between Senegal and the Community, pending a decision concerning its renewal, and with Mauritania concerning the possible conclusion of a fishery agreement.

Multilateral relations

2.1.115. The Fisheries Commission of the Northwest Atlantic Fisheries Organization (NAFO) held a special meeting in Montreal on 25 and 26 June, following a Portuguese objection to the TAC for cod in NAFO sub-area 3M previously adopted. The Commission adopted a new TAC which commanded a consensus of approval among the Contracting Parties.

The Commission also adopted a Resolution calling upon the Spanish Government to ensure that Spanish vessels immediately cease fishing for cod in certain parts of the NAFO

regulatory area following reports of recurrent violations by Spanish vessels of NAFO conservation and enforcement regulations.

2.1.116. The Community participated as an observer at the meeting of representatives of the States party to the Gdansk Convention (concerning sea fisheries in the Baltic) held in Warsaw from 22 to 26 June. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss possible amendments to the Convention, including an amendment intended to provide the framework for Community accession to the Convention. The discussion was inconclusive and is to be resumed at a future meeting.

Markets and structures

Common organization of the market

2.1.117. On 9 February the Commission adopted protective measures against imports of carpet shell clams.³ Before the Regulation expired on 14 June, an arrangement was reached with Thailand, the main exporter of the product to the Community, the purpose of which was to set export conditions which would prevent a recurrence of the market disturbances in 1980 and early 1981 which had originally led the Commission to take action. The two sides found a mutually acceptable solution, the main feature of which was a price adjustment.

Structures

2.1.118. Under the Regulation of 15 February 1977 on common measures to improve the conditions under which agricultural and fishery products are processed and marketed,⁴ on 25 June⁵ the Commission approved two specific programmes put forward by the Governments of Ireland and the United Kingdom designed to develop the fish processing and marketing industry: a regional programme covering coastal areas in Ire-

land, with a total investment volume of IRL 29 million, and a programme covering coastal areas in England and Wales, with a total investment volume of UKL 50 million.

2.1.119. The Commission also decided on 30 June, under the same Regulation, to grant aid totalling about 4.9 million ECU from the EAGGF Guidance Section (as part

of the first instalment for 1981) for 18 investment projects in the fisheries sector.

Thirteen of these projects are to be financed from general appropriations, three from appropriations specifically earmarked for Mediterranean regions and two from appropriations for the west of Ireland; the breakdown is given in Table 3 below.

2.1.120. With regard to State aid, the Commission reaffirmed its decision of February 1981¹ and its consistent policy in such cases by opening the review procedure provided for in Article 93(2) of the EEC Treaty with respect to a proposal to renew and increase in 1981 the fuel subsidy which has been granted to fishermen in Sicily for several years.

The Commission also decided to initiate the Article 93(2) procedure with respect to the subsidies to owners of fishing vessels which the UK Government had introduced for 1980 and 1981. As in the case of the fuel subsidies, it considered that the aid had a direct effect on competition without contributing to the long-term development of the fisheries sector.

Transport

Inland transport

Links with Austria

2.1.121. On 19 June Parliament adopted a resolution on transport links with Austria,² and in particular on the Community's financial contribution towards the construction of a motorway.³

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2.1.122. Also on 19 June Parliament approved the proposal for a Decision setting

up an information and consultation procedure for relations and agreements with third countries in the field of transport by rail, road and inland waterway,¹ which the Commission sent to the Council on 19 December 1980.²

Infrastructures

2.1.123. Results to date have been encouraging as regards implementation of the Council Decision of 20 February 1978 instituting a consultation procedure and setting up a committee in the field of transport infrastructure.³ This emerges from a report sent to the Council and Parliament on 30 June, in which the Commission takes stock of the main developments and draws attention to the courses of action which it feels should be taken.

Infrastructure investments

2.1.124. Still under the same Decision,³ on 25 June the Commission informed the Member States of the results of the consultations that it held on 13 March on a number of motorway projects of which it had been notified by Luxembourg.

Infrastructure costs

2.1.125. In 1978 the nine Member States spent some 33 500 million EUA on inland transport infrastructures, or about 2.2% of their GDP. Nearly 75% of that total was spent on roads, just over 22% on railways and 3% on inland waterways, just as in 1977. This emerges from the eighth annual report on the accounting system for expenditure on and the utilization of transport infrastructures, sent to the Council by the Commission on 23 June as required by the Council Regulation of 4 June 1970.⁴

Investment's share of all infrastructure expenditure by the railways went up to 28%, as against 27% in 1977. On the other hand, it further decreased for road transport, from 56% in 1977 to 53% in 1978. In the case of inland waterways, investment's share remained stable at 56%. Infrastructure investment for all three modes of inland transport

over the reporting year accounted for 5.1% of all gross fixed capital formation in the Community. In 1977 it had stood at 5.3%.

Approximation of structures

Social conditions

2.1.126. On 19 June Parliament adopted a resolution on the harmonization of certain social measures relating to transport.⁵

Operation of the market

Market observation

2.1.127. On 19 June Parliament endorsed⁶ the Commission's amended proposal of 11 December 1980 for a Council Regulation concerning a system for observing the markets for the carriage of goods between the Member States by rail, road and inland waterway.⁶

Sea transport

2.1.128. The Commission addressed an Opinion⁷ to the Irish Government concerning the implementation of the Council Directives of 21 December 1978⁸ and of 6 December 1979⁹ concerning minimum requirements for certain tankers entering or leaving Community ports. Following examination of the documents that it had been sent, the Commission found that both Directives were being applied correctly in Ireland.

Energy

Formulating and implementing a Community energy policy

Council meeting

2.1.129. On 24 June the Council met in Luxembourg to hold a brief exchange of views on a number of questions relating to energy policy: mutual aid in respect of oil stocks when supplies are short, energy prices, substitution of coal for oil and, most important, investments in the energy sector and the role that they can play in economic recovery and industrial revival.

2.1.130. On the last of these points in particular, the press release issued after the meeting stated that:

'The Council emphasized the importance of a coordinated investment effort to reduce the Community's vulnerability in the energy sector and, in particular, to reshape demand.

While recognizing the inflationary effect which over-rapid investment might have, the Council nevertheless felt that high priority should be given to investment in the energy sector, accompanied by a suitable prices policy.

The Council noted that the Commission was to continue its sectoral analysis of the Member States' policies and of their effect (i) on the energy sector in general and (ii) on the rational use of energy and the diversification of energy sources in particular. This analysis would serve as a basis for Commission proposals aiming at tightening up the coordination of national financial support measures and providing facilities for financial contributions by the Community.'

Specific problems

Oil and gas

2.1.131. Also on 24 June the Council continued the discussion which it had begun in March on the prospects for mutual aid in respect of oil stocks at times of market tension.¹ The talks concentrated mainly on the procedure for setting a system of this type in motion, on the choice of suitable measures and on the question how far Community solidarity would be matched by similar solidarity with other major consumers. In con-

clusion, the Council invited the Commission to continue to discuss with the oil companies the role that they could play in such a system and to submit specific proposals without delay.

New sources of energy

2.1.132. Following a call for submission of projects under the Council Regulation of 12 June 1978 on the granting of financial support for projects to exploit alternative energy sources,² the Commission decided to grant support totalling 13 229 000 ECU towards 36 solar energy projects and a further 3 332 000 ECU towards 22 projects for using solar energy to heat swimming pools.

Research and development

Development of the common policy

Scientific and Technical Research Committee

2.1.133. The Scientific and Technical Research Committee (CREST), meeting on 11 and 12 June, voted in favour of the proposed multiannual (1982-85) research and development programme in the raw materials sector.³ The Committee stressed the advantages of Community action in this area of considerable strategic importance.

CREST also had an initial exchange of views on a draft sectoral programme in the field of medicine and public health.

European Research and Development Committee

2.1.134. The meeting of the European Research and Development Committee (CERD) held at Culham on 24 June was devoted mainly to ways and means of stimulating R & D in the Community. The Committee expressed its support for an incentive plan to permit the development of scientific and technical projects of a pre-industrial nature and stressed the urgent need for Community action.

CERD also examined the Commission proposal for a Community R & D programme in the field of science and technology for development.¹ While declaring its support for the proposal, the Committee nevertheless regretted the fact that it was restricted to agriculture and tropical medicine and stressed the importance which should be attached to training problems.

Multiannual research programmes

Joint Research Centre

Direct action

Remote sensing

2.1.135. The SAR-580 remote-sensing campaign,² involving 60 separate investigations over 40 land and sea sites, was launched in June.

During this campaign, data collected throughout Europe will be concerned mainly with mapping of icebergs and sea ice, classification of agricultural field types, investigation of a proposed motorway, research in geological mapping and mineral prospecting, monitoring traffic in the Straits of Dover and the effects of pollution both on forests and in the Mediterranean Sea.

Emergency situations in nuclear power plants

2.1.136. On 9 and 10 June a further workshop on assistance to operators of nuclear power plants in emergency situations was held at Ispra. Among the participants were specialists from the United States and Japan, and the meeting examined recent developments in these countries and in Europe.

The main subjects covered were operator qualification and training (notably the use of simulators), actual and advanced control rooms and human factors research.

