on the draft estimates of revenue and expenditure of the European Parliament for the financial year 1980

Rapporteur: Mr Camillo RIPAMONTI

At its meeting of 31 January 1979 the Committee on Budgets appointed Mr Ripamonti member responsible for keeping under review the preparation of the estimates of the European Parliament for the financial year 1980.

At its meeting of 5 April 1979 the Bureau drew up, pursuant to Rule 50(1) of the Rules of Procedure, the first preliminary draft estimates of Parliament.

On 24 April 1979 the Committee on Budgets appointed Mr Ripamonti rapporteur. On the same day it considered the first preliminary draft estimates (PE 57.546/BUR) on the basis of a report by the Secretary-General (PE 57.545/BUR). Concluding its deliberations, the committee instructed its rapporteur to present his opinion orally to the Bureau.

At its meeting of 25 April the Bureau adopted the preliminary draft estimates and referred them to the Committee on Budgets on 27 April.

The Committee on Budgets considered the preliminary draft estimates on 7, 8 and 9 May 1979.

At this last meeting it considered and adopted the draft report and adopted the draft estimates by eight votes to two, with one abstention.

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The Committee on Budgets hereby submits to the European Parliament the following motion for a resolution, together with explanatory statement:

MOTION FOR A RESOLUTION

on the draft estimates of revenue and expenditure of the Parliament for the 1980 financial year.

The European Parliament,

- having regard to the decisions of the enlarged Bureau and draft estimates submitted to it by its Committee on Budgets,
- having regard to the report of the Committee on Budgets (Doc. 176/79),

as regards the establishment plan:

- 1. Points out that the establishment plan includes:
 - (a) the creation of 107 permanent posts and two temporary posts;
 - (b) the creation of 188 posts frozen which the directly elected Parliament may unfreeze according to its needs, broken down as shown afterwards;
 - (c) extension of the reserve list for posts seconded to the political groups as specified below;
 - (d) confirms that these posts have been decided upon first by Parliament during the consideration of its supplementary estimates for 1979;
 - (e) the transformation in permanent posts of 25 local staff, broken down as shown afterwards;
- 2. Recalls that it will be for the directly elected Parliament to take any decision to modify existing structures including those referred to by its Committee on Budgets during its examination of the supplementary estimates for 1979 proposed for Parliament;

as regards the estimates as such:

- 3. Decides that, at this stage, the annual estimates should not include any substancial modification in the appropriations, beyond those agreed to in its deliberations of 15 March 1979, except in respect of:
 - (a) calculation over a 12 month period of the appropriations needed to cover allowances for Members and to pay in a full year the salaries pertaining to the posts proposed in the supplementary estimates of Parliament for 1979, and confirmed in paragraph 1 of this resolution;
 - (b) a reserve needed to defray:
 - the anticipated increased expenditure relating to the new premises which the directly elected Parliament will be occupying at its habitual places of work;
 - possible adaptation of allowances and costs for members;
 - financial consequences of initiatives or decisions taken by the directly elected Parliament;
 - initiatives undertaken by the Parliament to acquire the home of President Jean Monnet;

- possible new needs to cover functional expenditure;
- 4. Suspends for the time being or limits any other increase in expenditure against specific budget items since it is of the opinion that the directly elected Parliament must vote such changes as it may consider necessary next autumn when it comes to consider the draft budget of the Communities;
- 5. Adopts the annual estimates of revenue and expenditure of the European Parliament for the financial year 1980 at a figure of 167,880,232 EUA;
- 6. Emphasizes that the decisions taken within the framework of the adoption of these estimates for 1980 do not render null and void the proposals voted by Parliament on 15 March 1979 when adopting supplementary estimates for 1980;
- 7. Instructs its President to forward these estimates to the Commission to enable it to include them in the preliminary draft budget of the European Communities for 1980 pursuant to the provisions of Article 203(2) of the Treaty.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

I. APPROPRIATIONS FOR MEMBERS OF THE INSTITUTION

1. It should be noted that on the basis of the decisions of the institutions and competent bodies, expenditure relating to Members of the Institution is calculated on the same basis as in previous financial years. This expenditure accordingly covers travel and subsistence allowances for attendance at meetings of Parliament and of its bodies, secretarial allowances paid to Members and, secondarily, provision for accident and sickness risks together with certain social charges.

