Informal European Council meeting in Glasgow

On 8 and 9 June, Glasgow hosted an informal session of the Council of the European Union at which the ministers for regional policy discussed the future reform of the Structural Funds, while the ministers for spatial development dealt with the draft European Spatial Development Perspective (ESDP), as well as urban issues.

Reform of the Structural Funds

The ministers supported the proposal to reduce the number of priority Objectives under the Structural Funds, as well as the number of Community Initiatives, to three. They welcomed the idea of integrated programming spread over 7 years (2000-06). They affirmed the principles of partnership and additionality for implementing the Funds. They underlined the need for strong and effective management and control systems, as well as tighter arrangements for monitoring and evaluation.

Despite the national concerns expressed in specific areas, broad consensus emerged in Glasgow on the need for Structural Fund resources to be concentrated on the regions most in need of them and on the fact that the simplification and decentralisation of the implementation of the Funds must be accompanied by tighter control and increased financial responsibility.

They agreed lastly on the importance of rapid progress, in reforming the Funds. A week later, this view was confirmed by the Heads of State

and of Government, who indicated in the conclusions of the European Council in Cardiff that substantial progress would have to be made at the European Council in Vienna next December and that overall political agreement on the structural policies would have to be reached by March 1999.

European Spatial Development Perspective

In Glasgow the Ministers reaffirmed their undertaking to present the final version of the ESDP at the informal Council in May 1999 and agreed that this version should reflect:

- the whole range of national consultations now taking place, as well as the views of the European institutions;
- the results of the seminars the Commission is organising on spatial development in Europe (see table overleaf);
- the initial lessons from the series of studies the Commission launched recently on the trends and issues in regional development planning;
- new aspects of the spatial development impact of the future enlargement of the European Union.

The ministers recommended that the preaccession countries be given the opportunity of expressing their views on the ESDP.

Urban issues

The ministers discussed this topic on the basis of a document from the UK presidency entitled "Urban Exchange Initiative", which describes various forms of good practice for an integrated approach to urban development. Monika Wulf-Mathies, European Commissioner, announced in Glasgow that the Commission will shortly be presenting an action plan for cities that will seek to include urban issues in the various Community policies, especially regional policy.