Contract research and coordination

Indirect and concerted action

Raw materials

2.1.137. On 18 June the Commission transmitted to the Council a proposal for a

multiannual (1982-85) research and development programme in the raw materials sector.³ Under this proposal, in accordance with the recommendations made by the Council on 20 December 1979,⁴ all R & D activities in this area have been rearranged within a single sectoral programme. This programme is centred on the following three main areas:

- (i) primary raw materials (whether renewable or not): metals and mineral substances, uranium, ceramics, wood;
- (ii) secondary raw materials: recycling of industrial and municipal waste, recycling of non-ferrous metals;
- (iii) substitution.

Nuclear safety

2.1.138. The third edition of the 'Catalogue and classification of nuclear standards', prepared by the German Standards Institute (Deutsches Institut für Normung — DIN) under a contract with the Commission, has just been published. Information on the status of work, new projects, revisions, etc., has been carefully updated. The catalogue will be of considerable assistance in harmonization work on light-water reactor safety with regard to methodology, criteria, codes and standards.

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2.1.139. On 17 June Parliament approved,⁵ subject to a number of amendments, the proposal for a research and development programme involving an advanced machine-translation system.⁶

2. Enlargement and external relations

Preparations for the Ottawa Summit

2.2.1. The Commission played an active part in the preparations for the Western Economic Summit to be held in Ottawa on 20 and 21 July. Since the last quarter of 1980 the personal representatives of the participants at the Summit have met on four occasions, the President of the Commission being represented by Mr Spaak.

The European Council went into the preparatory work in some detail, as mentioned in the summary issued by the Presidency at the end of the meeting.¹

Enlargement and bilateral relations with applicant countries

Portugal

Accession negotiations

2.2.2. The 14th deputy-level meeting of the negotiations for Portugal's accession was held in Brussels on 26 June. The Community presented a statement on capital movements, and the Portuguese delegation presented statements on taxation, transport and the autonomous regions of Madeira and the Azores.

Spain

Accession negotiations

2.2.3. The 14th deputy-level meeting of the negotiations for Spain's accession was held in Brussels on 26 June. The Community delegation presented statements on transport, approximation of legislation and the production of a Spanish version of Community secondary legislation. The Spanish delegation presented statements on capital movements, economic and financial matters and secondary legislation (agriculture).

Bilateral relations

2.2.4. The EEC-Spain Joint Committee met in Brussels on 17 June. This meeting, which had been requested by the Community, provided an opportunity for taking stock of the matters relating to implementation of the 1970 Trade Agreement raised by the Community delegation in April. The major problem is still tax discrimination on imports into Spain.

Financial cooperation

2.2.5. Following the decision by the EIB Board of Governors in May,² the Council decided on 11 June to extend to Spain the Community's guarantee for loans from the EIB to non-member countries.

Commercial policy

EEC-US-Japanese relations

2.2.6. On 18 June the Commission produced a paper for the European Council meeting in Luxembourg concerning trade relations between the Community, the United States and Japan. The Community, emphasized the Commission, is faced with a crucial choice over imports—car imports, in particular—from Japan for 1982. The Commission feels that Japan's assertions that it is eager to do a deal with the Community if the latter speaks with a single voice mean that if the Ten cannot make up their mind to a common policy for Community-level arrangements with Japan, the Community's power to conduct joint negotiations will be lost as the Member States continue to carry on with their separate talks.

Implementing the common commercial policy

Import arrangements

Easing of restrictive measures

2.2.7. Under the Council Regulation of 4 December 1980 on import arrangements in respect of State-trading countries,¹ the Commission decided as an exceptional measure to open import quotas for the following products:

Federal Republic of Germany — Mongolia: pullovers and jackets of wool or of fine animal hair;

United Kingdom — Poland: hat-forms of felt.

Trade protection

Anti-dumping measures

2.2.8. The Council imposed a definitive anti-dumping duty on styrene monomer originating in the United States.² A provisional anti-dumping duty had been imposed³ and subsequently amended⁴ by the Commission.

2.2.9. The Commission imposed a provisional anti-dumping duty on paraxylene (*p*-xylene) originating in Puerto Rico, the United States and the US Virgin Islands, but repealed a national anti-dumping duty on imports into the United Kingdom of louvre doors originating in Taiwan imposed under the transitional provisions of the 1972 Act of Accession.⁵

2.2.10. The Commission also initiated anti-dumping proceedings concerning the following: imports of polypropylene film originating in Japan;⁶ certain refrigerators originating in Czechoslovakia, the German Democratic Republic, Hungary, Poland, Romania, the USSR and Yugoslavia;⁷ polyester/cotton sheets and pillow cases originating in the United States.⁸

In February the Commission initiated an anti-dumping proceeding concerning imports of fluid cracking catalysts originating in the

United States,⁹ but as a result of information received since the proceeding started the Commission has now amended the description of the product concerned.¹⁰

2.2.11. The Commission decided to accept undertakings offered by an exporter of tube and pipe joints of malleable cast iron originating in Brazil and terminate the anti-dumping proceeding¹¹ which it had initiated in September 1980.¹² It also accepted undertakings in connection with the anti-dumping proceeding concerning imports of ball and tapered roller bearings originating in Japan, Poland, Romania and the Soviet Union,¹³ thus terminating the proceeding initiated in September 1979.¹⁴ Lastly, the Commission decided to terminate the anti-dumping proceeding concerning imports of certain seamless tubes of non-alloy steels originating in Spain.¹⁵

Sectoral commercial policy measures

Iron and steel products

2.2.12. In compliance with the arrangements concluded with certain countries supplying ECSC steel products,¹⁶ the Commission held consultations with Finland (4 June), Poland (10 June), Austria (19 June) and Spain (22 June). The purpose of the consultations was to examine the implementation of the most important provisions of the arrangements, such as the need to comply with prices rules and the question of export trends.

Development

Council meeting

2.2.13. The Council held a meeting on development cooperation in Luxembourg on 22 June which was principally devoted to questions concerning the North-South Dialogue¹ and preparations for the Paris Conference on the Least-Developed Countries.

The Council also agreed on common conclusions with regard to the promotion of investment in the developing countries.²

North-South relations

2.2.14. In the light of the deliberations of the Development Ministers, the general Council meeting on 23 June saw an exhaustive exchange of views on questions concerning the North-South Dialogue. The Council stressed the need for a common approach to the forthcoming series of international meetings: the Western Economic Summit in Ottawa, the Nairobi Conference on New and Renewable Sources of Energy and the Paris Conference on the Least-Developed Countries. The Council considered that the Community should seek to contribute towards the vital task of making each of these meetings a success.

2.2.15. The European Council, which met in Luxembourg on 29 and 30 June, endorsed these various conclusions, as reported in the summary of proceedings issued by the Presidency.³

2.2.16. The Commission, in a communication to the European Council, has stressed the particular importance of three issues and the need for the Community's views on these to be shared by its western partners, the issues in question being the need for a multilateral level in the global North-South Dialogue, the launching of the global negotiations and the cooperation of the oil-producing countries in the development of developing countries' energy resources.

Commodities and world agreements

Cocoa

2.2.17. After numerous difficulties, the Council adopted a Decision on 30 June enabling the Community to deposit its instrument of provisional application of the 1980 International Cocoa Agreement.

Tin

Negotiations for the Sixth International Tin Agreement

2.2.18. The United Nations Conference on the Sixth International Tin Agreement closed on 26 June with the adoption of the definitive text of the next Agreement. During the four sessions of the Conference, totalling 14 weeks of negotiations, the Community and its Member States took an active part in the preparation of a new Agreement structurally designed to ensure a better balance of rights and obligations for all participants — producers and consumers alike.

The Agreement will be open for signature by governments from 1 August 1981 to 30 April 1982. Its entry into force, which is scheduled for 1 July 1982, would make it possible not only to pursue and strengthen cooperation between the Community and the ASEAN countries, the principal tin producers, but would also be a significant factor in the context of the North-South Dialogue. The entry into force, and subsequent viability, of the Agreement will depend to a large extent on the participation of the Community, the world's principal importer of tin.

Jute and jute products

2.2.19. The second negotiating session⁴ of the United Nations Conference on Jute—under the Unctad Integrated Programme for Commodities—closed without achieving to-

tal agreement on a new draft international agreement on jute and jute products. Thirty-three articles had already been agreed, and a compromise package on all outstanding issues covered in the remaining 16 articles, which was presented by the chairman on the last day of the two-week meeting, could have been accepted by all the parties to the negotiations with the exception of one of the main exporting countries.

This latter country was, however, unable to agree on the voting balance to be adopted among the exporting countries in the proposed new jute organization, and it also had difficulty in accepting the chairman's proposals relating to the voting system and criteria for project approval, the definition of cost reduction activities for the organization in the jute industry and the lack of any borrowing powers for the new Jute Council.

The Community (19% of net imports of jute and jute products) played a major role throughout the Conference, working closely with the chairman in an effort to achieve the necessary compromises. A third session will now be convened by the chairman, if possible in 1981, when the producers' voting problem has been satisfactorily resolved and when he is satisfied that the outstanding issues can be agreed by all.