The estimated figure for 1980 is 15,112,300 EUA. This represents an increase of 1,948,800 EUA on 1979 (the 1979 appropriations, including the provision made in the supplementary estimates, total). This increase is attributable to the fact that the expenditure for the 410 Members of the directly elected Parliament was calculated, as was only appropriate, for a 7 month period in 1979 and for a full year in 1980.

II. ESTABLISHMENT PLAN

The 1979 establishment was increased to 2,105 permanent posts when supplementary estimates No. 1 for 1979 were adopted. occasion 10 permanent posts and 2 temporary posts were added to the staff complement, together with 188 frozen posts. The 107 posts were considered necessary to deal with the increase in work resulting from the installation of the directly elected Parliament and accordingly to enable the Assembly to discharge its duties at its habitual places of work under normal conditions after 17 July. Contrary to the impression which may have been given during the last debate on supplementary estimates No. 1, the 188^{1} frozen posts, the creation of which Parliament confirmed in adopting its estimates for 1980, cover all the directorate-generals, including the Directorate-General for Research and Documentation (32 posts). It goes without saying, however, that Parliament cannot at this stage set limits on the decisions of the

directly elected Parliament which will carry full responsibility for deciding whether or not to use these posts.

3. In its report to Parliament in connection with the adoption of supplementary estimates No. 1 for 1979, the Committee on Budgets also briefly indicated the need which was already becoming apparent for certain structural changes in line with the development of activities in certain sectors. In the case of the Parliamentary committees, this consideration applies to the sector including the Committee on Budgets and the Control Subcommittee (attention has already been drawn on several occasions to the need to upgrade to a directorate the present division responsible for all activities linked with advance and retrospective control of the Community's financial activities together with the sector responsible for decisions of Parliament on Community acts with financial implications and on the related conciliation procedures). The same consideration applies to certain sectors of the Directorate-General for Administration.


All decisions in this area will of course rest with the new Parliament; changes in the structure of the Secretariat will in any case be bound up with decisions taken by the elected Parliament on its own organization and on modifications to or strengthening of the structure of the Secretariat which has developed over the past 20 years.

3a Having regard to the latest decisions on supplementary estimates No. 1, the present composition of Parliament's Secretariat breaks down as follows.



Pyramid of posts attached to each Directorate-General


Directorate-General for Sessional and General Services




Directorate-General for Committees and Interparliamentary Delegations




Directorate-General for Information and Public Relations

Changes in the establishment plan for 1980

4. The only changes which the rapporteur is proposing to make to the establishment plan concern the conversion of 25 local staff posts into established posts.

On a proposal from its Committee on Budgets, the Parliament had in recent years decided to convert local staff posts in this way as soon as the persons concerned had been exercising for at least 4 years duties that had become permanent and necessary. After applying that rule for a number of years, there remain 25 local staff posts to convert. The rapporteur considers that it is now opportune to settle this matter once and for all by making the 4 year clause rather more flexible.

5. The Staff Committee has insisted on certain qualitative changes being made to the establishment plan in order to ensure continuity of careers, in particular by upgrading certain posts. The Staff Committee has also stressed the desirability of creating more posts for technical assistants and secretarial assistants so as to extend the career opportunities of principal secretaries who are at present limited to a single grade (C1).

The rapporteur recognizes the justification for this request but considers that, given its possible implications, it must be considered and settled by the directly elected Parliament.

III. THE ESTIMATES AS SUCH

6. The 1980 budget represents a continuation of the 1979 estimates (with the inclusion of supplementary and amending estimates No. 1) rather than a substantially new or significantly different forecast of the main items of expenditure than in the previous year.

