Mr P. Schmidhuber's visit to Luxembourg

On 15 December 1988, Mr P. Schmidhuber, at that time Member of the Commission responsible for Eurostat, paid a visit to Luxembourg.

At the end of the afternoon, Mr Schmidhuber offered a cocktail to all the staff of the Statistical Office. During this cocktail the following speeches by the Member of the Commission and Mr Y, Franchet, Director-General of Eurostat, were exchanged.



Speech by Mr P. Schmidhuber

Ladies and gentlemen,

It is a very great pleasure to have this opportunity of saying a few words to the staff of the Statistical Office this evening. I think you will agree that we have had a very good year together. In January the new Commission will find a Statistical Office in better shape than it has been for a long time.

Mr Franchet, you have been Director-General for just over one year. Under your leadership the Office has gained a new dynamism. You have made sure that the Office is heard. Its views are solicited inside the Commission and in the statistical institutes of the Member States.

I must congratulate you and all your colleagues on what you have been able to achieve over the last 12 months:

- a major reorganization of the Office giving it a modern structure;
- (ii) a work programme which clearly links European statistics to the policy priorities of the Commission;
- (iii) a more than doubling of your budget over the next five years — an achievement matched nowhere else in the Commission.

A new structure for the Office was necessary. The 1992 programme had given new vigour to the Commission. You had experienced an exceptionally large number of retirements. Spain and Portugal had joined us. The staff modernization initiative meant that middlemanagement posts had been re-evaluated. You have used these changes successfully to give the Office a new structure and to place many more younger staff in positions of responsibility.



The statistical programme has meant a lot of work for all of you (I suppose you are tired of hearing the word!). The programming process, particularly the missions to the statistical institutes of the Member States and to the other services of the Commission, has led to a thorough examination of what the needs of the Commission are, what is being done in the Office and what the national institutes can deliver. The form chosen for the programme makes clear the links between Community policy and statistical work. Clear statistical objectives are derived from policy aims. Accordingly, everyone should be able to see how his work is directly related to the development and implementation of policy. I know that drafting such a programme is not a matter of each service scribbling down a few paragraphs and pasting them together. It requires a major intellectual effort, much reflection and discussion. You have done the job well and I congratulate you.

The Office will have a very substantial *budget* to help it carry out its programme. The Commission has decided on an envelope which means that the financial resources available will more than double over the next five years. The Commission is able to make this kind of provision because it has been able to convince the Member States to give it more autonomy in the management of the Community budget — it can set priorities. The counterpart is financial discipline. This means that the Commission will monitor even more closely the performance of its services and act on results.

In this respect 1989 will be a particular challenge, to the Statistical Office. The new financial regulation means that next year you will have not only to disburse the carry-over from 1988 but all the payment credits made available for the year 1989. This means that project management will have to be particularly effective. The credibility of the Office is at stake.

Ladies and gentlemen,

Statistics are not an end in themselves and *a* fortiori European statistics. They are there to meet policy needs. The job of Eurostat is to coordinate the work of the national offices so that these needs are satisfied. Eurostat is not simply a European version of a national service. You have your own specificity.

The first feature is that as an integral part of the Commission you have the rights to initiate legislation and monitor its implementation which are given in the Treaties. If the Office were outside the Community structure you would not have these powers.

The second feature is the very high level of qualification but small number of staff — klein aber fein as we say in German. You may not like this but it is a fact of life that the Commission does not have the manpower of national administrations.

For the foreseeable future the Commission will remain small in size — and it is small despite some of the wilder stories we can read in the press. This means we have to think very carefully how we use our scarce human resources.

We must get the division of labour right between the 1% of European and the 99% of

national statisticians. The 1% is not going to carry out a representative cross-section of the work of the 99%. Eurostat has to serve first of all as a relay between European policymakers and those who carry out the work in the Member States, the field work. The European statisticians then create their specific value-added which gives us the European statistics suitable for European (policy) purposes. European statisticians are therefore not multilingual copies of their national counterparts. Management and communication skills have a far bigger role to play in your daily work.

I am convinced that you in the Statistical Office possess and can use these skills. The staff of the Office has a very impressive range of backgrounds and experience. The modernized structure of the Office should make sure that this is now fully and effectively applied. Ladies and gentlemen,

You have worked hard this year and next year will provide you with a major challenge. On behalf of the Commission, I would like to thank you for your diligence, loyalty and sense of responsibility and express our confidence in your ability to make your decisive contribution to the Commission's work in 1989.