2.2.20. The 16th session of the FAO Intergovernmental Group on Jute and Kenaf was held in Rome from 17 to 19 June.

After carrying out its regular review of the situation and outlook for jute and kenaf, and the synthetic substitutes competing with them, the Group agreed to recommend that Bangladesh maintain the indicative price for jute at the same level as in the past two years, despite the very depressed market conditions. The Group's similar recommendation for Thai kenaf was finally raised by USD 10 per tonne (3%) in view of the current strong export demand and increased domestic use of this fibre.¹

The Member States of the Community participated actively in the work of the Group and played a key role on the importers' side in the decision on these price recommendations.

Hard fibres

2.2.21. Despite substantial progress in 1980 on coir and abaca,² no further move towards the negotiating stage proved possible at the fifth preparatory session on hard fibres which took place in Geneva from 25 May to 5 June.

Although substantial differences on a number of major issues separated some of the main exporting countries, they were able to find common ground in general formulations based on maximalist interpretations of Unctad Resolution 93 (IV) and the text of the Common Fund Agreement, even though these were unacceptable to virtually all importing groups. The main problem areas dealt with without success related to the manner in which single-country and capital investment projects will be dealt with by any future international hard fibres body, that body's relationship to existing international agencies, the question of price stabilization and the voting system to be adopted within a hard fibres body.

Although some other matters could be agreed, the conclusions of the meeting call only for a further preparatory meeting at an appropriate time when prospects for a successful outcome exist.

Commercial, industrial, financial and technical cooperation

Investment in the developing countries

2.2.22. At its 22 June meeting the Council adopted the following conclusions with regard to investment in the developing countries:

'The general objective of non-discrimination must be taken into account when bilateral agreements on the protection of investments are negotiated under clauses contained in Community agreements. The bases to be adopted for guarding against discrimination may depend largely on the specific interests of the States concerned and on the present or foreseeable situation at any given time, particularly as the content of the relevant agreements is sometimes very varied.'

In this context, the Council deems it desirable for Member States to be able to exchange information among themselves and hold discussions with each other and with the Commission in order to identify problems of common interest. By this means it would also be possible to obtain a general view on problems likely to arise in relation to the promotion and protection of investments.

The Council accordingly agrees to provide that a Member State wishing to conclude an agreement on investment protection and promotion in the context of Community provisions on relations with developing countries may communicate its intention to the other Member States through the General Secretariat of the Council.

This information having been conveyed, an exchange of views within the Council's subordinate bodies may take place at the request of any Member State, concentrating mainly on the respective advantages of the existing agreements, to ensure optimal protection in the interest of the Member State making the request and the other Member States which may be concerned.

Once any Member State has begun negotiations which have been the subject of such an exchange of information, it shall communicate to the other Member States through the General Secretariat of the Council any further information it considers they should have.

At the end of these negotiations, it shall by the same means communicate the initialled text of the agreement reached as a result of the negotiations.

Each Member State shall inform its partners of any investment-protection agreement negotiated under clauses obtained in Community agreements.'

Aid to non-associated developing countries

2.2.23. The Commission approved the following projects and contributions as the fifth instalment of the 1980 programme of financial and technical aid to non-associated developing countries (budget Article 930):

India — Kerala anti-disaster shelters: 3 800 000 ECU;

Maldives — Improving health conditions: 500 000 ECU.

2.2.24. The Committee on Aid to Non-Associated Developing Countries, meeting on 15 June, delivered a favourable opinion on the following three projects constituting the first instalment of the 1981 programme:

Thailand — Seed production centre for the southern region: 2 200 000 ECU;

Pakistan — Emergency drinking water supply programme for areas with a refugee population: 2 700 000 ECU;

Member countries of ASEAN (regional project) — Scientific and technological cooperation programme: 2 800 000 ECU.

Cofinancing with the Arab Funds

2.2.25. On 4 and 5 June the Commission received a delegation comprising representatives of the Arab funds, banks and OPEC. The two sides reviewed the main projects that are already being cofinanced or are being considered for cofinancing by the Community and Arab development aid agencies. Two general subjects were also discussed: aid conditionality and project implementation procedures.

The talks revealed very considerable agreement on the issues raised and highlighted the steady increase in development projects jointly undertaken for the benefit of Third World countries. The two parties' resolve to collaborate fully, as voiced at the first high-level meeting held in Brussels in June 1980,¹ was thus confirmed.

Conference on New and Renewable Sources of Energy

2.2.26. From 8 to 26 June the Commission took part in New York in the proceedings of the Preparatory Committee for the United Nations Conference on New and Renewable Sources of Energy, which is to be held in Nairobi in August.

Food aid, emergency aid and exceptional aid

Aid to refugees

2.2.27. On 18 June the Commission transmitted a communication on increased Community assistance for refugees to the Council and Parliament.²

Exceptional aid

Emergency aid

2.2.28. On 4 June the Commission approved emergency aid (budget Article 950) of 150 000 ECU for the Salvadorian refugees in Nicaragua, to be implemented by the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees.

Relations with non-governmental organizations

2.2.29. For the first half of 1981 the Commission has committed 5 847 242 ECU to cofinance 67 projects in developing countries submitted by 50 NGOs.

The Commission has also contributed 156 540 ECU towards seven European public opinion information projects, including one undertaken by the NGO Liaison Committee.

International organizations and conferences

United Nations

United Nations Conference on Trade and Development

Secretary-General visits Commission

2.2.30. Mr Corea, Secretary-General of Unctad, accompanied by Mr MacIntyre, Deputy Secretary-General, and Mr Caulfield, Director in charge of the programme for the least-developed countries, paid an official visit to the Commission on 12 June.

Mr Corea met Mr Thorn and Mr Pisani, the Member of the Commission with special responsibility for development. Topics discussed included the Unctad Integrated Programme for Commodities, the Conference on the Least-Developed Countries, due to be held in Paris in September, and the North-South Dialogue.

Committee on Shipping

2.2.31. The Unctad Committee on Shipping, which met in Geneva from 27 May to 5 June, decided to organize an international conference to establish ways of gradually abolishing the open registry or 'flag of convenience' fleets.

Negotiations on commodities

2.2.32. The Community took part in Geneva in a further Unctad negotiating meeting on jute and jute products¹ and a preparatory meeting on hard fibres.²

Unido

2.2.33. The Community participated actively in the consultation on the petrochemical industry held in Istanbul from 22 to 26 June, which was attended by about 150 participants from 46 countries and 14 international organizations. The consultation was mainly devoted to considering the following two issues:

- (i) long-term arrangements for the development of the petrochemical industry in developing countries, including arrangements for marketing petrochemicals produced in developing countries;
- (ii) the Unido model form of agreement for licensing patents and knowhow in the petrochemical industry.

On the first issue, participants in the meeting examined various areas which might be covered by long-term arrangements, such as trade and marketing, financing, training, supplies of raw materials and feedstocks and barter arrangements, and recommended that the Unido Secretariat should do more work on the various forms of long-term arrangements in the light of the discussion. The meeting also recommended that the Secretariat should modify the existing general guidelines for joint venture investments in developing countries and adapt them to the requirements of the petrochemical industry and develop a programme of cooperation in

the petrochemical industry among developing countries.

On the second issue, participants examined the model form of agreement drawn up by the Secretariat and agreed that an expert group should prepare a revised document containing the views of both licensees and licensors.

FAO

2.2.34. The FAO Intergovernmental Group on Jute and Kenaf met in Rome from 17 to 19 June.¹

General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade

GATT Council

2.2.35. Meeting on 11 June, the Council heard a statement by the Italian delegation concerning the introduction of a compulsory deposit of 30% by value on purchases of foreign exchange and certain commercial transactions. It was stressed that this temporary measure was compatible with international undertakings and was non-discriminatory and the least injurious to Italy's trading partners.

The Community stated that the measure was at present being studied by the Community authorities.²

Committee on Technical Barriers to Trade

2.2.36. The Committee on Technical Barriers to Trade met in Geneva on 11 and 12 June. Among the points to be discussed was the question of technical assistance for developing countries in the standards field—in which the Community plays its part. The Committee also agreed to organize a meeting with officials from enquiry points set up in the Member States and in the Commission under the relevant agreement.

Subcommittee on Protective Measures taken by developed countries affecting exports from developing countries

2.2.37. Only a very limited number of notifications had been made to the Subcom-

mittee in relation to recent commercial measures in the Community. However, the Community did participate fully in the discussion of a number of developments in the commercial field highlighted by the GATT Secretariat as being of interest to developing countries.

Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development

OECD Council

2.2.38. The OECD Council met at ministerial level in Paris on 16 and 17 June. Reviewing the general economic situation, the Ministers found that a number of encouraging factors had emerged over the past year, notably hopeful signs that inflation was slowing down. At the same time they noted that exchange-rate fluctuations and the rise in United States interest rates were having adverse effects. Curbing inflation and reducing unemployment remained the Ministers' prime concern. In this context Mr Ortoli spoke of the Community's own difficulties and the steps taken to return to the path of growth.

With regard to international trade, the Ministers reaffirmed their determination to maintain and improve the open trading system, in line with the objectives of the declaration on trade policy which they adopted in 1980.³ Undertakings given in the multilateral trade negotiations would be fully implemented and ways would be sought of liberalizing trading conditions, including action in the fields least affected by earlier liberalization measures. Mr Thorn pointed out that the Community remained loyal to the GATT system and stated that, generally speaking, governments had held firm against protectionist pressures, despite difficulties in some sectors.