This attitude is not only prudent but also logical because the new Parliament must have responsibility for determining, if necessary, when it examines the draft budget of the Communities for 1980 in October, the financial consequences of the new requirements that it considers may need to be met.

- 7. There is one single exception to this approach, namely provision for rental of buildings at the different places of work. The substantial increase in the appropriations under this heading is discussed below.
- 8. The rapporteur feels that the proposals from the Secretary-General which were endorsed by the Bureau and reflect a judicious containment of the increase in expenditure, deserve to be supported. He has taken this principle further by cutting the forecast appropriations from 169,890,167 EUA to 167,880,232 EUA. By doing so he has reduced the proposals forwarded to the Committee on Budgets by 2,009,935 EUA and held the overall increase on the 1979 figure of 145,530,700 EUA down to 15.36%.

Given that the proposals relating to almost all the titles, chapters and articles are based on the principles outlined above, it seems opportune to comment on certain expenditure forecasts with particular reference to those in respect of rental.

Expenditure on rental

9. The appropriations to cover rental of buildings (Chapter 21, Article 210) at the three provisional places of work are increased from 6,433,600 EUA to 12,275,000 EUA.

The appropriations to cover the operation of these premises (Articles 211 to 219) (water, gas, electricity, heating, security of the buildings, cleaning and maintenance, fitting out of premises) total 18,060,000 EUA, a substantial increase on the expenditure estimates for 1979 of 9,978,950 EUA under this heading.

If necessary additional appropriations might be drawn for this purpose from the 'non allocated provisional appropriations' in Chapter 100 which total 13,950,000 EUA but are also intended to cover possible additional needs in respect of Members' expenses and allowances and initiatives or decisions taken by the directly elected Parliament whose financial impact cannot be evaluated at this stage.

- 10. It should be stated at the outset that the unsatisfactory situation facing the Parliament as regards the organization of its activities at the different places of work is obviously not due to its own wishes (since it would be difficult to imagine how a Parliament could arrive at such an irrational solution as the present one involving constant travel between three different cities); responsibility lies with the governments of the Member States which have imposed and are continuing to impose on the parliamentary institution a dispersion of its work which entails not only serious drawbacks in terms of the efficiency and rapidity of parliamentary activities but also particularly difficult working conditions for the staff and, a by no means negligible factor, excessively high costs which are difficult to justify.
- 11. Despite this reservation of principle in respect of the working conditions imposed on the European Parliament, the enlarged Bureau has found it necessary to enable the directly elected Parliament to develop its activities properly and having regard to the agreements relating to the three places of work to conclude rental contracts with the Belgian Government, the Luxembourg Government and the Strasbourg Municipal Administration in respect of premises which are large enough to meet its needs.

These contracts have been concluded on the basis of the following principles:

- the leases are signed for a period of 18 years. Parliament does however have the option of terminating them at one year's advance notice without incurring financial penalties. This seemed to be the only way of enabling the elected Parliament acting of course in agreement with the governments of the Member States to seek a definitive solution or a less unsatisfactory solution than that adopted up to now without incurring additional financial consequences:
- where possible these leases are not automatically indexed but may include revision clauses;

- all the technical installations alterations to conference rooms and in particular the necessary interpreting equipment - are provided by Parliament and therefore remain its property.
- 12. The relevant contracts make provision for:
- in <u>Brussels</u> approximately 40,000 m² comprising 7 conference rooms, a press room, a self-service restaurant and some 400 offices including 200 intended for Members on the basis of 1 office per 2 Members;
- in <u>Strasbourg</u> the floor space is also 40,000 m². It is planned to provide 2 large additional conference rooms, a printing shop, a self-service restaurant and some 300 offices set aside for Members and political group secretariats;
- in Luxembourg, pending further decisions by the Government of the Grand Duchy, it is planned to add to the existing premises on the basis of a full or partial rental contract, a new chamber and some 80 adjacent offices. It is also planned to rent 150 offices in a building which is already available on the Kirchberg Plateau.
- 13. The present estimated amount of <u>rental costs</u> at the different places of work is as follows:
- Brussels: a total of 109 million FB per year, less one-third for 1980 since the premises will only be made available to Parliament in the spring of 1980;
- Strasbourg: 13,758,000 FF;
- Luxembourg: approximately 115 million FB added to the present total amount of 191 million FB (making a total of 306 million FB).

