Biographical Note

ALBERT COPPE

Professor of Economics University of Louvain, Belgium

Mr. Coppé was born at Bruges in November 1911. He studied economics and political science and received Bachelor degrees in Commerce and Finance and Political and Social Sciences as well as a Ph.D. in Economics.

He began his academic career as lecturer for Economics and Sociology in 1941 at the University of Louvain.

His political career goes back to his activities in the 1940's in the Belgian underground movement. In 1946, he was elected to the Belgian Chamber of Representatives as Christian Social Deputy for Brussels where he was a member of the Finance and Economic Affairs Committee. In 1947, Mr. Coppé participated in the first post-war pan-European conference at Gstaad with members of parliaments from France, Germany, Italy, Britain, and other European countries. In 1950, he became Minister of Public Works. From 1950 to 1951 he was Minister of Economic Affairs and in 1952 he became Minister of Reconstruction.

At the inception of the European Coal and Steel Community in 1952, he became Vice President of the High Authority, in charge of energy affairs, transport, antitrust matters, and information.

With the merger in 1967 of the three Executive Commissions of the European Coal and Steel Community(ECSC), Atomic Energy Community(Euratom) and Economic Community(EEC), Mr. Coppé was appointed member of the 14-member Commission of the European Communities. His portfolio of responsibilities included budget, investment affairs, and information.

In 1970, he was reappointed by the Belgian government to the 9-member Commission of the European Communities, and in 1973, when the Community was enlarged to include Denmark, Britain and Ireland, he returned to the University of Louvain.

Mr. Coppé is the author of <u>Problèmes d'Economie Charbonnière</u> (Problems of a fossil fuel economy), <u>Economics and Standards of Living</u> (published in Flemish) and a number of articles in the political and economic sciences. He holds honorary degrees from the University of Montreal and St. Mary's University, San Antonio, Texas. He has been awarded many civilian honors from the governments of Belgium, Luxembourg, Venezuela and Italy.

Mr. Coppé is married, has eight children, and makes his home in Tervueren, Belgium.

Member of the Supreme Council of Statistics since 1949.

Social career: M.Coppe is a member of the Education Commission of the Confederation of Christian Trade Unions. President of the Federation of the Christian Mutual Society of the Brussels district. Member of the Supreme Council of the Family since 1947.

Political career: Deputy of the P.S.C. (Christian Social Party) for the Brussels district since 1946.

In Parliament he has dealt principally with financial and economic affairs and was the rapporteur of the budget for Economic Affairs and of the Pensions budget.

As a member of the Finance Commission, he was particularly active in connection with the problem of import duties and excise, and took an interest in the problem of Benelux.