Your minds will now doubtless be turned to things other than work as the holidays approach. I hope that you will be able to profit fully from the rest, or if you don't want to rest, at least that in January you will return relaxed and in one piece.

May I take this opportunity of wishing you and your families a very merry Christmas and a happy and prosperous New Year.

Speech by Mr Y. Franchet



I would like, first, to thank you for the very kind words you have said about the Office and about me in particular. What has been achieved has been due to the efforts of the whole staff, at all levels. As you know, Mr Commissioner, statisticians and politicians usually live in different worlds, and their timetables normally differ dramatically. Statisticians have to develop the appropriate infrastructures for statistical information common languages, classifications, definitions, etc. — which takes a long time. They are, therefore, reluctant to make changes as these changes lead to breaks in time series. The rate of change can better be compared to that of an aircraft carrier than that of a speedboat. They are, thus, rarely prepared for *ad hoc* priority requests.

Politicians, on the other hand, are constantly under the pressure of events. They look for short-term solutions which require rapid change.

We are currently sharing a rare honeymoon, due to the 1992 target for the single market. For once our horizons coincide. We have four years to change and develop our infrastructures, a rare opportunity.

Mr Commissioner, the relations that we have had with both yourself and your cabinet can be qualified as excellent. In spite of the pressure on the Commission, we have always been able to obtain the support we needed and a strong commitment to our major projects: our reorganization, the statistical programme, statistical confidentiality, intraregional trade. A special thanks goes to Mr Hugh Baker, who is leaving us, and who had the difficult task of matching your requirements with mine. He has done this remarkably well.

There are big challenges ahead of us for the coming years:

- (i) to implement the statistical programme, in which our credibility is at stake;
- (ii) to improve our managerial capacity, which is a condition of this implementation;
- (iii) to increase our flexibility, e.g. our capacity to respond quickly to priority *ad hoc* requests.

Mr Commissioner, in the name of the Statistical Office, I would like to wish you a merry Christmas and a happy New Year.

The work of Eurostat in 1988

Implementation of the provisions of the Single European Act,¹ and particularly completion of the internal market by 1992, entail the modification of certain activities and regular statistical surveys, as well as the supply of new data and information, especially by means of a new policy for statistical information.

Statistical information associated with the provisions of the Single European Act

The Commission has forwarded two communications to the Council, one covering Community policy on statistical information,² the second concerning the 1989-92 statistical programme.³

By making better use of statistics, this programme is designed to:

- (i) enhance the impact of Community policies;
- (ii) improve budgetary discipline, particularly by providing better and faster assessment of Community programmes;
- (iii) assist integration of the Community by standardizing European methodology.

The programme covers four major fields in which Community statistics will be amplified between now and 1992 (national accounts, intra-Community trade, the common agricultural policy and aid from the structural Funds). ECU 215 million have been budgeted over a period of five years, more than 75% of this sum going to the Member States to fund surveys and other ways of collecting information of Community interest.

With regard to the internal market, the Commission (Eurostat - Statistical Office of the European Communities) has launched and developed four distinct projects: the development of a Community-wide information system,4 made possible by enhanced standardization (indeed, Eurostat is currently working with Member States on methodological aspects of the European System of Integrated Economic Accounts (ESA) and of accounts covering trade in goods, services and capital); the preparation of a new system — no longer based on administrative and customs declarations at the Community's internal frontiers. since these formalities will be done away with - for quantifying intra-Community trade and transactions after 1992 (a draft regulation is due to be presented to the Council in 1989); the use of new sources to improve or supplement annual industrial statistics, particularly in the services and SME sectors, as a way of enhancing the relevance and transparency of information concerning enterprises; the creation, in cooperation with the Member States, of an information-collection mechanism designed to produce a harmonized statistical system for recording financial innovations.5

'Financial innovation', in the form of new financial instruments or combinations of existing ones, now plays a major role in national and international financial markets. To ensure a fuller understanding of these phenomena, Eurostat began in November 1988 to examine implementation of a flexible data-collection system for financial accounts and banking statistics. Eurostat intends to

put the results of this study before a working party of experts on financial statistics at the end of 1989, and to put forward proposals for harmonized definitions covering 'financial innovation'.