Once again the Committee on Budgets and its rapporteur wish to protest against this particularly costly situation which is reflected in the above figures. For the time being no alternative solution can be found to the present situation which reflects the wishes of the governments of the Member States.

Salaries for established officials

14. The appropriations entered in respect of salaries and related allowances would enable the elected Parliament to make use of the 188 posts which were created in the supplementary estimates for 1979 and are at present frozen. The substantial increase in Article 110 is largely attributable to the fact that the appropriations in respect of the establishment plan resulting from the 1979 estimates have been calculated for a 12-month period (75,489,900 EUA are entered against Article 110; the 1979 appropriations were 54,818,700 EUA).

Other staff

- Auxiliary

15. The rapporteur considers that the figure against Item 1110 must remain substantially the same as in 1979 (2 million EUA against 1,831,500 EUA). It is of course possible that a very large number of auxiliary staff will have to be recruited in 1980 since this procedure may be followed to recruit the first Greek officials.

The rapporteur believes that if necessary the appropriations for this purpose should be taken from the reserve and that, at all events, it will be for the budgetary authority - the Bureau and Committee on Budgets - to decide on the recruitment of these auxiliary staff members on the basis of an overall memorandum constituting a programme for the recruitment of these staff members to be submitted to it in due course by the responsible officials of the Secretariat.

- Local staff

16. The appropriation against this item is to be reduced from 700,000 EUA in 1979 to 350,000 EUA and will probably remain partially unused.

The rapporteur considers this reduction in the appropriation to be logical since he is proposing the conversion of the 14 last local staff posts which appear on the establishment plan into permanent posts.

Other staff expenditure

17. No special comment is necessary on other staff expenditure which relates mainly to allowances and miscellaneous provisions more often than not covered by precise rules in the Staff Regulations.

Provisional appropriations to cover adjustments to staff salaries

18. This entry amounting to 4,770,000 EUA (2,755,000 for 1979) has been drawn up on the basis of uniform criteria applied by all the Institutions. According to the calculations made by the Commission of the Communities, it represents approximately 4.25% of the overall appropriation for salaries in the financial year.

Chapter 12: allowances and expenses on entering and on leaving the service and on transfer

19. The entries under this chapter call for no special comment. The rapporteur felt it appropriate to make only one change, namely in the provision relating to Article 120 'miscellaneous expenditure on staff recruitment'. He is proposing the entry of an appropriation of 150,000 EUA which is substantially lower than in 1979 (450,000 EUA) since most of the recruitment to the new posts entered in the supplementary estimates will be made during the present financial year.

Chapter 13: mission expenses

20. It was felt desirable to limit the increase in expenditure under this chapter (3,500,000 EUA against 3,830,500 EUA in 1979) despite the fact that expenses under this heading will relate to a 20% bigger establishment and will increase by at least 15% due to the rise in transport and mission costs. If these appropriations prove insufficient in the course of the financial year, further appropriations would have to be drawn from the general reserve.

Chapter 14: expenditure on social welfare

21. This expenditure does not show a substantial increase (774,150 against 439,200 EUA in 1979). The rapporteur has refrained from proposing a further increase which might seem logical having regard to the substantial increase in the establishment; he has done so because of the fact that certain items of social expenditure also figure in other chapters of the budget.

Chapters 22 and 23: moveable property and ancillary expenses and current administrative expenditure

22. The appropriations in these two chapters are broadly identical to those for 1979 with the exception of appropriations for data processing equipment. In this area an entirely new entry is made against Article 224 comprising an appropriation of 486,500 EUA; this is justified by the fact that the

Secretariat is increasingly making use of data processing programmes for all expenditure items or matters relating to personnel management.

