Dr Jac Aarts has been with the European Commission since 1963 and is since early 2000 adviser in DG Enterprise. Before that, he has been Head of the Steel Task Force from 1982 to 1986 and since then and until 2000 Head of the Steel Division in DG Industry. In view of his retirement in mid-2002, he has requested to become an adviser to the DG on international aspects of enterprise policy. On the Steel Task Force, Mr Aarts has been managing an internal team of 14 EC officials and an external staff of 70 auditors and 65 engineers to organise and control the Commission's steel restructuring plan and to work out verification and financial viability plans. As Head of the Steel Division, he has been in charge of the implementation of the overall steel policy of the European Commission under the Coal and Steel Community Treaty (ECSC) ; this included the management of a team of 28 EC officials.

Previous appointments with the Commission include Administrator in DG Competition (1963-67), Desk officer in DG Economy and Finance (1967-71) and Principal Administrator in DG External Relations (1971-82) in charge of bilateral EC/US trade relations.

Prior to entering the European Commission, he has done academic work (assistant at the Institute for foreign and international economic law in Frankfurt/Germany) and has been an economic analyst at the US embassy in The Hague (Netherlands). All along his time at the European Commission, he has given several lectures on US/EC relations, European integration and later steel policies. He has been the benificiary of an Eisenhower fellowship in 1975. During his time as US desk officer, he extensively travelled the USA and gave several lectures .

Dr Aarts is an economist with a legal background and holds a PhD degree in economics from Tilburg University (Holland). Publications include « Market power and Antitrust : a comparative study on US and EC competition law » (1975) and various articles on competition policies, on relations between the EC and the USA and on steel policy.

Jac Aarts is Dutch, and was born in 1937 in Den Bosch, Netherlands. He is fluent in English, French and German and basic Italian.

Mr. Aarts was born in 1937 in 'S-Hertogenbosch, the Netherlands.

After an initial training period with the European Economic Community Commission in 1961, Mr. Aarts became a senior Commission official in April, 1963.