In the social field, the annual Community labour force survey was conducted in the spring (as has been the case each year since 1983) by all 12 Member States. On 7 November¹ the Council adopted a regulation on the organization of the 1989 survey. The Commission has also continued work to obtain statistics on income, wages and salaries and labour costs, as well as relaunching projects covering training and professional qualifications.

In early 1989, on a proposal from the Commission,² taking account of the opinion of the European Parliament³ and with the aim of enhancing economic and social unity, the Council is due to approve a directive covering a uniform definition of gross national product at market prices (GNP mp), the aim of which is to provide appropriate Community legislation to underpin development of the major aggregates in the European System of Integrated Economic Accounts - so as to and thus be in a position to supply the necessary data to calculate national contributions to the Community's own resources and to coordinate national economic policies. Moreover, efforts to produce economic accounts more frequently have resulted in the establishment of quarterly accounts.

On 26 July, under the heading of the development of new statistical instruments (one of the aims of the Community R & D programmes), the Commission forwarded to the Council a proposal⁴ for a specific programme concerning expert statistical systems (Doses). The Council also decided, on 26 September,⁵

in line with a Commission proposal⁶ and an

opinion delivered by the European Parliament,⁷ to launch a pilot project for the use of remote sensing in agricultural statistics.

In the environmental field, the Commission is examining a very comprehensive information system and in February⁸ published its first collection of statistics on this subject.

Statistical information to underpin Community policies

The adaptation of statistics in line with the reform of the common agricultural policy is continuing with respect to both the situation in agricultural markets and the incomes of those engaged in agriculture. Meanwhile, on 29 February,⁹ the Council adopted the Regulation covering the 1988-97 structural surveys and the Eurofarm project.¹⁰ Similarly, on 8 November,¹¹ it accepted the Commission's proposal¹² for the modification of its Directive of 28 July 1982,¹³ concerning surveys of the earnings of farm workers, in order to allow the 1988 survey to be launched.

Under the modified Directive, the Community's contribution to the cost of the survey is extended to 1988. The Council is due to reassess Directive 82/606/EEC, on the basis of a Commission report of the surveys so far conducted, in early 1990. Where appropriate, this report will be accompanied by proposals for measures to be implemented after 1990.

The existing system of energy statistics¹⁴ has been supplemented by two new surveys of consumption and investment respectively.

The Commission decided on 16 November¹⁵ to modify the questionnaire which the steel

industry is obliged to complete at regular intervals, under its Decision 1566/86/ECSC of 24 February 1986.¹ Key aims of the change were to gain an insight into capacity, on the basis of production returns, and to identify market fluctuations while calculating apparent steel consumption more accurately, thanks to data on deliveries, supplies and new orders, steps being taken to avoid double counting and incompatible factors. The information thus obtained is fully in line with the new goals that the Commission has set for its steel policy.²

Work has been undertaken to define the form and overall approach of the future datacollection system for statistics on the structure and activity of service enterprises.

With respect to external relations, the statistical coverage required for the preparation of multilateral trade negotiations during the Uruguay Round entailed the combination of data from diverse sources (trade, tariff and economic). Thanks to the introduction of the Combined Nomenclature (CN)³ on 1 January, and on the Integrated Community Tariff (Taric),⁴ extremely detailed information is

now available in this field. The technical cooperation programme (training of statisticians, harmonization of external trade statistics, and the development of specialized statistics), primarily designed to assist the ACP countries,⁵ is proving increasingly popular with Mediterranean (Algeria,⁶ Yugoslavia⁷ and third countries (Andean Group countries,⁸ China⁹).

In Stockholm on 3 and 4 November, Eurostat met for the first time with the Directors-General of the National Statistical Institutes of the EFTA countries. The aim of the meeting was to tell participants how implementation of the Single European Act¹⁰ would affect Community statistics. The representatives of the EFTA countries expressed their readiness to make all possible adjustments to their statistical systems to take account of the changes engendered by completion of the large internal market.

Nomenclature of the administrative units of the Community



Presentation of LOC

Eurostat's computerized file of the over 80 000 administrative units of the Community, known as LOC (short for 'localities'), is now available on-line to the Commission's departments, enabling users to obtain for any given administrative unit an inventory of both the higher-level units of which it forms part and the lower-level units of which it is composed.

The administrative units used in each Member State (with the number of such units at each level) are as follows:

Each unit is identified by its designation in the language of the Member State in question and by a hierarchically ordered, 14-digit alphanumerical code. The first five digits of this code are those of the nomenclature of Community regions (NUTS), of which LOC is therefore an extension down to the most detailed administrative level.

