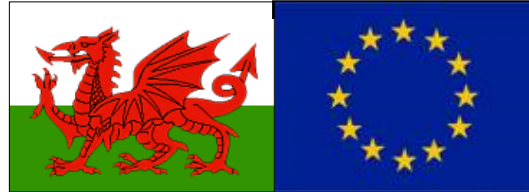

European law and Wales

OVERVIEW

The legislative competence of the National Assembly for Wales is expressly limited by section 108(5) of the [Government of Wales Act 2006](#) (GOWA 2006) to provisions that are compatible with EU law. In other words no provision of an Act of the Assembly may breach EU law.

Similarly section 80(8) of GOWA 2006 provides that the Welsh Ministers may not exercise their functions (including the function of making subordinate legislation) in so far as that would be incompatible with EU law.

This means that the Welsh Ministers' powers must be interpreted in the light of any relevant EU laws. As an example, the Welsh Ministers have a power under section 1 of the [Welsh Development Agency Act 1975](#) to provide grants to businesses in Wales. There are no constraints on this power in the Act itself but, by virtue of articles 107 and 108 of the [Treaty on the Functioning of the European Union](#) (the treaty provisions on State aid), the Welsh Ministers' ability to exercise this power is limited to paying grants only in certain circumstances and on certain terms.

The Welsh Ministers also have a role in transposing EU Directives. By virtue of section 80 of GOWA 2006 the Welsh Ministers are generally responsible for the

Europe and Wales: Investing in your Future



MAKING WAVES

PROJECTS that will generate energy from the waves and tidal currents in Welsh waters have been backed by millions of EU funds.

A £10m EU investment is supporting energy company, Minesto UK, to take forward a major tidal energy initiative off the coast of Anglesey which could produce electricity for thousands of homes.

Meanwhile, Swansea-based Marine Power Systems secured £2m of EU funds to develop its patented technology which will generate energy from ocean waves off the Pembrokeshire coast.

DID YOU KNOW? Over 550,000 homes and businesses across Wales have access to Superfast broadband – made possible with £89.5m EU funding in the Superfast Cymru programme.

ON CAMPUS

OVER 5,000 students are benefiting from world-class facilities at Swansea University's new Bay Campus, which opened in September and was backed by £40m of EU funds and £60m from the European Investment Bank.

RACING AHEAD

EU funds helped establish the UK's first full-scale mountain bike park in the heart of the South Wales valleys. BikePark Wales, based in Merthyr, opened in 2013 and benefited from £2m of EU funds.

EU funds are also supporting the development of world-class research capacity in Wales, building on existing strengths to attract further private and competitive research funding.

The £450 million Campus provides world-class facilities for industrial research and development in engineering, advanced materials and manufacturing, and offers a state-of-the-art learning environment for students.

The development was amongst the top five knowledge economy projects in Europe and aims to generate around £2 billion of economic impact over a 10-year period through construction activity, research, and student and business investment.

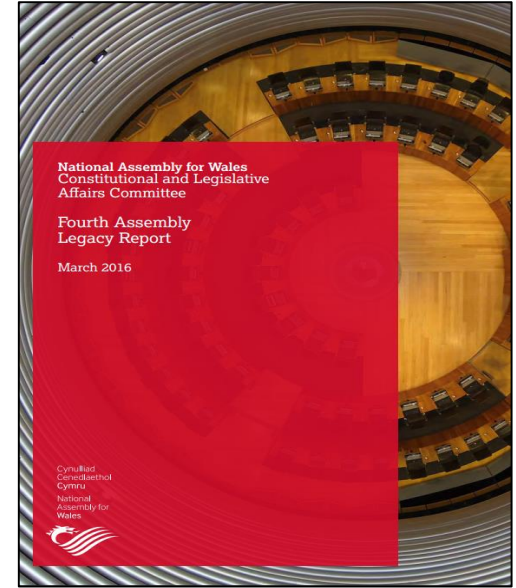
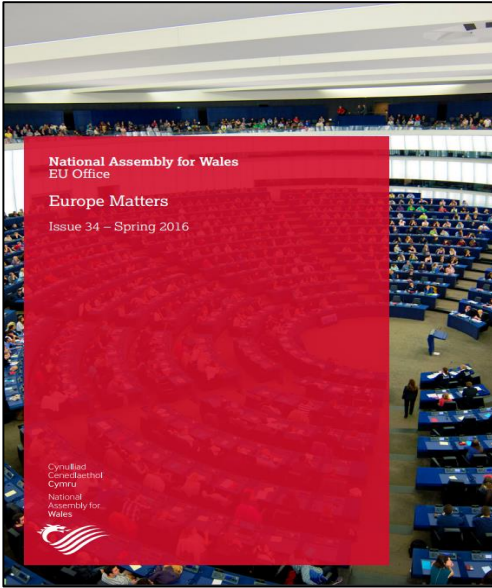

Approximately 70% of domestic law impacting on local authorities originated in the EU, making it critical for Welsh local government to be represented at the heart of Europe and engaged at an early stage in Brussels when the European Commission initiates new proposals or amends existing texts, with implications for local authorities.</p> <p>Since April 2003, the Welsh Local Government Association (WLGA) European Office, collocated in Wales House (in the Brussels European Quarter) with the Welsh Government, the National Assembly for Wales (NAFW) and the Welsh Higher Education Brussels Office, has provided a dedicated resource for the WLGA and its member authorities on European issues and promoted the role of Welsh local government in European affairs. WLGA EU Funding Guide 2014-2020

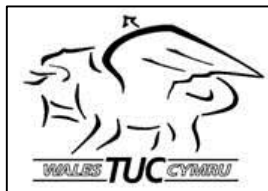
This guide is for Welsh local authorities interested in EU funding.

Drastically reduced public sector finances means local authorities need to be more creative in finding new sources of funding. The EU offers plenty of funding opportunities for local authorities, but past surveys by the LGA have shown awareness of EU funding opportunities, outside of the main Structural Funds Programmes (European Regional Development Fund and European Social Fund) within local authorities across the UK is fairly low.
