## Editorial

March 12 marked the first anniversary of the European Community Studies Association. During this first year much has been accomplished. Over 200 individuals and several institutions and organizations have become members. Two issues of this Newsletter, in the spring and fall of 1988, went out to over one thousand people and two issues for 1989 are assured by a continuation of a generous grant received from the Washington Delegation of the Commission of the European Communities. Also with substantial financial aid from the EC Delegation and the German Marshall Fund of the United States, ECSA's Inaugural Conference will be held at George Mason University, Fairfax, Virginia on May 24-25, 1989.

Discussions are also being held with various foundations with a view to obtaining funds for planning and program development. Links were established with a number of national and international organizations in Europe and there was formal participation by ECSA in the Joint Annual Convention of the International Studies Association and the British International Studies Association held in London on March 28-April 1, 1989. Nominations were obtained from the membership for the first elected five-member Executive Committee. The balloting is in progress and the new Executive Committee will assume its duties at the bi-annual business meeting on May 24, 1989. Finally, the Interim Executive Committee met in New York on February 17-18, 1989 to review a lengthy list of current and future activities.

Preparations for the Inaugural Conference, "The European Community in the 1990s: Emerging Concepts and Policies," have been the focus of much of ECSA's activity this past winter and particularly of Program Chair, Desmond Dinan of George Mason University. The Program Committee (Leon Lindberg, Hugo Kaufman and Louis H. Orzack) met on January 21 to consider paper and panel submissions and map out the Conference program. More than 140 paper and panel proposals covering a wide range of topics were submitted, including a large number from abroad (Western and Eastern Europe, India, New Zealand, Nigeria, Israel). There will be

two very full days of meetings with 40 panels and workshops, the Business Meeting, special luncheons and a banquet. Full details of the program for the Conference appear in this issue of the *Newsletter*. In addition to EC Delegation funding, grants to underwrite different parts of the Conference have been received from the German Marshall Fund of the United States, for travel, and from George Mason University's College of Arts and Sciences, Graduate School, School of Business Administration and Entrepreneurship Center, Virginia's Center for Innovative Technology, and Virginia's Department of Trade for program activities. Finally, we have received a request from C-SPAN to tape for a future broadcast certain panels at the Conference.

ECSA and its members appeared prominently on the program of the Joint Annual Convention of the British International Studies Association and the International Studies Association. Four panels appeared under the general heading "United States-European Community Relations in the 1990s: New Thinking for an Aging Relationship." Four of the six members of the Interim Executive Committee presented papers and chaired panels (Roy Ginsberg, Leon Hurwitz, Donald Puchala, Glenda Rosenthal). A number of other ECSA members also participated as panelists, discussants or panel chairs. Finally, the Convention in London provided an opportunity for ECSA to join with UACES (University Association for Contemporary European Studies, UK) and TEPSA (Trans European Policy Studies Association) for a discussion and reception hosted by UACES. This meeting provided a forum for an exchange of information on the work of each organization, a discussion of possible collaborative research projects and funding possibilities for them. The UACES/TEPSA/ECSA workshop also marked the first meeting of ECSA members with their counterparts in other countries and the first gathering of ECSA members at an international conference. All of these activities represent an active pursuit of the goals of the Association as spelled out in Article I of the ECSA Constitution.

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### The Co Editors...

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Clearly, ECSA wishes to establish itself on a sound financial footing and expand and diversify its activities. With this in mind, members of the Interim Executive Committee have been holding talks with representatives of foundations. It is hoped that a number of grant proposals will be submitted before the summer. Given the great resurgence of interest in European Community studies and ECSA's dynamic first year, we feel that we are in a fairly strong position right now to obtain a favorable response to requests for support for planning and program development. There will be an opportunity at the Business Meeting for the membership to exchange ideas on all these topics.

In the meantime, the Delegation of the Commission of the European Communities in Washington informed us early in the year that it would continue its financial support for this Newsletter in 1989, thus underlining its commitment to the successful implementation of ECSA's goals. The Delegation's Office of Press and Public Affairs has been a source of on-going encouragement and assistance which we gratefully acknowledge.

The Co-Editors of the *Newsletter* will be covering the same topics this year as last. Please send materials on Conferences-Workshops, Organizations-Institutes, and Fellowships-Awards to Glenda G. Rosenthal; materials on Transatlantic News, Teaching News, and Publications-Research to Roy H. Ginsberg; and mailing lists-membership dues to Leon Hurwitz. Brief articles, reviews, and comments on matters of scholarly and topical interest and academic notes may also be submitted for possible publication. We would like to expand and improve the *Newsletter*, but can only do so if you, the readers, send us information. We look forward to seeing as many of you as possible at the Inaugural Conference on May 24-25.

