



EUROPEAN UNION (EU) TRADE WITH AFRICAN, CARIBBEAN AND PACIFIC COUNTRIES (ACP) -Results until December 1993-

PART I. EU TRADE BALANCE VIS-A-VIS THE ACP AND CLASS 2 COUNTRIES

EU TRADE BALANCE WITH ACP



1. EU's trade balance with the ACP countries showed an improvement of 2,5 billion ecus in 1993 compared to 1992. Sharply lower EU imports from these countries (-18,5%) and more moderate decreases of exports (-5,1%) changed the deficit of 0,7 billion ecus in 1992 to a surplus of 1,8 billion ecus in 1993. EU's surplus on non-oil trade rose from 4,7 billion ecus in 1992 to 5,4 billion ecus in 1993. The cover ratio (exports over imports) of EU's total trade with the ACP was up from 96,3% in 1992 to 112,1% in 1993. When considering non-oil trade for the same years the cover ratio rose from 137,5% to 150,2%.

2. EU's trade balance with CLASS 2 countries experienced a surplus of 24,5 billion ecus in 1993, compared to 7,6 billion ecus in 1992. The very strong growth of exports to these countries by 9,5% and the imports from CLASS 2 that were down by 1,6%, contributed to this big rise of surplus. The last isolated quarter of 1993 resulted in a surplus of 10,4 billion ecus. When considering non-oil trade the EU surplus was even higher, a rise from 44,3 billion ecus in 1992 to 56,6 billion ecus was registered for 1993. EU total exports covered 117,1% of total imports from CLASS 2 countries in 1993. In 1992 the cover ratio was 105,2%.

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

PART II. EU IMPORTS FROM THE ACP AND CLASS 2 COUNTRIES

EU IMPORTS FROM ACP

1. EU imports from the ACP countries experienced a decrease in value of 18,5% to 14,8 billion ecus in 1993. The imports fell in terms of volume by 17,3% compared to 1992.

2. EU imports of manufactured products (SITC 5-8) representing 21,0% of total EU imports from the ACP, were down 32,1% in value and 30,8% in volume between 1992 and 1993. Fuel (SITC 3) imported from the ACP decreased by 29,2% in value to 4,0 billion ecus. EU imports of food, beverages and tobacco (SITC 0+1) from ACP went down by 1,2% in 1993, the decrease in imported value of beverages and tobacco (-21,5%) was the main reason to this fall. Raw materials other than fuels (SITC 2+4) decreased EU imports by 4,9% in value from 1992 to 1993.

3. EU imports from CLASS 2 countries decreased by 3,6% in volume and by 1,6% in value to 143,2 billion ecus between 1992 and 1993. The value of EU imports of manufactured products (about 51% of total imports from these countries), were up by 4,5%, while the imported volume went down by 2,1%. EU imports of fuel (SITC 3) decreased by 7,1% in volume and 9,6% in value.



PART III. EU EXPORTS TO THE ACP AND CLASS 2 COUNTRIES

EU EXPORTS TO ACP



1. In 1993 EU exports to ACP countries experienced a decrease in volume by 5,6% and in value by 5,1% to 16,5 billion ecus, compared to the previous year.

2. EU exports of manufactured products (SITC 5-8), to ACP went down by 5,5% in value to 13,1 billion ecus in 1993. In volume terms the exports of these products decreased by 6,1% from 1992. The value of EU exports of raw materials other than fuels (SITC 2+4) and food, beverages and tobacco (SITC 0+1) to ACP went down by 5,8% and 5,0% respectively in 1993, compared to 1992. The value of exported fuel to ACP increased by 28,0% in 1993, while a rise by 13,3% was recorded for the volume.

3. The EU exports to the CLASS 2 countries increased by 9,5%, to 167,8 billion ecus in value and 11,5% in volume between 1992 and 1993. The export of manufactured products (84,2% of total exports to these countries), increased by 11,0% in value terms.



PART IV. EU-ACP TRADE BY PARTNER COUNTRIES


In 1993 the EU surplus with West Africa rose by 0,7 billion ecus for about 1,0 billion ecus compared to 1992. The main reason for this rise was the improved trade balance with Nigeria. The trade surplus with East and North Africa amounted to about 0,9 billion ecus. The EU recorded a surplus with Central and South America of about 0,8 billion ecus, an improvement of 0,7 billion ecus from 1992, mostly because of the improved balance with the Bahamas. The EU showed a deficit with Central Africa and Southern Africa of 0,3 billion ecus each. A slight deficit of about 0,2 billion ecus was registered for the EU trade balance with Australasia, Oceania and others.

The EU registered an important surplus of 0,8 billion ecus with the Bahamas in 1993, a rise by almost 0,5 billion ecus compared to 1992. EU also showed a surplus with Liberia of nearly 0,5 billion ecus and a surplus of 0,3 billion ecus was registered with Gabon. Ivory Coast and Cameroon were the ACP countries where EU experienced the highest trade deficit in 1993, the trade deficit amounted to about 0,5 billion ecus each. EU recorded a trade deficit of 0,4 billion ecus with Mauritius.

PART V. EU-ACP TRADE BY MAIN PRODUCTS

1. The degree of concentration of EU imports from ACP declined from 1992 to 1993. In 1992 only six products were required to cover half of total EU imports from ACP, while eight were needed in 1993. Those products were: crude petroleum, cocoa beans, coffee, raw cane sugar, fresh bananas, unsorted diamonds, tropical wood and unwrought gold.

2. Crude petroleum, by far the most important product from ACP went down by 28,6% in value to 3,9 billion ecus and by 28,7% in terms of volume between 1992 and 1993. Some 8,5% of the total value of EU imports of this product came from ACP countries in 1993. Nigeria and Angola remained the most important exporting ACP countries of crude petroleum in 1993. Cameroon became more important as an exporter of crude petroleum to EU than Gabon in 1993.

3. Imports of cocoa beans from the ACP countries represented more than 79% of total EU imports of this product in 1993. The EU imports of cocoa beans from

ACP decreased more in value terms (-9,0%), than in terms of volume (-4,6%) between 1992 and 1993. Ivory Coast and Ghana were the main exporters. Almost 30,0% of total EU imports of coffee came from ACP countries and represented 5,0% of total EU imports from the ACP countries in 1993. Higher prices made the value increase by 4,8%, while the volume fell by 8,0% when comparing 1993 to the previous year.

4. The EU imports suffered large reductions for stripped tobacco and for unwrought aluminium. The imports of stripped tobacco were down by 42,5% in value and by 37,8% in terms of volume, while the value of imported unwrought aluminium decreased by 34,7% with a fall in volume by 37,9% between 1992 and 1993.

5. The EU imports of unsorted diamonds rose by 33,8% in value from 1992 to 1993. The imports of unwrought gold experienced an increase by 30,6% in value, although the volume fell by 3,3%. The value of imported aluminium oxide and tunas, skipjack and bonito rose by 23,4% and 20,2% respectively, when comparing 1993 to the previous year.