Future developments

The list of the administrative units of the Community will be updated annually as required.

It is further planned to provide the following information on each unit at the most detailed level:

- (i) initially, its surface area (in km²) and resident population;
- (ii) at a later stage, provided sufficient data can be collected, information on certain

transport infrastructures (railway stations, ports, airports, etc.).

Finally, the consultation procedure will be improved to take account of users' suggestions.

Utilization

The chief objective of LOC is to allow the various Commission departments to situate territorial units rapidly within known regional divisions. This may be useful whenever projects, businesses or contractors are identified only by an address referring to a detailed administrative unit whereas information concerning them is to be compiled at an aggregated geographical level.

The data on surface area and population will facilitate the work of identifying rural areas and allow estimates to be made of the population affected by particular Community measures applying to specific territories not compatible with the NUTS nomenclature (e.g. less-favoured agricultural areas, industrial areas in decline, mountain areas, environmentally sensitive areas, etc.). The information on transport infrastructures will be a vital tool for national statistical institutes needing to measure movements of goods between regions of different countries.

Agricultural income 1988: slight improvement for the Community as a whole

The forecasts of agricultural income for 1988 are based on estimates as at 8 December 1988. There appears to be a slight improvement for this year in the Community as a whole. There are three indicators for assessing the development of this income. Net valueadded at factor cost, in real terms and per annual work unit (AWU) (indicator 1), should rise by 1,3% (see Table 1) for the Community excluding Portugal. This follows on from a fall of -2,5% in 1987.

Net income from agricultural activity (net value-added at factor cost less rents and interest payments, indicator 2), in real terms and per annual work unit (hired and non-hired workers), and indicator 3, which covers the net income of the non-hired agricultural labour force, i.e. the holder and the members of his family working on the holding (net value-added at factor cost less rents, interest payments and wages), again in real terms and per non-remunerated annual work unit, are likely to show a perceptible increase of 1,2% (1987: -2,7%) and 1,4% (1987: -1,4%) respectively.

An initial analysis² (see Table 3) of the reasons for this improvement in agricultural income reveals first of all an increase of 3%

in the overall value of final production,³ with prices up by 2% in nominal terms and volume up 1%.

The volume of crop production will increase by 2,5%, with substantial rises in citrus fruit (+20,3%), cereals (+10,9%) and fresh fruit (+5,8%), with falls for grape must and wine (-12,8%) and potatoes (-2,2%).

A 2,2% price rise in nominal terms of crop production reflects increases for most of the products concerned. The prices for potatoes (+11,2%), fresh fruit (+6,6%) and citrus fruit (+6,4%) are likely to be well up on 1987. On the other hand, those of sugar-beet (-0,5%) and cereals (-0,4%) will be slightly lower. Here it may be noted that the prices of cereals will be down for the second year running owing to the excellent supply situation.

The lower figure for the volume of total animal production (-0,5%) reflects the reduction for milk (-2,3%) and cattle (-2%), the direct or indirect consequences of the quota system. Production of poultry, sheep and pigs will go up yet again. The higher production of eggs (+2,4%) will largely compensate for the decline in 1987 (-2%).

The price of total animal production will go up by 1,9% owing to much higher figures for

sheep and goats (+5,4%), milk (+5%), cattle (+3,9%) and poultry (+2,8%). However, surplus supplies will mean that egg prices will be severely depressed (-10,2%) and those of pigs slightly so (-3,4%).

The value of intermediate consumption is likely to rise by 3,4% after two years in which the reverse movement applied. This is due to an increase in the volume (+1.3%)and the price (+2.2%) of intermediate consumption. The notably higher figure for the volume of plant protection and pharmaceutical products (+6,1%) is mainly due to the far greater use of fungicides. The prices of animal feedingstuffs will rise considerably in nominal terms (+3,3%) whereas energy prices will fall (-2,2%). Intermediate consumption represents approximately 40% in value terms of final total production, which explains why the trend in the value of the former (+3,4%) only partially affects the rise in the latter (+3%). Consequently, gross value-added at market prices is expected to be 2,6% up in 1988 over the previous year.