Papers on a European Community panel included: "The EC and Eastern Europe" (Henri Astier, Columbia University School of Journalism); "The Reluctant European: Norway and the EC, 1972-1988" (Sonja Bensen, Columbia University School of International and Public Affairs); and "European Telecommunications Policy: Don't Believe the Hype" (Richard Kramer, Columbia University School of International and Public Affairs). Other EC-related papers were: "France and the UMOA: Towards 1992" (David Andrews, Cambridge, MA); "International Economic Policy Coordination: Lessons from the European Monetary System" (Kate McNamara, Columbia School of International and Public Affairs); and "The Core-Periphery Problem in the EC: A Case Study of Italy" (Juliana Prather, Columbia University School of International and Public Affairs). ### **COLUMBIA UNIVERSITY INSTITUTE ON WESTERN EUROPE STUDENT FORUM ON 1992**

Students from the School of International and Public Affairs of Columbia University organized a two-day forum on 1992 on February 24-25, 1989. The Forum, which was entirely student initiated and organized, looked at issues, problems and concerns from both a member state and global perspective. The first session, in which students presented member state views, focused on three topics: the core-periphery debate, removing fiscal barriers: the value added tax, and the political future: long-range planning for the Community. The second session, which looked at the external dimension of 1992, focused on two topics: the reaction to the EC's plans for 1992, and the significance of customs unions and an integrated Europe. ### **MIDWEST POLITICAL SCIENCE ASSOCIATION - 1989 ANNUAL MEETING**

The 1989 Annual Meeting of the Midwest Political Science Association was held in Chicago on April 13-15, 1989. Two panels were devoted to European Community topics.

The first panel was chaired by E. Gene Frankland (Ball State) and was titled "The European International System: Interdependence and Integration." Papers were presented by Leon Hurwitz (Cleveland State University): "Institutional Barriers to the Free Circulation of Physicians in the European Community;" David Wood and Chris Plein (University of Missouri at Columbia): "The Anomaly of Internal Market Building in the European Community and North America: The Cases of Britain and Canada;" and by Birol Yesilada (University of Missouri at Columbia): "Models of Interdependence in South-North European Economic Relations." Ron Inglehart (University of Michigan) served as the panel discussant.

The second panel was chaired by Ross Talbot (Iowa State) and was titled "The European Community: A Single Market by 1992?" Papers were presented H. Wayne Moyer (Grinnell): "The CAP in a Single Market: Implications for US-EC Relations;" Robert Paarlberg (Wellesley): "Common Market, International Cooperation, and Policy Reform: Lessons of the CAP;" and by Ross Talbot: "A Single Market by 1992: A Political Feasibility Analysis." Leon Hurwitz (Cleveland State University) served as the panel discussant.

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#### **AMSTERDAM SCHOOL FOR EXECUTIVE DEVELOPMENT IN INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS**

This graduate-level program now includes the courses on European integration previously given by the Europea Instituut of the University of Amsterdam. In addition to two executive programs -- one with a global orientation, the other with a European orientation lasting 30 weeks -- ASEDIR also offers two specialist courses lasting 30 weeks, one in EC Law and the other in EC Economics. Applicants for the executive programs should have a degree in law, economics or political science although these conditions may be waived in special circumstances. Applicants for the specialist courses must have a degree in law or economics. Each program is limited to 20 participants. Courses begin in mid-August and run through the end of May.

## **EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS ABROAD/ MARYMOUNT COLLEGE INTERNSHIPS**

Educational Programs Abroad (EPA), together with Marymount College, Tarrytown, New York, are sponsoring a special program for American college students to participate in an academic internship program with British Members of the European Parliament (MEPs). Students are selected for a semester of their junior or senior year and spend five weeks in London for orientation and intensive courses on the EC and international relations. They then go to the local constituency office for nine weeks and live with families chosen by their MEP. Finally, each student attends two sessions of the European Parliament in Strasbourg/Brussels. The final week is spent in London for wrap-up sessions and seminars. The program is limited to 15 students each semester who are chosen on the basis of academic record, recommendations and a proven ability to work independently and with self-motivation.

## **EUROPEAN STUDIES AT MANCHESTER UNIVERSITY**

The University of Manchester's Department of Government is celebrating its fortieth birthday in 1989. As a result of recent appointments and restructuring, it will start the next academic session with one of the strongest groupings of European specialists. The largest influx of staff comes with the restructuring of European Studies in the Manchester area. The UMIST degree in European Studies admitted its last intake of undergraduates in 1987, but a completely new degree comes on stream at the University from 1989. The new degree consists of 50 per cent (practical) language work (French or German "majors" plus one of several "minors") and 50 per cent social sciences. There is a core of European politics teaching but students take an additional social science discipline, either economics or history. A variety of European courses is available in these disciplines.

## **VRIJE UNIVERSITEIT BRUSSEL GRADUATE PROGRAM IN INTERNATIONAL AND COMPARATIVE LAW**

The Vrije Universiteit Brussel's Faculty of Law conducts a special Graduate Program in International Legal Cooperation with a heavy concentration in European law and

organization. The Program is administered under the auspices of the Belgian National Fund for Scientific Research with the collaboration of members of all Belgian law faculties and lasts two semesters of four months each (October-June). All courses are for 15 weeks, with the exception of the introductory courses in common and civil law, which are taught over a shorter period. Also included is a study trip to the European Court of Justice, the European Parliament and the Council of Europe. A special two-week program with European Community institutions is generally part of the course. Studies lead to a degree of Master in International and Comparative Law. A certificate of attendance may be obtained by students not registered for the degree.

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### **ECSA INAUGURAL CONFERENCE: "THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITY IN THE 1990S: EMERGING CONCEPTS AND POLICIES"**

The European Community Studies Association is proud to announce its forthcoming Inaugural Conference, to be held at George Mason University (Fairfax, VA) on May 24-25, 1989.

Cutting across all academic disciplines, the European Community is an ideal object of conceptual enterprise. Yet conceptual construction concerning the EC has been lacking worldwide since the 1970s.