Turning to the matter of export credits, the Ministers regretted that agreement had not yet been reached on adapting the existing ar-

angement and urged that decisions be taken by the end of the year.

Referring to relations with the developing countries, Mr Thorn said that there was no alternative to the North-South Dialogue, which—particularly in the shape of the global negotiations—was essential in order to defuse tensions and lead to solutions of mutual interest. The Ministers also confirmed their commitment to cooperation with the developing countries. They agreed on the importance of further increases in official development assistance and, referring to the United Nations resolution on the global negotiations, declared their readiness to continue the consultations with the developing countries on a broad range of issues.

International Energy Agency

2.2.39. The Governing Board of the International Energy Agency met at ministerial level in Paris on 15 June; the Commission was represented by Mr Davignon. The Ministers discussed short-term oil market developments and measures to deal with any future disturbance. They also identified areas in which policies need to be strengthened (research and development and nuclear energy).

Industrialized countries

EFTA countries

Norway

2.2.40. Mr Haferkamp and Mr Frydenlund, the Norwegian Foreign Minister, met in Oslo on 26 June. Mr Haferkamp also met Mrs Gjestebø, Minister of Commerce and Shipping. The decision to hold high-level meetings between Norway and the Community had been taken in November 1980.¹

Following a comprehensive review of their economic relations, the two parties agreed that the free trade agreement between Norway and the Community was, overall, working satisfactorily. They also noted with satisfaction that cooperation over the last few

years had expanded into a large number of new important areas, including shipping, environment and consumer protection, energy, the North-South Dialogue, as well as economic and monetary policies.

The two parties agreed to develop further their cooperation through an exchange of letters establishing regular contacts on air, land and sea transport policy and through an exchange of views and information on industrial policy. The discussion of a number of international economic issues revealed a broad consensus of views. With regard to international trade, the need was reaffirmed to resist protectionist tendencies and to continue to integrate the developing countries into the multilateral trading system. Regarding the North-South Dialogue, stress was laid on the need for further efforts towards launching the global negotiations at an early date.

Sweden

2.2.41. Mr Haferkamp visited Sweden on 29 and 30 June for discussions with a Swedish delegation led by Mr Björn Molin, Minister of Commerce. This visit provided the opportunity to apply for the first time a new procedure, agreed in November 1980,² whereby one of the two annual meetings of the EEC-Sweden and ECSC-Sweden Joint Committees is replaced by a high-level meeting between the Swedish Government and the Commission.

The two parties found that the free trade agreements concluded between Sweden and the Community in 1972 were working satisfactorily and were valuable instruments for achieving their common objective: to promote economic cooperation in Europe and to withstand and combat protectionism. They expressed their interest in continuing to develop their cooperation pragmatically within the existing political framework and in identifying new areas where cooperation and contacts could be mutually advantageous.

Joint Committees

2.2.42. The Joint Committees set up under the agreements between the Community and the EFTA countries held meetings in June. They discussed the working of the various agreements and held a wide-ranging exchange of views on international economic problems and the steel market situation as well as on various bilateral trade questions. They also reaffirmed their interest in securing fuller and broader cooperation between the Community and the EFTA countries.

United States

2.2.43. Relations between the Community and the United States were the subject of an analysis by the Commission in preparation for the European Council meeting in Luxembourg.¹

Ad Hoc Study Group on Petrochemicals

2.2.44. The *Ad Hoc Study Group on Petrochemicals*, which met in Washington on 23 and 24 June, continued its study of the economic factors affecting the petrochemical industries. Progress was made on the elaboration of a common methodology for evaluating the cost advantages enjoyed by United States producers as a result of the American controls on natural gas prices.

Japan

Visits by the Prime Minister and Minister of International Trade and Industry

2.2.45. Mr Suzuki, the Prime Minister of Japan, accompanied by Mr Sonoda, the Foreign Minister, visited the Commission on 15 June and held discussions with Mr Thorn and other Members of the Commission. On 16 and 17 June Mr Tanaka, the Minister of International Trade and Industry, met Mr Thorn, Mr Haferkamp, Mr Davignon and Mr Richard for a further series of talks.

Commenting on these visits, Mr Thorn stated that they showed the Japanese Government's wish to strengthen EEC-Japan relations, an aim which the Commission fully shared. The Japanese ministers had indicated

their readiness to conduct affairs on a Community basis, though they pointed out that it was difficult to do so in areas where the Community had not yet adopted a uniform position. The Commission had stressed the economic and social problems currently facing the Community and the need to avoid an excessive concentration of Japanese exports in sensitive sectors, which made adjustment efforts more difficult and increased protectionist pressures.

In the course of discussions particularly concerned with the situation in the motor industry, the Japanese side acknowledged the extent of the programme of modernization and adjustment in which the European industry is now engaged. It was stated that Japanese car exports to the Community in 1981 would be moderate given the limitation of exports to the Benelux countries and the Federal Republic of Germany, the existing import restrictions in certain Member States and exchange-rate movements between the yen and European currencies. There would therefore be no diversion of Japanese cars to the Community as a result of the measures taken by Japan *vis-à-vis* the United States and Canada. It was agreed that Japan and the Commission would hold discussions in the autumn on the outlook for 1982.

2.2.46. At the Council meeting held on 23 June the Commission reported on the Japanese visits and also on: the results of the surveillance conducted on imports from Japan of cars, colour television sets and tubes and certain machine tools; the regular high-level consultations which took place on 27 May and 1 June; the possible forms of further action to promote Community exports to the Japanese market; and suggestions on the preparation of the Community position for the Ottawa Summit.

The Council, which took note of the Commission's overall report, agreed that contacts between the Community, the United States and Japan should continue. With regard to cars, the Commission would report to the Council following its exploratory talks with

the Japanese authorities. The Council expressed interest in the Commission's suggestions concerning common action to promote Community exports to the Japanese market—a matter which would be studied further. It was noted that Community surveillance of certain imports from Japan will continue.

2.2.47. These topics were also discussed by the Heads of State or Government at the Luxembourg European Council.¹

Mediterranean countries

Turkey

Association Council

2.2.48. At the request of the Turkish Government the EEC-Turkey Association Council met at ambassador level in Brussels on 5 June. The only substantive item on the agenda was the functioning of the Association Agreement.

During the meeting the Turkish representative gave an account of the political and economic situation in Turkey since the last meeting of the Association Council in December.² He referred to the decision taken by his Government on 25 March to speed up and intensify national preparations so that Turkey could apply for membership of the Community as soon as the parliamentary system was restored. The Turkish Government had accordingly decided to resume its obligations with regard to customs union in accordance with the Ankara Agreement and the Additional Protocol.

The Community representatives said they attached great weight to these statements, while reiterating the grave concern expressed on the subject last September.³

The Association Council then looked at the progress made on implementing the decisions taken at the meeting held on 30 June and 1 July 1980:⁴

- (i) Fourth Financial Protocol;⁵
- (ii) adaptation of Turkey's agricultural policy: the Community noted that the Turkish

Government had begun to prepare the ground for adapting its agricultural policy to the CAP at the appropriate time in accordance with given procedures;

(iii) implementation of the 75 million ECU special action: both delegations noted with satisfaction that this operation was progressing satisfactorily, the emphasis being on Turkey's energy priorities.

Fourth Financial Protocol

2.2.49. Negotiations on the fourth Financial Protocol which is to be annexed to the Association Agreement were completed on 19 June. This Protocol will make a total amount of 600 million ECU available for a five-year period expiring on 31 October 1986 and is intended to promote Turkey's economic and social development. The breakdown is as follows:

(i) 375 million ECU from Community budget funds, for investment projects. From this amount, 325 million ECU will be granted in the form of loans on special terms (40-year redemption period with a 10-year grace period and an interest rate of 1%) and 50 million ECU in the form of grants to finance cooperation;

(ii) 225 million ECU in loans from the European Investment Bank's own resources, for investment projects.

In the fourth Financial Protocol, the Community has increased its aid by about 94% over the third Financial Protocol. Moreover, by providing grants and better loan terms it has improved the quality of that aid.

Cyprus

2.2.50. The Protocol on the arrangements to be applied in 1981 in connection with the decision taken by the Association Council on 24 November 1980,⁶ making provision for the transition to the second stage of the EEC-Cyprus Association Agreement, will en-

ter into force on 1 July.¹ Ratification procedures for the Protocol, which was signed in March, were completed by the contracting parties in June, and Parliament gave a favourable opinion on 19 June.²

Malta

2.2.51. The third meeting of the EEC-Malta Association Council at ministerial level was held in Luxembourg on 22 June and was preceded by a meeting of the Association Committee on 11 June.

The Association Council meeting was devoted mainly to an exchange of views on the continuation of relations between the EEC and Malta, particularly with regard to finance and trade, and an examination of the problems connected with the extension of the first stage of the Agreement and the conclusion of a protocol to take into account the accession of Greece.

Maghreb

Morocco

2.2.52. A meeting of the EEC-Morocco Cooperation Council held in Brussels on 17 June reviewed developments under the main headings of the Cooperation Agreement: trade between the EEC and Morocco, including the textile arrangement; financial and technical cooperation (results of the First Financial Protocol and possibility of its renewal); implementation of the Agreement's social security provisions; consequences of enlargement of the Community.