The subsidies linked to production and which benefit the farmer will rise considerably as a consequence of national and Community arrangements, particularly the compensation for the suspension of milk quotas of 4%. Subsidies are expected to move from ECU 7,1 thousand million in 1987, to ECU 8,7 thousand million in 1988.

The considerable increase in taxes linked to production (+15,4%) is attributable very largely to the co-responsibility levy for cereals, the supertax on milk and the elimination levy on sugar-beet.

Depreciation will rise by 1,5% (in 1987: +1,4%). Rents will rise by 4,1% and interest charges by 1,3% (in 1987: -1,7%) owing to higher interest rates.

Compensation of employees is expected to show a 3,3% rise, this being above the 1987 rate (+1,1%).

To arrive at net value-added at factor cost, subsidies must be added to gross value-added at market prices, and taxes linked to production, as well as depreciation, deducted. The result is an increase in nominal terms of $3,6\%.^1$

Finally, there are two other factors influencing agricultural income per AWU in real terms: the variation in the numbers of such units and the rate of inflation.

According to information currently available, the agricultural labour force should fall by 2,6% in 1988 (-2,4% in 1987). The rate of change of the implicit price index of gross domestic product at market prices, which is used as a deflator, will be lower than it was last year (1987: 3,9%, 1988: 3,8%).

The anticipated increase of 1,3% in real agricultural income per AWU (indicator 1) is the weighted average of changes in the Member States.

A country-by-country analysis reveals differing situations, partly because of varying agroeconomic trends and partly because the 1987/86 period is taken as the stopping point. It very often happens that a favourable rate of change in one year is balanced out by an unfavourable one the year previously and vice-versa. The highest positive rates of change were in Ireland: +14,9% (+18% in 1987); in the FR of Germany: +12.7%(-16,6% in 1987); in Spain: +10,7%(+7,1% in 1987); in Greece: +5.8%(-1.0% in 1987); and in Belgium; +3.9%(-5.3% in 1987). In the Netherlands and Luxembourg, where rates are close to the Community average, income will improve slightly at 1,4% (-5,4% in 1987) and 1,2% (+2.3% in 1987) respectively. Nevertheless, there are countries where the reverse holds true: to a slight extent in Denmark: -1.8%(-14.2% in 1987); and in Italy: -1.9%(-0,3% in 1987); and to a greater extent in France: -4.2% (-1.5% in 1987); and the

¹ 2.9% if one includes the United Kingdom (see Table 1).

United Kingdom: -9,7% (-3,1% in 1987).

A medium-term comparison reveals that real agricultural income in the Community rose in 1988 over its '1980' level by 5,7% (see Table 2). Here again there are considerable differences between the States. The increase between these two years is far above the average in Ireland, Luxembourg and Spain (40% and more) and in Denmark and the Netherlands (roughly 20%). In Greece and Belgium, the figure is slightly above the Community average. On the other side of the coin,

the figure is generally stable in Germany and has even fallen in France (-2%), Italy (-7%) and the United Kingdom (-10%).

Averaging the indices of agricultural income (indicator 1) from 1986 to 1988 per Member State irons out the substantial annual fluctuations in production. It will be seen that the '1987' income has remained at least at the same level as '1980' with the exception of Italy. The situation has been stable in Germany, France and the UK, while increases of highly varying proportions apply to the other Member States.

These are provisional estimates. In March 1989 Eurostat will publish revised figures and a detailed analysis of the development of agricultural income for the Community as a whole and for each of the Member States.

Methodological notes:

- 1. The results published here are estimates by the relevant national organizations in the Member States for the current year. The income indicator 'net value-added at factor cost' covers only the production sector agriculture and does not therefore represent total income of persons employed in agriculture, who may have income from other sources. The labour force input and any changes therein are expressed in annual work units (AWU). One AWU corresponds to one person employed full-time in agriculture for the whole year.
- The concept of 'final production' is applied in the European Community's economic accounts. It differs from the 'delivery' concept (which is used for special purposes in certain countries) in that it includes changes in stocks and investments in agricultural products.
- 3. The rates of change (Table 1) in net value-added (NVA) per AWU in real terms for the Community result from weighting the national rates of change with each country's share of NVA in the Community in 1987. Total real NVA for the Community in Table 2 is obtained by adding the real NVA figures deflated by the implicit price index of GDP and converted into ECU by reference to 1980 exchange rates. Average real NVA per AWU in absolute terms is obtained by dividing total real NVA by total AWU to form the basis for calculating the series of Community indices.




