Jos Jonckers is a Principal Administrator with the European Commission (EC) since 1984. From 1987-1995 he has been desk officer for Bangladesh in the Directorate General for North/South Relations - responsible for the Community's relations and cooperation programme with Bangladesh. From 1984-1987, Mr. Jonckers was Administrator in the Directorate for Development where he worked on energy problems in developing countries in the Division for Energy, Industry and Mining.

Prior to his joining the Commission, Mr. Jonckers worked for 1 year as Assistant Brand Manager with Procter and Gamble and for 9 years with the International Labour Organisation (ILO). Starting as a junior Programme Officer in the ILO Area Office in Lagos, Nigeria (1975-1978), Mr. Jonckers later became expert in cooperative management training in an interregional ILO Project called MATCOM (Material and Techniques for Cooperative Management Training), first working from Turin, Italy (1978-1980) thereafter from Vienna, Austria (1980-1984). Mr. Jonckers has travelled extensively within the context of all these capacities, particularly in Asia and Africa.

Mr. Jonckers was educated at VLEKHO (Vlaamse Economische Hogeschool), Brussels (Licentiate in Business and Finance); Webster University, St. Louis (Vienna-branch, Austria) (MA in Finance and Economics); The Institute of World Affairs Salisbury, Connecticut (Postgraduate Course in international relations); H. Hartcollege, Wezembeek-Oppem, Belgium (Latin, Greek and Economics).

Mr. Jonckers is Belgian (from the Flemish Region). He was born in 1951 in Thijsville in former Congo. He is married and has three children (Tom 17, Jan 14, Leen 11).

Mr. Jonckers' fellowship research programme at the Brookings Institution will focus on how the fall of communism and globalisation are reshaping traditional perceptions and concepts about altruism and solidarity in international relations between richer and poorer nations (e.g. overseas development aid and cooperation).