Developing countries

ACP States and OCTs

ACP-EEC Conventions

Talks between the Commission and the Vice-Chairman of Ethiopia's Provisional Military Administrative Council

2.2.53. Mr Fisseha Desta, Vice-Chairman of the Provisional Military Adminis-

Council of Ethiopia, headed a 12-member delegation, including three Ministers, on an official visit to the Commission on 1 June. This was the first mission at such a senior level sent to Europe by Ethiopia since the military came to power in 1974.

Mr Fisseha Desta met Mr Thorn, to whom he gave a message from Chairman Mengistu, and Mr Pisani, the Member of the Commission with special responsibility for development; he also had a meeting with a number of other Members of the Commission.

With regard to cooperation with the Community, the Vice-Chairman said that he was fully satisfied with existing relations, although he would like the Community's action to be intensified so that the projects included in the indicative programme of aid under the fifth EDF could be speedily implemented.

Institutions

2.2.54. The ACP-EEC Committee of Ambassadors met in Brussels on 19 June to discuss certain outstanding problems, notably the Protocol on Greece's accession. Agreement was reached on a joint declaration to be annexed to the Protocol, which will be signed by the ACP States and subsequently ratified; in the meantime the existing trade arrangements will remain in force.

The discussions on the reduction of Stabex transfers for 1980, necessitated by the shortfall of funds in relation to applications, formed the main item on the agenda. The ambassadors, by virtue of powers delegated by the ACP-EEC Council of Ministers, decided that the rates of reduction to be applied to the least-developed ACP States *vis-à-vis* the other ACP States should be in the ratio of 1 to 1.3, it being understood that transfers of less than 1 million ECU will be exempt from any reduction. The ACP States have urged in this connection that consideration be given to whether additional resources can be made available, particularly on the Member States' side.

2.2.55. Under the auspices of the ACP-EEC Joint Committee, the 1981 consultation of business and labour representatives took place at ILO headquarters in Geneva on 1 and 2 June. This was the first consultation since the entry into force of the second Lomé Convention and was based on the legal framework newly set up by Article 175(7) of the Convention. This exchange of views was important because of the subject under discussion—integrated rural development—and also the importance attached to it by the representatives of the circles consulted and their declared wish to be more directly involved in future in the implementation of the new Lomé Convention. The many contributions to the discussions ranged over the priority to be given to the developing countries' self-sufficiency in food, the need for greater participation by the local population in the design and execution of projects and for more appropriate training in rural areas, the importance of microprojects, the effect of prices for agricultural products on production in the ACP States, food aid terms and, above all, the role of business and labour organizations in all these areas.

Export earnings

Stabex

2.2.56. The main problem, which was being held in abeyance until the meeting of the Committee of Ambassadors, was the scale of reduction for 1980 Stabex transfers.¹ The ACP States referred, in this context, to the possibility of additional resources being made available, particularly on the Member States' side. Meeting on 23 June, the Council (general matters) turned its attention to the problems posed by the operation of Stabex. Mr Pisani stated that the Commission was concerned at the major crisis mirrored in the 1980 figures and would play an active part in the examination that was called for.

European Development Fund

Financing decisions

2.2.57. Financing decisions taken by the Commission in June involved the allocation

of fourth and fifth EDF resources totalling 7 300 000 ECU to operations in the following sectors:

Asia

ASEAN countries

2.2.58. The President of the Council, Mr van der Klaauw, and Mr Haferkamp, Vice-President of the Commission, visited Manila on 19 and 20 June at the invitation of the ASEAN Foreign Ministers and attended the annual meeting between their hosts and the Foreign Ministers of ASEAN's principal partners in the Pacific region (United States, Japan, Canada, Australia and New Zealand).

The meeting, which was of an essentially political nature, dealt mainly with the question of Kampuchea and the Conference being arranged in New York by the United Nations Secretary-General on 13 July.

Thailand

2.2.59. On 1 and 2 June the Thai Minister of Agriculture met Mr Haferkamp and senior Commission officials responsible for the implementation of the Agreement initialled in November 1980 on the production, processing and marketing of manioc.

The Thai delegation described the efforts made in Thailand to meet the voluntary restraint objectives set out in the Agreement and the difficulties this was causing for Thai

producers. The Commission side, for its part, stated the Community's willingness to conclude the Agreement and to honour the commitments which it entails for the Community, and expressed its willingness to provide financial and technical support for the development and diversification of Thai agriculture.

India

Agreement for commercial and economic cooperation

2.2.60. On 23 June an Agreement for commercial and economic cooperation between the Community and India was signed in Luxembourg by Mr van der Klaauw, President of the Council, and Mr Haferkamp, Vice-President of the Commission, and by Mr Khurshed Alam Khan, India's Minister of State for Commerce.¹ The Agreement, which is to run for an initial period of five years, is non-preferential in scope and replaces the Commercial Cooperation Agreement of April 1974; it is intended to consolidate and strengthen relations, notably through the promotion of cooperation between business circles on both sides.

The objectives of the Agreement include cooperation in the transfer of technology, science, and the promotion and encouragement of investment, and a wide range of commercial activities; the Agreement recognizes India's development requirements and the changing nature of its relations with the Community; the new Joint Committee will be responsible for determining the various practical opportunities for cooperation. The new Agreement also contains a Protocol extending cooperation between the Community and India to the coal and steel sector.

Joint Committee

2.2.61. On 22 June, on the eve of the signing of the new Agreement, the EEC-India Joint Committee set up under the 1974 Agreement held its last meeting. It reviewed commercial cooperation activities during the life of the 1974 Agreement and highlighted the areas where closer cooperation would be needed in the future.

South Korea

2.2.62. From 1 to 4 June a Commission delegation visited Korea for talks with the Korean authorities, mainly with a view to improving and extending trade relations between the two sides and also to establish the custom of annual consultations. The Commission's particular intention in making this visit was to provide tangible evidence of the importance which the Community attaches to the region and of its conviction that opportunities exist for developing trade and cooperation with Korea.

With regard to trade (the Community has a trade deficit with Korea), the Koreans confirmed their authorities' intention to encourage the geographical diversification of their trade for the benefit of the Community. Such a move would have to be matched by an effort on the Community side.

Although the Korean authorities have taken major steps towards the progressive abolition of quantitative limits on imports, very high customs duties are still applied. The Community delegation requested that specific moves be made towards reducing these duties, particularly in product areas where Korean industry is well able to compete.

At the end of the talks it was proposed that annual high-level consultations be held alternately in Brussels and Seoul.

Latin America

Community-Latin America Dialogue

2.2.63. As part of the resumed Community-Latin America Dialogue, the first meeting took place in Brussels on 17 and 26 June between the Council authorities and Commission representatives and the Group of Latin American Heads of Mission (GRULA).

This meeting marked the resumption of contacts under a new procedure:¹ at the last meeting, dating back to June 1979,² it had been agreed to change the machinery. Work focused mainly on areas already discussed at Commission-GRULA level:³ EEC-Latin America trade and its prospects, notably the external effects of the common agricultural policy; international trade in textiles and the agreements in force, with particular reference to the renewal of the Multifibre Arrangement; cooperation on energy.

The Latin American side also made a statement on international economic policy, noting the Community's efforts in helping to reactivate the global negotiations in the context of the North-South Dialogue and stressing the fundamental part which the Ten can play in getting the global negotiations under way without delay.

Diplomatic relations

2.2.64. The President of the Council and the President of the Commission received Their Excellencies Mr Bora Rafajlovski and Mr Gabriel Ferrán de Alfaro, who presented their letters of credence as Head of the Mission of the Socialist Federal Republic of Yugoslavia and Spain respectively to the European Communities with effect from 23 June.³

The new ambassadors succeed Mr Bora Jevtic (Yugoslavia) and Mr Raimundo Bassols y Jacas (Spain).

European political cooperation

European Council

2.2.65. Meeting in Luxembourg on 29 and 30 June, the European Council adopted a declaration on Afghanistan. The Presidency's summary of the proceedings referred also to the Middle East, Lebanon, Kampuchea and Namibia.⁴

Ministerial meetings

2.2.66. At a political cooperation meeting held on the sidelines of the Council meeting of 22 and 23 June, the Foreign Ministers heard the President, Mr van der Klaauw, report on the results of his mission to the Middle East, which ended on 10 June with visits to Kuwait, Bahrain, the United Arab Emirates, Qatar and Oman.

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2.2.67. During its part session in Strasbourg from 15 to 19 June, Parliament adopted resolutions on three political cooperation issues—the Israeli raid on the Tamuz nuclear complex, the arrests in Czechoslovakia and abolition of the death penalty in the Community.⁵

3. Institutional and political matters

Institutional developments and European policy

Mandate of 30 May 1980

2.3.1. On 24 June the Commission sent the Council and the Heads of State or Government of the Member States its report in response to the mandate it received on 30 May 1980 to present proposals for structural changes and the development of Community policies.¹

Relations between the institutions

2.3.2. On 30 June the Council adopted a Decision on notification of the provisional application by the Community of the International Cocoa Agreement. This Decision was an institutional landmark, for the internal arrangements agreed between the Commission and the Council for the negotiation of international commodity agreements² were applied for the first time.

