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

### EUROPEAN COMMUNITY (EC) TRADE WITH THE AFRICAN, CARIBBEAN AND PACIFIC COUNTRIES (ACP).

- Results until March 1993 -

#### PART I: EC TRADE BALANCE VIS-A-VIS THE ACP.

##### EC TRADE BALANCE WITH ACP BY PARTNERS.



1. EC's trade surplus with the ACP countries was around 480 million ecus in the first quarter of 1993. In the same period of 1992 the EC registered a deficit of 1 020 million ecus. This change is due both to the reduction of EC imports (28,4%) and to the increase of EC exports (2,2%) to this group of countries.

2. The EC cover ratio (exports over imports) with the ACP countries was 113,5 in the first quarter of 1993.

3. EC's trade balance with Class 2 countries showed a surplus of nearly 2 315 million ecus in the period January-March 1993, while the EC experienced a deficit of around 600 million ecus with this group of countries during the same period of 1992. While EC exports increased by 2,8% in the first quarter of 1993, EC imports decreased by 5,2%.

4. The EC cover ratio with Class 2 countries in the first quarter of 1993 was 106,6.



## PART II: EC IMPORTS FROM THE ACP AND CLASS 2 COUNTRIES.

### EC IMPORTS FROM ACP.



1. EC imports from ACP went down 28,4% in value to 3 562 million ecus in the first quarter of 1993, when compared to the same period of 1992. In volume these imports decreased by 26,3%.

2. EC imports of fuel (SITC 3) decreased by 40,5% in value and 41,3% in volume between the two first quarters of 1992 and 1993. Imports of this product represented around 30% of total EC imports from this group of countries. EC imports of food, beverages and tobacco (SITC 0+1) and raw materials other than fuels (SITC 2+4) went down 4,3% and 17,5% respectively. EC imports of manufactured products (SITC 5-8) decreased by 38,5% in value and by 38,1% in volume.

3. EC imports from Class 2 countries went down 5,2% in value (6,6% in volume) to 34 912 million ecus in the first quarter of 1993, when compared to the first quarter of 1992. EC imports of manufactured products (52% of total EC imports from this group of countries) increased by 0,2% during the same periods, while EC imports of fuel decreased by nearly 10%.



## PART III: EC EXPORTS TO THE ACP AND CLASS 2 COUNTRIES.

### EC EXPORTS FROM ACP.



1. EC exports to ACP increased by 2,2% to 4 042 million ecus in the first quarter of 1993, when compared to the same period of 1992. In volume they went up 3,3%.

2. EC exports of manufactured products (nearly 80% of total EC exports to this group of countries) increased by 2,6% in value and 4,5% in volume during the periods January-March of 1992 and 1993. EC exports of food, beverages and tobacco increased by 0,4%, while EC exports of raw materials other than fuels went up 0,9%

3. EC exports to Class 2 countries went up 2,8% to 37 227 million ecus in the first quarter of 1993, compared to the first quarter of 1992. EC exports of manufactured products to this group of countries increased by 3,9%, while EC exports of food, beverages and tobacco went up 2,7%

4. The EC exports to the rest of the world (extra-EC exports) increased by 1,3% during the periods January-March of 1992 and 1993.

#### PART IV: EC-ACP TRADE BY PARTNER COUNTRIES.

By groups of countries, the EC experienced its most important surplus with Central and South America (around 365 million ecus) in the first quarter of 1993, mainly due to the trade flows with Bahamas. The EC showed the biggest deficit with the countries of Central

Africa (around 150 million ecus), due to the imports from Zaire and Cameroon. By individual ACP countries, the EC experienced the largest surplus with Bahamas and Liberia (365 and 116 million ecus respectively), while the EC kept the biggest deficits with Ivory Coast and Cameroon (174 and 99 million ecus respectively).




## PART V: EC-ACP TRADE BY MAIN PRODUCTS.

1. EC imports of crude petroleum from ACP countries went down 39,2% to 1 072 million ecus in the first quarter of 1993, when compared to the same period of 1992. They represented around 30% of total imports from ACP. More than 10% of total extra-EC imports of this product came from ACP countries.

2. EC imports of non industrial diamonds decreased by 80,4% between the periods January-March of 1992 and 1993, while EC imports of diamonds unsorted increased by 6,5%.

3. EC imports of cocoa beans decreased by 13,9% in the first quarter of 1993, when compared to the same period of 1992. 93% of total EC imports of this product

came from the ACP. EC imports of coffee decreased by 3,8% during the same periods.

4. The EC increased its imports from ACP only in five of the products considered in the list (which covered nearly 70% of total EC imports from ACP in the first quarter of 1993): fresh bananas (4,1%), diamonds unsorted (6,5%), black tea (4,3%), aluminium oxide (34,7%) and natural uranium (7,6%).

5. The EC imports which decreased most in the first quarter of 1993 when compared to the same period of 1992 were non industrial diamonds (80,4%), bars of refined copper (56,1%) and unwrought aluminium (49,9%).
