## THE WEEK AHEAD

Only one Council of Ministers meeting will be held next week: a Fisheries Council in Brussels on Monday and Tuesday which will discuss a package of TACs and quotas with particular reference to herring stocks in the North Sea. In addition, there will be two informal council meetings in Athens of <u>environment ministers</u> and transport ministers. Negotiations between the European Community and 63 countries which are signatories to the Lomé Convention will begin in Luxembourg on Thursday and Friday with the object of renewing the agreement when it expires.

## FLASHBACK

EUROPEAN ELECTIONS: At its conference in Harrogate the Liberal party decided to press for joint selection of candidates with the Social Democrats in constituencies where a Liberal was standing.

THE LABOUR PARTY AND EUROPE: A new Labour policy document modifies the party's policy of withdrawal from the European Community. Withdrawal is now only considered as a possible option.

<u>COMMISSIONER GIOLITTI</u>: Signor Antonio Giolitti, Commissioner in charge of regional policy, is touring the North-West and South-West regions at the invitation of local authorities in those areas.

AGRICULTURAL COUNCIL: Meeting in Athens, ministers failed to reach agreement on arrangements for fruit and vegetables and olive oil. These are essential preliminaries to the accession of Portugal and Spain to the Community.

<u>AGRICULTURAL STRUCTURES</u>: The Commission has published its proposals on the reform of the structural aspects of the Common Agricultural Policy (CAP).

THE TRIUMPH ACCLAIM: The French government has now agreed to regard the Triumph-Acclaim car as of British origin - something which it had earlier disputed on account of the number of Japanese components in the vehicle.

<u>ANTI-DUMPING COMPLAINTS</u>: According to a Commission report the procedure for complaints against dumping practices is being more and more used by European industrialists.

DEVELOPING COUNTRIES: Mr Gaston Thorn, President of the Commission, represented the Community at a meeting of developed and developing countries at the United Nations session in New York.