2.3.3. On 18 June Parliament passed a resolution on the Commission's powers of control over the collection of own resources.³

2.3.4. Under Parliament's new Rules of Procedure,⁴ the Commission for the first time suspended a proposal on which Parliament had been asked for its opinion.⁵

Ministerial meetings

2.3.5. An informal meeting of Ministers of Agriculture was held in Rotterdam on 1 and 2 June with Mr Gerrit Braks, the Dutch Minister, in the chair. The ministers held an initial general discussion on reform of the common agricultural policy.

Institutions and organs of the Communities

Parliament⁶

Strasbourg: 15 to 19 June

2.3.6. Coming between two Council meetings on steel, after the joint Council meeting

on economic affairs and social affairs, but before the European Council and before presentation of the Commission's report on the mandate of 30 May 1980, and at the end of The Netherlands' term in the Council chair, Parliament's June sittings were most of all an opportunity for the House to take stock and look towards the future of the Community. Parliament nevertheless did not forget to remind the Council and the Commission, as it now does at every opportunity, of how it intends to exercise its powers, particularly on budgetary issues. In a resolution passed by a very large majority it also came out in favour of abolishing the death penalty.

2.3.7. For the first time the Commission, under pressure from Parliament, has been forced to suspend one of its proposals, the House having blocked the procedure for adopting an opinion under its new Rules of Procedure⁴ by referring the proposal⁷ back to committee for review. Parliament's report had urged its total rejection.

The May mandate and the future of Europe (17 June)

2.3.8. Before the Commission presented its report as required by the mandate assigned to it by the Council on 30 May 1980,¹ Parliament, on the basis of two reports by Mr Giavazzi (*EPP/I*) and Mr Pfennig (*EPP/D*), considered the future of the budget and of the Community policies.

Mr Giavazzi stressed that if the mandate was to have any real meaning, it had to be interpreted as an invitation to present proposals for a root-and-branch overhaul of Community policies rather than a mere adjustment, in budgetary terms, of national positions. The common policies must help towards a greater convergence of economies. The budget must cater for actual needs instead of the needs being determined once the budget had been established.

Mr Pfennig, too, believed that the mandate called for more than just technical adjustment to the budget. It was not enough simply to reapportion present revenue and expenditure; priorities must be set and the Community's tasks defined.

Many of the members who took the floor expressed fears of not seeing the Commission carry out its mandate in the way both rapporteurs felt it should. Mr von Bismarck (*EPP/D*) summed up the general feeling when he said that the Commission must not be afraid to state some home truths: the Council lacked determination, the Member States were putting obstacles in the way of European union. If the Commission did not have the courage, then Parliament should dismiss it.

Speaking for the Commission, Mr Tugendhat said that the Commission fully supported the development of policies other than the agricultural policy, since this would help to reduce imbalances by a redistribution of resources within the Community.

Mr Thorn highlighted the ambiguity of the Commission's mandate, resulting, as it did, from a political compromise between the United Kingdom and the other Member States. The imbalances in the Community

stemmed mainly from a deficiency in Community spirit. The Community had been living on the too-easily-won success of its early years. Times were now harder, and it was up to Parliament and the Commission to get things going again. They must not 'put the Community on ice', as some were suggesting. The Commission's report² would be the beginning and not the end of a process for strengthening the Community.

At the end of the debate the House adopted both reports. An amendment was made to Mr Giavazzi's report which gives a clear political perspective to the Community's development: the House indicated that the decisions needed to attain the most pressing objectives could be taken only if all Member States accepted the principle that progress to European political union was irreversible.

Results of The Netherlands' Presidency (17 June)

2.3.9. As The Netherlands finished its six months in the Council chair, the President of the Council, on this occasion Mr van der Mei, Netherlands State Secretary for Foreign Affairs, made the customary end-of-term report.

His statement was not, on the whole, kindly received. The main targets of criticism were the breakdown of the fishery discussions, the lack of any concerted policy towards the United States and Japan and the failure to join with Parliament in an effort to find a solution to the problems connected with the budgetary procedure.

Mr van der Mei rebutted the charges. He spoke of the particular difficulties (economic and political) and of the constraints imposed by the Council's decision-making process. There had been several achievements: the joint Council meeting on economic and social affairs; the continuing European mission in the Middle East; the fixing of the farm prices within the deadlines; the decisions on steel.

Common agricultural policy (16 and 17 June)

2.3.10. Presenting his report, Sir Henry Plumb (*ED/UK*) stressed first that the present reduction of stocks in certain products usually in surplus in the Community was an essentially cyclical situation due to fluctuations in production throughout the world. Hence the still pressing need to make adjustments to the common agricultural policy. To safeguard the general principles of the policy the main thing was to reorientate the price policy, by hedging the price guarantees with a global Community quantum for each sector related to the targets established for production. Beyond that global quantum responsibility of producers would apply. Sir Henry went on to recommend the following measures: coordination of national aids; improvement in quality and quantity of food aid; voluntary agreements on imports of substitute products; energy saving in agriculture; creation of a rural fund, to create or encourage replacement activities in the poorer regions. In conclusion, Sir Henry maintained that while the present budgetary constraints could not be ignored, reform of the CAP ought not to be based solely on budgetary considerations.

When they took the floor, the spokesmen of the political groups or parliamentary committees largely endorsed Sir Henry's report. Mr Canbe (*Lib/F*) called for measures to promote exports, for which Mr Vitale (*Com/I*) and Mr Sutra (*Soc/F*) recommended long-term contracts with developing countries. Mr Lalor (*EPD/IRL*) urged that a tax be introduced on imports of oils and fats, and others called for an increase in food aid. But Mrs Castle (*Soc/UK*) and other Socialists wanted radical changes in the system. Mrs Castle felt that the policy of price guarantees must give way to direct support for the poorer farmers.

Many amendments were made to the original report, which, though not making any basic changes, laid still more emphasis on the interests of the developing countries (non-protectionist application of the principle of Community preference; no taxes on

imports of oils and fats and of substitute products).

The House passed the amended resolution by 147 votes to 76 with 33 abstentions.

Discharge for the Commission — Parliament's budgetary powers (18 June)

2.3.11. Mr Irmer (*Lib/D*) recommended that Parliament grant the Commission a discharge on implementation of the 1979 budget. He reminded the House that it had decided in 1979 to provide the means for implementing its policy plans by entering appropriations in the budget, and this had been the cause of the first clashes with the Council. But, complained Mr Irmer, the Commission had not taken Parliament's lead, claiming that there was 'no legal basis', i.e. no Council regulation. Turning to the implementation of the 1979 budget, Mr Irmer found that two thirds of the appropriations entered had not been used, notably in areas to which Parliament had attached importance. He also warned the Commission against a tendency to enter appropriations, knowing that they would not be spent for want of a Council regulation and thus treating them as possible reserves. The Commission, he concluded, must take Parliament's powers of discharge and its warnings seriously.

2.3.12. Mr Kellett-Bowman (*ED/UK*) presented two reports on the JRC's Ispra Establishment and the Computer Centre. He regretted the lack of transparency in the budgets of both.

2.3.13. Mr Gabert (*Soc/D*) broached the question of the Commission's supervisory powers in the collection of own resources by the Member States. He urged the Council to take a decision on the matter.

2.3.14. Presenting his report on the implementation of appropriations entered under the EAGGF Guarantee Section in 1979, Mr Dankert (*Soc/NL*) was sharply critical of the misuse of the procedure for granting advances.

2.3.15. For the Commission, Mr Tugendhat challenged the accusations that the Commission had made improper use of the possibility of transferring appropriations and pointed out that the Commission had made a great effort to use the appropriations entered in the budget. The 'legal basis' issue had to be resolved as part of a constructive dialogue between Parliament, the Council and the Commission.

Mr Key (*Soc/UK*) emphasized that the discharge granted to the Commission was linked to an undertaking by the Commission to do more to satisfy Parliament's desires. The failure to comply with the wishes that the House expressed in entering appropriations under certain headings could well lead to a motion of censure against the Commission.

With some slight amendments the reports by Mr Irmer, Mr Kellett-Bowman and Mr Gabert were all adopted. The House also approved Mr Dankert's report on the EAGGF Guarantee Section together with a number of amendments deplored the persistent use of procedures which were wasting Community funds and urged the Commission to report by 1 October 1981 on the steps it was planning to take to improve the system for granting advances.

Abolition of the death penalty (17 and 18 June)

2.3.16. On the basis of a report presented by Mrs Vayssade (*Soc/F*) Parliament passed a resolution in which it:

- '1. expresses its strong desire that the death penalty should be abolished throughout the Community;
2. invites the Member States to amend their legal provisions, where necessary, and to take active steps within the Committee of Ministers of the Council of Europe to ensure that the European Convention on Human Rights is amended accordingly;
3. hopes, with that end in view, that a wide-ranging debate on the abolition of the death penalty will take place within the competent national bodies and in the necessary spirit of calm consideration;
4. instructs its President to forward this resolution to the parliaments and governments of the

Member States and to the Council and Commission.'