Chapter 24: entertainment and representation expenses

23. The appropriation in item 2400 to cover entertainment and representation expenses for members of the Institution has been increased from 300,000 EUA to 360,000 EUA. This slight increase appears reasonable given that the number of Members will have doubled and that contacts with parliamentarians from third countries are likely to increase. It should be noted in this connection that contacts on an institutional basis now regularly take place with the parliamentary bodies of at least 21 countries; an increasing number of parliamentarians are taking part in these contacts.

Chapter 25: expenditure for formal and other meetings

24. Article 255 now includes an appropriation of 150,000 EUA intended primarily for meetings held by the Parliament and its bodies at places other than its normal places of work. The separate presentation of these appropriations meets the requirement of greater budgetary transparency.

Chapter 26: expenditure on studies, surveys and consultations

25. The entry against this chapter has been reduced from 111,500 EUA in 1979 to 20,000 EUA in 1980. This reduction is justified since the appropriations in respect of data processing appeared against this item last year but are now shown under Article 224.

Chapter 27: expenditure on publishing and information

- item 2719: publications and information expenditure

26. The appropriation against this item is increased from 140,000 EUA to 250,000 EUA in 1980. This increase appears logical since it will be necessary to completely revise all the brochures relating to Parliament and also to publish new documents and bulletins.

- item 2722: expenditure to finance a working group of European radio corporations

27. The rapporteur considers that there is no need to enter an appropriation against this item in 1980. There was more justification for this appropriation in 1979 in the context of the general information programme on elections to the European Parliament by direct universal suffrage.

Chapter 29: subsidies and financial contributions

Item 2942: other scholarships

28. The rapporteur considers that the appropriation against this item should be increased to 200,000 EUA; this item covers expenditure on the scholarships granted to young citizens of North America and Latin-American countries and also expenditure in respect of cultural initiatives of European interest. Following this increase it should in future be possible to make study grants to young citizens of Member States as well. In general terms this cultural programme financed by Parliament should be strengthened with the directives for use of the funds coming directly from the Secretary-General.

Chapter 37: expenditure relating to certain institutions and bodies

Item 3705: contribution to the secretarial expenses of the political groups

- 29. The appropriation for this item is 2,805,000 EUA. The 15% increase is justified by a request from the political groups which has determined that they will need these additional appropriations in 1980.
- 30. A similar 15% increase is necessary for the other political activities covered by item 3706. The appropriation against this item is 736,500 EUA.
- 31. Other expenditure under this chapter calls for no special observations.

Chapter 100: provisional appropriations not allocated

- 32. The Committee on Budgets considers that the remarks against this chapter must be amended. As indicated above these appropriations should be used when the need arises to:
- make the necessary adjustments to Members' allowances and expenses;
- cover the financial consequences of initiatives or decisions taken by the elected Parliament;
- meet such new needs as may arise in respect of operating expenditure;
- finally to cover the expenditure which may be needed for the recruitment of auxiliary staff (especially Greek members of staff) and to provide the sum needed for the establishment of the 14 local staff members.

Chapter 101: contingency reserve

33. This reserve has been increased from 3,700,000 EUA in 1979 to 5 million EUA. This increase is justified by the fact that 1980 will in many respects be an exceptional year.

CONCLUSIONS

34. In presenting the last estimates prepared by Parliament and its bodies as at present constituted, it should be noted that the evolution of these estimates and of the establishment plan of the Secretariat has been based on the development of Parliamentary activities.

For 20 years the Secretariat has stood in the service of an idea and an Institution which is now to be elected by direct universal suffrage as stipulated in the Treaties.

The existing organization can no doubt be improved and perhaps even entirely rethought but the present structure has enabled parliamentarians holding a dual mandate, and a Parliament meeting in three different places, to carry out their responsibilities in the best possible manner.