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2.3.17. The House also issued opinions on the following Commission proposals:

- (i) economic policy guidelines for Greece for 1981;¹
- (ii) a Directive on wheeled agricultural and forestry tractors;²
- (iii) a Directive concerning methods of testing the biodegradability of anionic surfactants;³
- (iv) a Directive concerning mutual recognition of diplomas of doctors, nurses responsible for general care, dentists and veterinary surgeons;⁴
- (v) a Directive on taxes other than turnover taxes which affect the consumption of manufactured tobacco;⁵
- (vi) basic standards for the health protection of workers and the general public against the dangers of microwave radiation;⁶
- (vii) amendment of the Regulation setting up the Farm Accountancy Data Network;⁷
- (viii) the amended Commission proposal for a Regulation on a system for observing the markets for the carriage of goods between Member States;⁸
- (ix) an information and consultation procedure for relations and agreements with non-member countries in the field of transport;⁹
- (x) a research and development programme for a machine translation system of advanced design.¹⁰

2.3.18. The House also passed resolutions concerning:

- (i) measures to be taken at Community level in respect of the present economic and monetary situation and the repercussions of the dollar exchange rate on the European economy: the House considered that coordinated action must be taken and that the Community must advance to stage two of the European Monetary System;
- (ii) the incompatibility of the French artificial insemination monopoly with the Treaty of Rome;
- (iii) Community regional policy and Northern Ireland: the House suggested several measures to the Commission to promote the development of Northern Ireland;
- (iv) the floods in Lower Saxony;
- (v) the problem of coastal erosion in the Community: the House stressed the need to set up a European Environment Fund and urged the Commission to intensify and co-ordinate research efforts in the environment field;
- (vi) harmonization of social measures on transport: the House asked the Council to speed up its proceedings in this area;

(vii) relations with Austria in the transport sector and a Community contribution to the building of a motorway.

2.3.19. In the field of political cooperation Parliament also passed resolutions on:

- (i) the recent arrests of Czechoslovak citizens;
- (ii) the Israeli bombing raid on the nuclear research centre at Tammuz: condemning the use of force as a means of solving a political dispute, the House asked that all the governments in the area take all possible steps to ensure nuclear non-proliferation.

Council

2.3.20. The Council held 12 meetings in June. The table below lists the number, place and date of each meeting, the names of the Council President and Commission representatives and the main items of business. The footnotes refer to the points in the Bulletin where a more detailed account is given of decisions taken, agreements reached, positions adopted and questions discussed.

Commission

Temporary measures

2.3.21. When Mr Dalsager was taken to hospital, the Commission agreed that Mr Thorn would look after his portfolio (chiefly agriculture) for the time being.

Activities

2.3.22. The Commission held four meetings in June, each lasting for several sittings. It also spent a working weekend at Knokkele-Zoute on 17 and 18 June, when it finalized its report to the Council on the mandate of 30 May 1980.

2.3.23. The Commission held the now customary series of meetings with Lord Carrington, the President of the Council from 1 July, to discuss priorities for the second half of 1981. This tradition makes for greater continuity of Community action from one Presidency to another.

Decisions, communications and proposals

2.3.24. The Commission adopted communications on the European automobile industry, the internal market and social aspects of the steel policy. The matter which occupied most of its time, however, was the report on the May mandate, which was adopted on 24 June. The Commission also adopted a proposal to amend the Staff Regulations of Community officials and a proposal on the method for calculating the salaries of Community staff over the next 10 years.

Discussions, policy debates and work in hand

2.3.25. The Commission's work also included preparations for the many Council meetings which were held in June and for the European Council. Discussions were mainly concerned with relations with Japan, Turkey and the ASEAN, new measures governing purchases of foreign currency in Italy, and, in the agriculture sector, prices charged

in The Netherlands for natural gas used for horticultural purposes, State aids in France and the clawback system on the sheepmeat market.

Relations with workers' and employers' organizations

2.3.26. During their regular meetings, workers' and employers' organizations in the textile industry discussed a number of topics with the Commission, including the direction of industrial policy, outward processing, an analysis of textile trade in 1980, sensitive products, the renewal of the Multifibre Arrangement and countries granted preferential treatment. Representatives of the European Council of Chemical Manufacturers' Federations also discussed energy problems with the Commission.

2.3.27. The Commission organized an information meeting on 'The Community and its regions' for the staff of the Permanent Conference of Chambers of Commerce and Industry of the EEC.

2.3.28. During a series of preliminary consultations representatives of the European Trade Union Confederation discussed the European Social Fund and the proposed Di-

rective on procedures for informing and consulting the employees of undertakings with complex structures, in particular transnational undertakings.¹

Court of Justice

Composition of the Court

2.3.29. On 30 March,² by decision of the Representatives of the Governments of the Member States, Mr VerLoren van Themaat was appointed Advocate-General at the Court of Justice for the period from 1 April 1981 to 6 October 1985. Mr VerLoren van Themaat took the oath before the Court on 4 June.³

2.3.30. On 30 March,² by decision of the Representatives of the Governments of the Member States, Mr Fernand Grévisse was appointed Judge at the Court for the period from 1 April 1981 to 6 October 1982. Mr Grévisse took the oath before the Court on 4 June.³

2.3.33. On 18 June the Court of Auditors adopted a special report on deposits, sureties and guarantees provided in connection with expenditure under the EAGGF Guarantee Section.

Steel: production quotas and prices

2.3.35. By 36 votes to 7 with 13 abstentions the Committee approved the Commission proposal² for the application, from 1

2.3.34. On 3 June the ECSC Consultative Committee held a special meeting in Luxembourg with Mr Coosemans in the chair. The

July 1981, of a production quota scheme confined to coils (hot wide strip) and derivative products. Article 58 would thus be renewed for those products.¹

2.3.36. As regards prices, the question arose whether it was advisable to extend Article 1 of Decision 30/53, implementing Article 60 of the ECSC Treaty, to direct sales by non-regulated stockholders to the controlling company. The Committee signified its agreement on the amendment (by 50 votes in favour, 3 against and 3 abstentions), with the following comment:

'The Consultative Committee is in favour of the Commission's proposed amendment of Article 1 of Decision 30/53 provided means can be swiftly found in provisions of the Treaty to bring non-regulated stockholders under rules similar to those of Article 60 of the Treaty and its implementing decisions, as is planned, the purpose being to avoid discrimination between the two categories of stockholder.'

The members of the Committee were also on the whole in favour of applying Article 63(3) to all first-hand non-regulated stockholders and to distributing companies which processed the products they purchased, in order to subject them to the obligations imposed by Article 60.

Social problems

2.3.37. The Committee adopted a resolution on social problems in the steel industry.

220th meeting

2.3.38. On 26 June the Committee held an ordinary meeting in Bruges with Mr Coosemans in the chair; Mr Andriessen and Mr Richard, Members of the Commission, attended. The Committee gave its overall approval for the measures presented by the Commission regarding aids and for the inclusion of concrete reinforcing bars and merchant bars in the new production quotas scheme.

Aid for the steel industry

2.3.39. The measures adopted by the Commission² for aid to the steel industry met

with the Committee's general approval. It was nevertheless pointed out that despite the decision already applied, aids had continued to proliferate but had not always made restructuring any easier. It was also emphasized that a company's financial stamina must not be confused with its quality and intrinsic value.

Production quotas

2.3.40. As regards the question of bringing concrete reinforcing bars and merchant bars under the new quota scheme, the Committee was almost unanimously in favour, believing that the real remedy for the steel industry lay in a stringent Community policy on quantities and prices. But two amendments were tabled—the first to the effect that in applying Article 58 it would be better to set separate quotas for categories V and VI, the second to the effect that wire rod should immediately be brought under the quota scheme, as some members felt that no voluntary agreement would materialize.

Social measures

2.3.41. Mr Richard announced the decisions on social measures—a first instalment of some 50 million ECU was available immediately and 62 million would probably be released before the end of the year.³ These funds would serve to finance measures such as early retirement and short-time working where restructuring projects were involved. The Commission was also thinking of new measures to facilitate the creation of jobs and the retraining and mobility of labour.

European Investment Bank

Bank's capital doubled

2.3.42. The Board of Governors of the European Investment Bank (the Finance Ministers of the 10 Member States), meeting in Luxembourg on 15 June, decided to

double the Bank's subscribed capital from 7 200 million ECU to 14 400 million ECU. This decision, which will take effect on 1 January 1982, will allow the Bank to lend up to 36 000 million ECU (250% of the subscribed capital).

Operations in June

2.3.43. In June the European Investment Bank announced loans totalling 204.9 million ECU¹ for investments in the Community—118.4 million ECU in Italy, 67.5 million ECU in Ireland, 10.6 million ECU in Denmark and 8.4 million ECU in France. Outside the Community the Bank lent 33 million ECU to Mediterranean countries (18 million ECU to Portugal and 15 million ECU to Morocco) under the Financial Protocols between these countries and the Community. It also lent 6 million ECU to two ACP countries—4.2 million ECU to Burundi and 1.8 million ECU to Djibouti.

Community

Italy

2.3.44. Two global loans totalling LIT 30 000 million were made to the Istituto Mobiliare Italiano, which will use them to finance small and medium-scale industrial ventures in less-developed areas of central and northern Italy (LIT 15 000 million) and for small and medium-scale works to reduce or rationalize energy consumption in industry so as to cut dependence on imported oil (LIT 15 000 million).

The Community's financial aid for reconstruction in the areas of Campania and Basilicata damaged by the November 1980 earthquake became a reality when the Commission and the EIB signed contracts for two loans under the New Community Instrument:² LIT 39 000 million was lent for the first phase of reconstruction of the national road network and work on the Salerno-Reggio Calabria motorway and LIT 36 000 million will help to repair about 1 100 km of railway lines including engineering work and the installation of signalling and tele-

communications equipment. In accordance with a Council decision, the interest burden on these loans will be relieved by a 3-point subsidy to be paid from the Community budget.

LIT 45 000 million was lent from the New Community Instrument (NCI or 'Ortolì facility')² LIT 20 000 million will be spent on extending the short and medium-range telephone network in Campania by 15 000 new business subscribers and 135 000 private ones, LIT 15 000 million on converting oil-fired power stations at Brindisi (Apulia) and Sulcis (Lombardy) to coal and LIT 10 000 million on the 103 km of the Calabrian stretch of the gas pipeline from Algeria. The last two of these loans carry a 3-point interest subsidy under the arrangements agreed when Italy joined the European Monetary System.³

Ireland

2.3.45. The EIB lent IRL 47 million for thermal power stations. A loan of IRL 30 million went to the construction of two coal-fired generating units of 300 MW each (the first large coal-fired power station in the country) at Moneypoint, Co. Clare, and one of IRL 17 million went to the extension of power stations at Shannonbridge, Co. Offaly, and Lanesborough, Co. Longford. These new peat-fired generators, each of 45 MW, will increase energy production by around 60%. These investments will help diversify the country's sources of energy and should reduce its oil imports by 915 000 tonnes a year.

Denmark

2.3.46. Loans totalling DKR 84.2 million were made to Denmark. DKR 54.2 million

went to the improvement of Greenland's domestic telephone network and satellite communications between Greenland and the rest of Denmark, and DKR 30 million will help construct a fishery research and development centre at Hirtshals, North Jutland, to assist the fishing industry in finding new fishing grounds, adapting its fleet, methods and equipment and training fishermen in new techniques.

France

2.3.47. A loan of FF 50 million to the Caisse d'Aide à l'Equipement des Collectivités Locales will help finance a number of small and medium-sized public infrastructure projects carried out by departments, chambers of commerce or as joint initiatives between communes or departments in regions faced with development or conversion problems.

Outside the Community

Mediterranean countries

2.3.48. The Bank lent 18 million ECU to the paper pulp industry in Portugal to assist the planting of eucalyptus trees on some 17 000 hectares of abandoned agricultural land and worked-out woodland. In Morocco, a loan of 15 million ECU will part-finance port improvement works at Safi and Agadir, the country's second and fourth largest ports respectively. These will provide a cheaper solution to the maintenance of the required depth in the ports, reduce waiting time and make slipway operations more efficient.

ACP States

2.3.49. As part of its operations under the Lomé Convention, the EIB granted two loans from the risk capital which it manages under the European Development Fund. Conditional loans totalling 4.2 million ECU were made to Burundi—3.2 million ECU to the Banque Nationale de Développement Economique and 1 million ECU to the Ver-rundi company to help finance construction of a glass bottles and jars factory at Bujum-

bura, the capital. In Djibouti, a loan of 1.8 million ECU will help enlarge the thermal power station in the capital and expand and reinforce the distribution network.

Financing Community activities

Budgets

2.3.50. On 17 June Parliament passed a resolution on the future of the Community budget.¹

General budget

Amending budget No 1/1981 and preliminary draft budget for 1982

2.3.51. On 15 June the Commission, in accordance with Article 78(3) of the ECSC Treaty, Article 203(3) of the EEC Treaty and Article 177(3) of the Euratom Treaty, sent the budgetary authority the preliminary draft general budget of the Communities for 1982, which it had adopted on 25 May.²

As required by the Financial Regulation, the preliminary draft was accompanied by a general introduction³ and the Commission's entry-by-entry analysis of expenditure, revenue and borrowing and lending operations. The underlying hypotheses for budget trends in 1982, 1983 and 1984, the analysis of financial management and the balance sheet of assets and liabilities were also attached.

At the same time, the Commission submitted preliminary draft amending budget No 1/1981,⁴ to reallocate some appropriations to other policies where extra needs have arisen.

Discharge for 1979

2.3.52. At its June part-session Parliament gave the Commission its discharge for the implementation of the 1979 Community

budget.¹ Its resolution contained a number of comments on budgetary management and Parliament's powers of control.

Own resources

2.3.53. On 9 June the Commission authorized the Federal Republic of Germany when calculating its VAT own resources base for 1980, not to take some operations into account and to use approximate estimates for a number of transactions where precise calculation would involve unjustified administrative expenditure.²

Financial Regulation

2.3.54. On 15 June the Commission sent the Council a proposal for an amendment to the Financial Regulation of December 1977 involving a number of changes in budget nomenclature.³

Financial operations

ECSC

Loans raised

2.3.55. In June the Commission concluded a number of private placings in German marks and Swiss francs totalling approximately 30 million ECU.

Loans paid out

2.3.56. Acting under Articles 54 and 56 of the ECSC Treaty, the Commission made loans in June amounting to 22.74 million ECU (industrial loans, conversion loans and subsidized housing).

Industrial loans

2.3.57. A payment of 13.65 million ECU of a loan granted by the Commission under Article 54 was made to a German firm to fi-

nance the installation of crude steel capacity and a wide hot-rolled strip mill.

Subsidized housing

2.3.58. Loans for the building of subsidized housing for mineworkers amounted to 190 000 ECU.

Conversion loans

2.3.59. In June conversion loans (Article 56) totalling 8.9 million ECU were granted to the following firms:

NCI

Loans raised

2.3.60. In June the Commission concluded a USD 65 million bond issue underwritten by an international banking syndicate. The loan, which is for 12 years, bears interest at a nominal rate of 14.75%, payable annually. It was issued at 99% of its nominal value, and application has been made for official quotation on the Luxembourg stock exchange.



2.3.61. A number of loan agreements were signed in June under the New Community Instrument. They relate to five investment operations in Italy and amount to some 94.7 million ECU.

3. Infringement procedures

Proceedings in the Court of Justice

3.3.1. In June the Commission brought eight actions for infringement before the Court of Justice. One of these was against the Federal Republic of Germany and one against Italy. The former concerned the conditions imposed on imports of hand-knitting yarns, the latter the prohibition on imports of live animals through a certain frontier-crossing point.

The other six actions were brought against Italy, Belgium, Luxembourg, France, Ireland and Denmark for failure to implement Council Directive 77/91/EEC of 13 December 1976 concerning the formation of public limited liability companies and the maintenance and alteration of their capital.¹

Στόν κατάλογο κατά θέματα οι περιοδικές ἐκδόσεις φέρουν μόνο ἀριθμούς ἀναφορᾶς πού ἐπιτρέπουν νά βρεῖ κανείς στό μέρος II τήν περιγραφή τοῦ περιεχομένου.

Μέρος II – Στόν κατάλογο τῶν περιοδικῶν ἐκδόσεων γίνεται πλήρης περιγραφή γιά κάθε τρέχουσα περιοδική ἐκδοση, μέλι ἀλφαριθμητική σειρά, σέ δλες τίς γλώσσες.

Μέρος III – Οι πίνακες τῶν τίτλων καί τῶν σειρῶν διαιροῦνται κατά γλώσσα. Ταξινομοῦνται μέλι ἀλφαριθμητική σειρά καί παραπέμπουν, μέσω τοῦ ἀριθμοῦ σειρᾶς πού ήδη ἀναφέραμε, στά περιγραφικά σημειώματα τοῦ μέρους I. Οι πίνακες αὐτοὶ σωρεύονται κατά τὴ διάρκεια τοῦ έτους.

Introductory note

This catalogue includes the newly published monographs and series issued during the period to which it relates by the Institutions of the European Communities, and also their current periodicals.

Arrangement. The catalogue is divided into three parts as follows:

Part I — The classified list provides a subject classification of the titles included under 20 headings (see below). Under each subject-heading monographs and series are listed first, alphabetically by title in mixed language order; there then follows a similar list of periodical titles. Full entries for monographs and series appear only once; otherwise cross-references are given to the full entries, identifying them by the sequence numbers appearing in the left-hand margins. (Those numbers should not be used for ordering purposes.) Periodical titles only appear in the classified list as cross-reference entries, full entries being found in Part II.

Part II — The list of periodicals presents full details of each current Community periodical listed alphabetically in mixed language order.

Part III — The indexes of titles and series, presented in separate sequences for each language, provide alphabetical keys to the monographs and series included in Part I, identifying them by the sequence numbers already described. These indexes cumulate throughout the year.

How to obtain publications. Publications may be priced for sale, gratis, or of limited distribution. Those of the last two classes may be obtained from the issuing Institutions, or, where they are published by the Information Offices of the Commission, from those Offices, whose addresses are given in the lists on pp. 9 and 11. Publications of limited distribution are however generally only for the attention of governments of Member States, Community departments and other authorities concerned.

Orders for priced publications should be directed to the Sales Offices listed on the last page.

All orders should quote the full title, as well as the ISBN or ISSN where such a number precedes the prices in the catalogue.

Introduction
